Welly racks for each class are now in place, so soon we will be 'access all areas, in all weathers!' Children will ALL need waterproof coats in school, preferably ones that you don't mind getting dirty! Children will still be out in wet weather, even if they don't bring wellies in!

OPAL development here at Clutton continues at a pace. We have regular team meetings with Michael, who supports us in ensuring we develop OPAL as well as possible for all our pupils. He is really positive, and pleased with how well it is going, and says we have achieved lots already! Thank you to the whole OPAL staff, I hope your children are sharing all the positive things they are saying about lunchtimes. Lunchtime has transformed, with a significant decrease in fallings out and accidents, and many more smiles and laughter. We look forward to sharing the outcomes of our pupil surveys with you in the next newsletter.

Lunchtime Supervision:

The OPAL team thought it may be helpful to clarify the change in adult supervision at lunchtime. As children become more competent in managing risk and in self-regulating behaviour, we are able to change our lunchtime practice. The idea of child competence is based on the agreed assumption that a four year old can remember and follow instructions, use tools and keep themselves within agreed geographical boundaries.

Pupils no longer need direct supervision (where every adult needs to see what every child is doing at every moment) and we are now using 'remote' supervision. Any potential risks are controlled by managing our environment, building competence in the children and in risk assessing new equipment that is bought into playtime. Our behaviour policy is used consistently by all staff throughout the school day, and there are clear processes in place to deal with any incidents should they arise. Lunchtime supervisors work with the OPAL team, to ensure that there is still vigilance and an overview of what is going on in different areas of the playground at all times.

A message from Paul Smith, Chair of governors:

Governance of Clutton Primary School

It is my pleasure to share information regarding the activities of the schools governing body.

During the first term a lot of procedural governance takes place. This term we have taken a different approach to linking governors with curriculum subjects. Instead, we have partnered governors with teachers to ensure there is greater depth to understanding of what is happening in the classrooms.

The 2017/18 financial budget was reconciled and approved. Whilst the school took significant steps last year to control the escalating financial deficit, future budgets remain a concern and the board gave unanimous support to the schools leadership team to ensure the long term financial sustainability of the school.

We have welcomed two new governors to the board and have expressions of interest in the current vacant positions.

At the September meeting, the governing body received the Head Teachers report on last year's academic performance. The progress against benchmarks continues and provides further evidence to support Ofsted's February 2018 audit that the school is "Good".

The Governor's will focus this year on three priorities; Further improvement to the financial sustainability of the school; setting a longer term strategy and improving engagement with parents.

I do hope your child has settled in and they are enjoying the learning opportunities at Clutton. As a parent and school governor next term is always my favourite, because it involves Christmas nativity plays. Enjoy your half term break.
