Our vision is that staff, governors and parents work actively together to ensure children receive a rich, inspiring and engaging education enabling each child to become a lifelong learner, aspiring to high standards of achievement in all areas of their life.

Schools governors are one of the largest volunteer forces in the country. We rely on parents and members of the community to form a strategic governing body that has three key functions;
