Equalities team

Well done for some informative and interesting assemblies from the Equalities team this month. They introduced the country wide celebration of LGBTQ+ History Month which this year is focusing on medical accomplishments by people from this community.

Thank you for all of your support with our Annual Rainbow Day where the whole school dressed in different colours to create a wonderful St Mary's School Rainbow. We are proud to be part of the celebrations where we discussed different types of families and explored our Christian values of tolerance and respect.

LGBTQ+ Day at St Mary's

On Friday 23rd February, our school held an LGBTQ+ day. Each class wore a different colour: Y6-Red, Y5-Orange, Y4-Yellow, Y3-Green, Y2-Blue, Y1-Purple and Reception and Pre-School wore rainbow colours. LGBTQ+ month was from Thursday 1st February to Thursday 29th February.

LGBTQ+ stands for lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender and queer, the plus is for any other gender identities, expressions, orientations and variations in sex characteristics. The colours of the rainbow on the flag represent things as well: red for life, orange for healing, yellow for sunlight, green for nature, blue for magic and purple for spirit.

LGBTQ+ day is important so we can recognise people from that community and make sure we don't exclude them or offend them by being sexist and saying things like "You can't join in with us because you are transgender." It hurts people's feelings and upsets them so we need to make sure we don't say things like that.

The flag shows all the colours of the rainbow and it also represents transgender (White, Blue and Pink) and the importance of LGBTQ+ people of other races (Brown and Black).

The equalities team held an assembly all about LGBTQ+ and explained the importance of it. The equalities team said: In our assembly, we talked about LGBTQ+ history month and famous LGBTQ+ icons like Freddie Mercury. We also said what each of the letters stand for, L for Lesbian, G for Gay, B for Bisexual, T for transgender, Q for queer and the plus for any other genders or identities.

Ducklings



Class News:

Welcome back everyone after our half term holiday. The Ducklings have enjoyed reading the story of 'The Little Red Hen' in Literacy. We re-enacted the story and thought about the characters in the story. This week we have followed instructions to make Gluten Free bread. We mixed, measured and baked the bread. We loved tasting it straight from the oven with melted butter. We are getting very good at writing sentences, adding in finger spaces and sounding out longer words. This week we have written instructions for bread making.

We are learning about 'People who help us' this term and enjoyed our visit from the Mini Police and Speed Awareness Officers last week. We learnt about reading numbers carefully and how slowing down keeps us safe. We talked about crossing the road with a grown-up safely and not by ourselves.

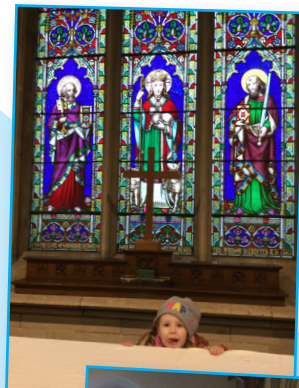
In Maths, we are developing our understanding of 9 and 10 and created our

own mini number books to support our learning. We have been using various apparatus - 10 bead strings, 10 frames, number fans to name just a few. We enjoy building numbers and teaching our puppet when he does things wrong.

In PE, we have been practising the fundamentals of movement. Hopping, skipping, jumping, balancing and travelling. Our PE session has changed to a Tuesday this term. The children loved taking part in the Emotions game this week. Once caught, you could only be set free if someone came up to you and made you laugh. It was lots of fun!

We visited the church this week as part of our learning about special places and we found a lot of crosses in the church. Rev Blewett spoke to us about how Christians pray and talk to God. We enjoyed looking at the stained glass windows in the church and watching the light shine through.

Rabbits



Class News:

Rabbit Class have come into Term 4 ready to learn! We are now over half way through Year 1 and the class have been showing just how independent and hard working they are.

In English, we have been enjoying exploring our new book 'Man on the Moon'. We have spent the last two weeks developing our comprehension skills by making inferences, exploring new word meanings, writing using new vocabulary and answering a range of questions about a text.

In Maths, we have been learning about place multiplication and division. We have been learning to count in 2's, 5's and 10's. We have used concrete apparatus, such as 100 squares, counters,

ten frames and bead strings, to support our learning. We have also been exploring how to make and add equal groups.

This term we have also started our new Design and Technology unit. Over the next few weeks we will be constructing our own windmills using paper cups and straws. So far Rabbit Class have designed and begun constructing parts of their windmills.

Finally, Rabbit Class enjoyed celebrating **LGBTQ+ History Month** by wearing purple clothing last Friday. We created a rainbow out of objects in the classroom and discussed the importance of being inclusive.

Class News:



It's been another busy start to Term 4!

Lots of learning has been taking place in Year 2 with the start of our new Maths unit on *Multiplication and Division*.

