It is nice to see the friendships developed in Nursery continuing, and the children have welcomed those who have come to us from elsewhere, creating brand new friendships.

This will provide the children with a unique space to learn, observe and perform over the coming months and years. What a brilliant start to the new academic year! Our Nursery children have come back after the holidays full of enthusiasm and we are so happy with how well they have remembered all their learning. We welcome some new additions to our cohort in both our younger 'Hedgehog' group and our older 'Squirrel' group.

Miss Wood is the key worker for our older children in Squirrels and Mrs McGroarty is the key worker for our younger children in Hedgehogs.

In Maths, we have been learning about colour, matching colours and naming them. We have learned the song: "I can sing a rainbow" with actions to reinforce our understanding. The children have been sorting objects and creating beautiful pictures. They have also been exploring colour mixing and linking their learning to the

story: "The Colour Monster" and our zones of regulation.

In Phonics, we have been learning and performing our rhyme: "Wind the Bobbin Up". We have been so impressed to hear some children have been singing the rhyme independently at home too!

Our quality texts include: "Home", "This is Our House" and "Usborne Very First Words At Home". We would love parents to share some photos of your home on Seesaw for a display in class. This would help encourage the children to talk about what is familiar to them and to share and discuss their own experiences!

What a wonderful first couple of weeks we have had in Conker Class! We have been enjoying spending lots of time getting to know one another. All adults have been observing to see how we can best support development for all our pupils throughout this academic year.

We have been exploring our resources both inside and outside the classroom. We have walked through the school halls practising our calm and quiet walking so as to not disturb other learners. We also got to see the big top playground where all the older children have their playtimes, where we will join them later in the term.

There has been some wonderful work created already in our classroom and we are starting to display it. You may have spotted that we have a wall displaying our Colour Monsters. We read the: "Colour Monster" book and used this to explore feelings, some we

may have experienced in our first week and some we may one day experience. From this we have also been exploring ways we can manage ourselves with these different feelings. Lots of children have been enjoying the calming corner.

We have been exploring what we are good at and what makes a good friend and are really looking forward to having everyone in full-time next week. We will be starting our Phonics and Maths learning and will be sharing some things you could do to support your child at home.

Chestnut Class



We've had a fantastic start in Chestnut Class and the children have returned to school with such confidence and enthusiasm to learn and explore in their new class.

We have been thinking about our golden rules, class promises and navigating our indoor and outdoor learning areas. The children have already been exhibiting their Christian values, especially 'Friendship'.

In Maths, we have been exploring subitising and place value to 10. This week we were inspired by the book: "The Button Box" which has helped us to think about different ways in which we can sort and group. The children have wowed me with their super snappy subitising skills too! In Science, we have been thinking

about different types of materials and we searched for these materials in the classroom. This theme ties in well with our English based on the traditional tale of: "The Three Little Pigs". Next week, we will start to retell our own version of the story and create story maps.

This week, we also enjoyed our first KS1 outdoor learning with Cedar Class. It was a lovely opportunity to work collaboratively with our Year 2 friends. There was so much learning - problem solving, Maths and team building! We can't wait for our next adventure!

Well done, Chestnuts for a super start to the term. You have all impressed me with your great attitudes to learning. Keep working hard.

Cedar Class





Class News:

Welcome to Cedar Class and what a fantastic fortnight we have had. It is such a pleasure to be working with you and your children again this year! We have been really thinking about routines and expectations so that we can flourish and support one another. Handwriting and presentation has been a key learning point and something that we are expecting the children to take pride in. They have applied themselves diligently to practising writing all the 'curly caterpillar' letters with an 'in' stroke. We are now looking at applying this in our daily writing. In Maths, we have started to think about place value, using a place value grid, using the terminology of tens and ones and recognising which bit in a numeral represents this. We have worked in groups to recognise amounts at speed

by putting objects into groups of ten and then counting in tens to identify how many objects we have.

In English, we have been looking at nouns: common, proper and collective. We have read our text for this term: "George and the Dragon" and identified other stories that we know have dragons as characters.

On Monday, we took part in our first Outdoor Learning where we thought about rules for safety and then worked collaboratively to make tens frames that showed how many of us were working in each group. We were very proud to see the children applying the rules as they worked independently.

A great start to 2024!

Class News:

What a fantastic first couple of weeks we have had! The children have settled back into school really well and have already done some brilliant learning.

In English, we have been looking at the traditional tale: "The Three Billy Goats Gruff". We started off the topic by reading the story and creating cardboard versions of the characters. At the end of the topic, we hope to have written our own version.

In Maths, we have started our topic on *place value*. We have been looking at representing numbers up to 100 and the different ways we can partition them.

