Chair of Governors: Annual Review by Paul Smith.

If the weather is not a big enough reminder, then school sports day and induction for parents of next year's reception class, should tell you that the end of the academic year is around the corner. I would like to reflect on the schools achievements and update you on the work of the governing body this year.

Staff changes

All organisations have periods of stability followed by periods of change, Clutton has been no different. We waved a fond farewell to Mr Tanner as he left to pursue his ambitions elsewhere in the Midsomer Schools Partnership, allowing Mrs Morris and Mrs Candy to build on Mr Tanners good work in Orinoco class. Miss Elson looked after Reception class until Mrs Parkes-Cordock joined after Christmas.

Thank you to the children and to parents for showing your resilience and embracing the necessary change.

<u>Ofsted</u>

Since Sept 2016 Miss Ennew and the LGB had had growing concerns that the school was not performing as you would hope. So it was with a sense of trepidation, that we received the call that the OFSTED inspector was due in January 2018. If I'm honest, I felt the inspection was 6 months too early for the school to demonstrate the changes made were having the desired impact. But I was wrong to worry, the school leadership and pupils really demonstrated to the inspector that Clutton had turned things around and were heading in the right direction. Finances

The long term impact of reduced primary school funding in the UK has put Clutton finances under a lot of stress in previous years. For many years, Clutton School had made a deficit, it has lost money for at least the last 4 years. Many of this year's governor board meetings were focused on addressing the long term financial sustainability of the school. Our primary driver has been to ensure the financial survival of the school whilst not sacrificing the learning environment the children enjoy. Hopefully we have found that balance this year, if the surplus continues for the next three years Clutton will have paid down its deficit.

Creativity

You will have noticed that play times look very different in school now. This has been achieved through the introduction of Outdoor Play and Learning (OPAL), funded via the grant to ensure pupils engage with regular physical activity. The children are discovering their imagination and creativity at play time. A special thank you to all involved in bringing this initiative to life. The harvest festival, Christmas plays, Spring Bulb show, Talent shows, class learning exhibitions and Art exhibitions don't happen by accident, your children work very hard. Governors have been impressed by the standard on display and are proud that the school is developing a reputation for its Arts.

Progress

Performance data on pupil attainment and progress for 2017/18 will not be available until September, but early indicators across the school are good. A full cohort of new reception class next year, means no mixed class for them and reflects the confidence the community has in the school. In 2018/19 Governors will look to cement the work already done and support the school in sharing its vision with the community.

Online safety concerns regarding Clutton Pupils:

The staff at Clutton Primary are growing increasingly concerned about the games and social networking sites your children say they are accessing at home on their computers/games consoles and phones. Two safeguarding officers came to see the children, and reported that the children knew they shouldn't be on these, but they played them anyway. They didn't know it is dangerous for them, and will impact on how they learn to behave towards others as they mature. These involve You Tube accounts, Facebook accounts, Call of Duty games and many more.

Pupils in our school as young as 7 are acting out scenes, writing about violence, using inappropriate language and even scaring other children telling them about things they have seen. Safety and well-being of your children is a key priority in school, and so would like to alert you to the risk of your child playing age-restricted video games designed for adults. We cannot control what your child accesses, but we are expected to report any concerns about this to social services, as it affects children's wellbeing and is considered neglectful. As we have concerns, these will be noted and referred as necessary. We understand that controlling technology and setting parental locks etc is a bit of a minefield. Therefore, we thought it may be helpful to provide you with some helpful resources to support your decision making at home.

Whilst social media and games provide excellent opportunities for children to play and learn while engaging with their family and friends., it is up to adults to safeguard children against the very real dangers and damaging effects.

While many video games are entirely appropriate for children, studies into the effects of the violence and sexual content frequently associated with games rated 18 show increases in aggressive and sexualized behaviour by children

Please be aware that video games are age-rated under the Pan-European Game Information (PEGI) system, which rates games at one or other of the following age levels: More information about age ratings can be found on the PEGI website (see below) It is illegal for a retailer to supply any game rated 12, 16 or 18 to anyone below the specified age. The PEGI age ratings enable parents and carers to make an informed choice when buying a game for their child. As an additional aid to parents and carers , video games rated under the PEGI system will usually display information to explain why a game has been rated at a particular age level. Children are not able to separate fiction from reality, and cannot tell right from wrong at such an early age.

It is not appropriate for children to play, or to watch others playing, games rated 18 and therefore suitable only for adults aged eighteen or over as they contain content that is unsuitable for children, including blood and gore, extreme and intense violence (torture, multiple motiveless killing and violence towards defenceless people), mature humour, nudity, strong sexual content, strong language and use of drugs and alcohol. You may wish to consider using free online resources to help decide whether a particular video game is suitable for their child. For example, Common Sense Media (<u>https://www.commonsensemedia.org</u>) provides Kids Media App, available for Android, iPhone, and iPad. Kids Media App, helps parents and carers decide what to let their children play, watch and download.

By parents working in partnership with the school and following these statutory guidelines, we hope to eliminate this current e-safety issue as soon as possible. Mrs Muckley is our E-Safety lead, and often holds assemblies for the children about how to keep safe.
