Year 7 Corfe Castle trip

Year 7 undertook their Humanities field trip this term, travelling to Purbeck to visit Corfe Castle. Here they undertook an historical site visit so that they could understand the features of a motte-and-bailey castle and develop their knowledge of the Norman Conquest. They also looked at the geography of the area, looking at the social, economic and environmental factors that affect the area and developed their map skills.







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Students who went to Corfe Castle on Thursday had an added adventure - their coach broke down! Despite the almost two hour delay the Year 7 students calmly waited in the National Trust Visitors' Centre until the replacement coach arrived. I am very proud of how they conducted themselves and they showed Buckler's Mead at its best.

On Friday 26th September a group of Year 11 historians visited the Globe Theatre and the Golden Hinde in London to support their GCSE History studies of Elizabethan England. The students were bright eyed and bushy tailed at 6am for departure and were looking forward to visiting sites we had been discussing in class. Our first stop was the Globe Theatre where we had a tour of the theatre followed by a bespoke lecture on the history of the theatre linked to the GCSE course. The students enjoyed seeing how the theatre worked and they especially enjoyed sitting in the seats designated for the richest in society. In the afternoon, we walked along the Thames to Sir Francis Drake's flagship The Golden Hinde for a tour and workshop on the Spanish Armada. The students were able to get hands on with some of the weapons of the time and even had a go at raising the anchor. The Year 11 students were a real credit to the school and were praised by staff at both venues for their manners and good behaviour.

Maths matters

Why? Because mathematics develops our ability to think and problem solve and because problem solving is embedded in all aspects of life – it is part of all that we do. The brilliant mathematicians at Buckler's Mead Academy have started the year well. Students from Years 7, 9 and 10 delivered an amazing Escape Room during our annual Open Evening and delighted our visitors, young and old, with opportunities to think mathematically in order to escape MA3! A week later, eight of our very brightest Year 11 students attempted the UK Mathematics Trust Senior Maths Challenge, an

incredibly difficult task designed for students studying A Level Mathematics, which was met with enthusiasm and resilience. Some students even enjoyed it!





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SPARX Maths is a great resource in securing maths understanding and is used as a tool for securing proficiency through repeated practice at BMA. SPARX tasks are set weekly for students in Years 7-10, and all have a week in which to complete them. Check your emails regularly for updates and shout-outs.

United Kingdom Mathematics Trust's (UKMT) Senior Maths Challenge

In early October a group of year 11 students took part in the highly prestigious United Kingdom Mathematics Trust (UKMT) Senior Challenge. The UKMT Senior Maths Challenge is a 90-minute multiple-choice maths competition, challenging the best and brightest. It is usually taken by students aged 16-18 in the UK and around the world. It involves problem solving which requires the participants to think about rather than just know maths. This year over 100,000 students took part world wide. All of the BMA participants received participation certificates: well done to Rumaisa C, Hollie G, Elspeth H, Oliver L, David R and in particular, Lewis W and Ben K who were awarded Bronze certificates, and Hugo L who achieved the best BMA score and was awarded a silver certificate.

The next UKMT event is the Intermediate Challenge and this will take place at the end of January.

Here is an example of a question:

A 'complete' football kit consists of a shirt, a pair of shorts and a pair of socks. Three pairs of shorts and one pair of socks together cost the same as two shirts. Seven pairs of shorts and four pairs of socks together cost the same as five shirts. Eden has exactly the right amount of money to buy nine shirts. How many 'complete' football kits could be bought for the same amount of money?

Service children update

Poppy Kemp describes her experience of the expedition:

The first couple miles were fine, I'd been to places I hadn't before and to be honest it was quite refreshing, you get the scent of grass and the breeze was nice, my group was keen on getting through this. We made conversations and the atmosphere was nice as we navigated through the fields. Another couple miles came around (by this time we were about 3-4 hours in) and my feet really started to hurt, the ache wasn't too bad but it didn't go unnoticed. We reached an area with a fence we had to climb over and it was into an open field of horses! That was really the experience of a lifetime. We pursued the path making our way to the campsite and by then my feet were on fire. Of course not in a literal sense but they really hurt. My group made it there first and we set up our tents ready for the night! We cooked food and had a hot drink. I was away from my phone and socialising with others.