In Science, we have started our topics on *rocks*. In our first Science lesson, we explored what a rock is and the similarities and differences between different types of rock.

Class News:

We have had a great start to Year 4! I have been so impressed with the children's attitude and enthusiasm for learning. They have all worked incredibly hard.

In Maths, we have been looking at our *place value* topic. The children have been partitioning numbers to 1,000 and estimating numbers to 1,000 on a number line. Next week, we will be looking at the thousands column on a place value chart.

In English, we have started our new book: "Charlotte's Web". We spent the first few lessons observing how the author has described the setting in the novel. The children spent time creating Wilbur's barn and finding examples of adjectives within the text.

In Science, we started our new topic on *Electricity*. The children had great fun experimenting with a variety of games that involve using electricity.

Finally, in History, the children were introduced to our new topic the Romans! I was amazed with the knowledge the children demonstrated in our lesson. We spent the lesson looking at different artefacts and summarising what this tells us about how the Romans lived. Next lesson, the children will be introduced to Julius Caesar!



The children have adapted incredibly well to the new routines and expectations that come with being in Year 5 and have really hit the ground running with all their learning.

In Maths, we have been recapping what we know about place value and have also been problem solving with numbers up to 1,000,000! Next week, we will be looking at ordering 6-digit numbers and rounding to the nearest 100,000.

In English, we have been studying the poem: "The Highwayman" by Alfred Noyes. We have been analysing the poem, understanding the storyline and



highlighting any poetic features we could spot. Subsequently, we have been writing setting and character descriptions, which will lead us to writing our own retelling of the story in the coming weeks.

In Science, we are learning about the Earth and Space this term. Last week, we studied evidence that indicated that the Earth is spherical and looked at historical theories of other civilisations. In the coming lessons we will be learning about the planets and the phases of the moon.

In History, we are studying the Ancient Egyptians. So far, we have started to learn about some of their beliefs and the importance of the River Nile to their existence.

A great start, Maple Class. Keep up the hard work!

We've had a great start to Year 6 in Redwood Class. In Maths, we have been learning about *place value* while in English, our focus has been on grammar skills. Our first history topic of the year is World War Two which is linked to our music topic - Songs of WW2. In PSHE, we have begun to look at the year ahead and set goals for Year 6 and our future. In Science, our topic is *light* and we have begun our lessons by looking at the direction in which light travels (straight). In PE, our topics for Term 1 are football and tag rugby.

Throughout Year 6 we will be fundraising to pay for the coach to our residential (camp) at Beam House in North Devon. As you know, we collected quotes for coaches, with the cheapest being over £2250 (£70 per child) so that is our class fundraising target. Friendship

At Trinity Church School, we believe it is important to develop core values by which to live and which help to develop a moral and spiritual awareness. We seek to explore the meanings of the core values and their significance through weekly acts of worship delivered by Reverend Izzard and members of staff. The gifts of compassion, trust, creativity, respect, friendship and courage are the values we want our children to leave with. Whilst these gifts are inclusive of human values, we try to anchor them into the Christian faith by relating them to the Bible through stories and readings.

The Christian Value we are particularly focusing on this term is Friendship. True friendship enables each person to grow and ensures that the unique individuality of each person is recognised. Christians believe that God's friendship towards us will last forever. Friendship is a partnership of shared experiences, talents, interests and enthusiasms. In school we will be thinking about how we can be friends to others and how we receive another's friendship, including God's friendship.

We will be linking Friendship to the stories of 'Jesus heals a paralysed man' (Luke 5), 'The story of Jonathan and David' (1 Samuel 18-20) and 'The story of Ruth and Naomi' (Book of Ruth)

What does The Bible tell us about our value for this term?

The Bible tells us that Christians believe they can call God their friend because of the relationship made possible through Jesus.

'You are better off having a friend than being all alone... If you fall, your friend can help you up. But if you fall without having a friend nearby, you are really in trouble' (Ecclesiastes 4:9-10).

At Trinity Church School:

- We support and encourage friendships by providing opportunities for our children to work co-operatively and collaboratively in pairs and in groups
- We find ways to support and include children who might be left out of friendship groups
- We help our children to restore broken friendships and promote forgiveness and resolution
- We help our children to know where they might receive advice and support if they need it

Our school community is special because it is made up of so many different people with different interests, beliefs and strengths. We are a community of lots of individuals together. This week's question really links with 3 core areas of our school vision: family, responsibility and global citizenship. We will continue supporting Lizzie's Soup Run, by assembling drinks packs to be distributed to the homeless community in Bath. This term we will use our annual harvest festival to collect supplies for the Somer Valley Foodbank. Our school council will also soon meet to discuss charities we wish to support as a school.
