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Farewell Lynda

As you will all know, our Headteacher Lynda Bevan will be leaving us at the end of the year to start her (much anticipated) retirement.

Lynda joined the school in 2014 as the Head of English, where she immediately set to work in making sure every St Dunstan's child had a deep rooted love for her subject and, in particular, a love of reading for pleasure. She was excited about taking on the challenge of this post and especially about working in a community school where she could get to know every child and make a significant difference to improving individual lives.

Teaching English has always been her passion but her commitment to education and her personal drive for supporting students was soon noticed by the then Headteacher Keith Howard who promoted her quickly to Assistant Headteacher in charge of Teaching and Learning. From there, Lynda worked her way through a range of Senior posts through Deputy Headteacher and Designated Safeguarding Lead to eventually Headteacher in 2021. In that journey, Lynda has maintained a very serious and unwavering ambition that every child in her care is safe, happy and provided with the best educational experience they can have. And it is clear that Lynda has succeeded in every one of these ambitions.

Lynda leaves the school in an extremely strong position going forward. This is perhaps best captured in our recent grading of a strong Good at Ofsted, which commented how well the school 'create[d] pupils who are aware, engaged, active and able to contribute positively to a rapidly changing world'.











Lynda was very proud of this report but (as is typical of her character) will shy away from any personal credit, insisting that it reflects the hard work, commitment and drive of the community as a whole.

Another mark of her great success is the significantly rising role Lynda leaves the school. When she joined in 2014, the Year 7 intake was just 44 students across two tutor groups and there was a serious concern about the school's long-term viability. In 2024 that number is now 132 across five tutor groups for Year 7, meaning that more parents than ever are deciding that St Dunstan's School is their first choice. This is perhaps Lynda's proudest achievement as it clearly demonstrates she has created a school that is respected, trusted and considered the best educational experience for the children of Glastonbury.

Since she announced her retirement, the school has been inundated with well wishers from students and parents alike, clearly reflecting the huge respect with which she is held amongst the whole community. To staff she has always offered an open door, generously giving her time to listen to problems, concerns and offer sound guidance and meaningful support. In this capacity, she has earned a reputation as something of a problem fixer with a keen eye for spotting imaginative and successful solutions to difficult problems... and there have been a few of those.

To parents and carers she has been a trusted guardian of their children and someone who always listens with understanding and respect. She has also, at times, been called to step beyond her role as Headteacher, helping struggling families in difficult times, and we know that many in our community owe Lynda a personal debt of thanks for helping get their family and lives back on track.











And to the students of St Dunstan's she has always been their biggest champion and unwavering advocate. In every decision made, she has always put the needs of the child first, building a school where students are nurtured, protected and ultimately go into the world as successful and happy human beings with very happy memories of their time at school.

So in leaving us, Lynda leaves a huge legacy and, although we are delighted that she is finally taking the retirement she so very much deserves, she will be very much missed by us all.

We know that she is very sad to leave but that she will continue to take a keen interest in the school going forward. She is however very much looking forward to a full retirement being able to spend much more time with her husband and walking her dog - and not necessarily in that order.

I am sure that you will all join us in wishing her every success for her future and thanking her for her tireless efforts and commitment to our school over the past ten years.
















That's a wrap!














































Introducing the cast of Aladdin...

MNSP Trust Maths Challenge

The St Dunstan's Year 7 & 8 Maths Challenge Team are celebrating, having come top in the annual MNSP Trust Maths Challenge competition on Friday last week! The team of four: Jaime C, Oren M, August M and Spencer R did battle with eight other secondary schools in our MNSP Trust, armed only with their wits, Maths knowledge, and quick minds.

Leading the competition from start to finish the team of four performed magnificently, pursued closely all the way by the rest of the top five: Hayesfield Girls' School, St Mark's, Somervale, and Norton Hill (in particular). There were four rounds: Head to Head, Relay, Speed, and Fizz Buzz Pop, with the four students working either as a team of four in some rounds, or in pairs, or individually. With only a three point lead going into the final round, the St Dunstan's team just got enough points to keep Norton Hill at bay, finishing just two points ahead (216 points to 214).

Mr Conway (Maths Team coach) will be receiving the competition trophy, engraved with the winning student's initials, to display in the school trophy cabinet at the front of school at the end of term. Well-deserved congratulations go to all four of the St Dunstan's Team!

Well done everyone, we're very proud of you, and you should be very proud of yourselves!
