We have been learning how to use arrays to show different multiplication sentences and have started to use the division symbol when grouping. The children are enjoying learning their times tables and TTRockstars is a great tool to support this. We are progressing through the 10 times tables and then onto the 5 times tables so lots of practice at home would be great!

In writing, we have been creating our own list poems. The children have really enjoyed coming up with 10 strange items that they might find in a witch's purse. We tried to use alliteration and similes to make our writing more engaging.

There is a huge buzz around our Art unit this term. We are exploring *clay*. So far, we have learnt about how to shape clay through rolling, squashing and cutting. We have learnt how to join bits of clay using the score and slip technique and then smoothing the surfaces to create a seamless join. We made our own pinch pots last week using these skills which the children are really keen to take home.

We celebrated **Rainbow Day** last week and looked fabulous in blue.

We're really looking forward to **Book Week** next week and dressing up for **World Book Day**!

Class News:



What a fabulous start to Term 4.

In Foxes Class, we have been enjoying reading and writing poetry. We were inspired by the poem '*The Cave of Curiosity*' by Pie Corbett. We learned about alliteration, onomatopoeia and personification and used these elements of figurative language when creating our own poems. Such great learning. The children enjoy choosing and listening to poetry every day.

In Maths, we continued to learn about division and apply our knowledge of known multiplication facts to support our thinking. We are continuing to practise to quickly recall the multiplication and division facts for the tables we are learning. This year, we are focussing on speedy recall of the 3x, 4x and 8x tables. We have also been measuring in centimetres and metres. We had great fun measuring each child's height using metre sticks

and the playground using trundle wheels.

In History, we are continuing to learn more about the Stone Age. We focussed on the middle Stone Age and were fascinated about how their life had changed from the early Stone Age. We explored the replica artefacts in the classroom and we now understand how they made and used them.

During Design and Technology lessons, we have been exploring and naming the different parts of a *castle*. We will be designing and making our own castles in the coming weeks. In P.E. lessons, we are continuing with dance, with a focus on *line-dancing* this term.

Last week, we enjoyed dressing in the colour green on **Rainbow Day** to support our school's values of inclusion and acceptance of everyone.

We do not allow these to be worn in place of a standard blue jumper. They can be worn for Forest School sessions, PE lessons and for Breakfast & Afterschool Clubs.

We believe that if you dress smart you think smart

Staple items such as trousers, tops and plain jumpers can be purchased anywhere. However, if you wish to have items with our logo embroidered on, then you will need to purchase these online from Mapac. Pre loved items are also available at Timsbury Library for a small donation. We do receive donations of used but good condition school uniform at school, with the aim being to re distribute to families in need. Please see the office or Mrs Purnell if you feel this would benefit you.

Please help us by ensuring that ALL items of clothing are clearly marked with your child's name. We require all children to have a full PE Kit in school at all times, clearly labelled and in an appropriate bag.

Hairstyles

Long hair should always be tied back, particularly during PE. Children should not be sent to school with extreme haircuts or hairstyles. Hair bands must be white/black or blue, and fashion accessories including large bows are not acceptable.

Shoes and accessories

Shoes should be smart black school shoes and appropriate for school. Black trainers should not be worn as shoes. For safety reasons, children must not wear shoes with an excessively high heel to school or trousers with an excessive flare. Equally, only stud earrings are allowed and children should wear no other jewellery. All earrings must be removed before PE.

We do not allow nail polish to be worn in school.

Polite Reminder - Please Park Responsibly

Parents & Carers

Please can we ask that you park responsibly when collecting and dropping off children at the school. We have received several correspondences over the past couple of weeks with regard to the end of the school day and the illegal parking which is putting families at risk .

Waiting parents/carers are respectfully asked to observe parking regulations, as these are in place both to ensure student safety and for the benefit of the local community and other road users. Please be courteous to each other.

Drivers should not park near the school entrance. As well as anywhere that prevents access for emergency services, at or near a bus stop, opposite or within 10 meters of a junction, over a dropped kerb, and in front of an entrance to a property. Yellow zig-zag lines indicate the length of the road where stopping or waiting is strictly prohibited.

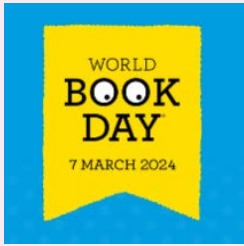
Reminder! Book week is next week! There is still time to enter our **Extreme Reader** competition! Just send a photo to your child's class teacher via Seesaw.

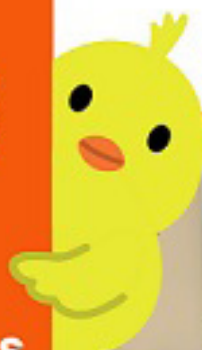
