# Our Inaugural World Bee Day Celebration!

We are buzzing with excitement to announce our very first **World Bee Day** celebration on **Wednesday, 20th May**. We are dedicating this time to teaching our children about the vital role bees and pollinators play in our world- and we need your help to make it a success!

## Key Dates & Activities

- Wednesday, 20th May "Bee Bright" Dress-Up Day**  
 Every child is encouraged to come to school in **bright floral colours** or classic **black and yellow stripes**. We'll be spending the day learning about honey production and how pollinators put food on our plates. Let's make the playground look like a wildflower meadow!
- Wednesday, 20th May: The Great Plant Donation**  
 We are asking each child to bring in a **pollinating plant** to donate to our school grounds, so that we are a haven for pollinators. Alternatively, please **bring a cake or bake** for the PTA to sell after school (proceeds will be spent on pollinating plants!)
- Thursday, 21st May: The Big Plant-Out**  
 In small groups, the children will help plant their donations, creating a permanent "nectar cafe" for our local bees.

## The "Bee-Friendly" Shopping List

To ensure our garden thrives year-round, we are looking for donations of **hardy perennials** (ideally) - plants that come back every year. These are robust, easy to look after, and provide food for our fuzzy friends.

If you are visiting a garden centre, look for the **RHS "Plants for Pollinators"** logo or try to find these favourites:



Best for Bees	Why they are great
Lavender (English)	A summer staple that bees absolutely adore. Very hardy!
Salvia (Sage family)	Beautiful purple/blue spikes that provide nectar for months.
Nepeta (Catmint)	Masses of blue flowers that are a magnet for bumblebees.
Echinacea (Coneflower)	Bright, daisy-like flowers that look stunning and are rich in nectar.
Sedum (Ice Plant)	Very hardy succulents that provide vital food in late summer.
Hellebores	Great for providing "early bird" food when bees first wake up in spring.

Alternatively, please bring a cake or bake for the PTA to sell after school (proceeds will be spent on pollinating plants!)

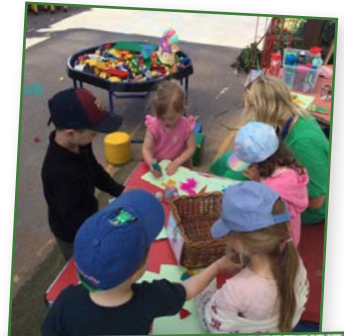
We have enjoyed returning to a spring walk and used our fantastic listening skills in sound time. We have been on a listening walk to help us tune into sounds.

## Class News:

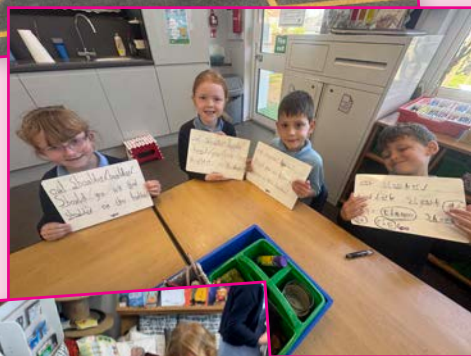

## Class News:

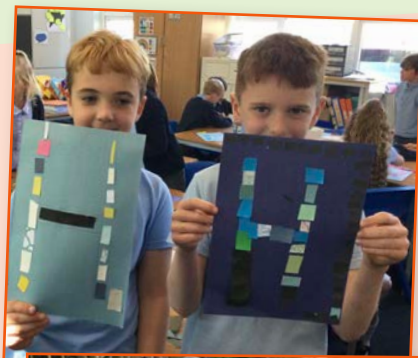
Badgers have had a brilliant first two weeks back this term. All of the children have been working very hard in all of their learning.

In Maths, we have been learning to tell the time, including o'clock, half past, quarter to, quarter past, as well as minutes past and minutes to. Badgers have really enjoyed using clocks to create and read different times on an analogue clock. Please feel free to continue practising this skill at home. This week, we have also begun exploring money, looking at the different coins and notes used in the UK. The children have been practising counting in pence and pounds, solving word problems and finding change.

In English, we have been reading "*Emily Brown and the Thing*". The children have written some fantastic diary entries about Emily Brown's struggle to fall asleep. I have been very impressed with the range of skills they have used, including expanded noun phrases, suffixes, contractions, subordinating conjunctions and similes.

In Art, we have begun exploring maps, using different media to create memory maps of our routes to school. The children have included both human and physical features, linking to our Geography learning from earlier in the year.

It's been another busy couple of weeks in Foxes! In Latin, we continue to enjoy our cultural lessons and created our own mosaics in the style of the Romans using colours in order to create a letter from our name.

Finally, we enjoyed a workshop all about how to manage the amount of time spent on phones. This provoked a lot of discussion and there were some nice group work activities.

# Lions

## Class News:



Our Year 4/5 Lions had a super time during our educational visit to the Bath and West Showground for the annual **Field to Food Learning Day**, where we all enjoyed the opportunity to gain a greater understanding of farming, food production and the countryside. There was so much to see and do.

Activities included representatives from Wyke Farms, the largest independent producer of cheese in the UK, talking to us about how their cheese is produced and showing us how they deliver the milk from their tanker to the factory. We were lucky enough to see a sheep being sheared and then we were allowed to examine the fleece afterwards. There were also plenty of opportunities to interact with animals on the day, with us being allowed to stroke some sheep, cows and pigs.

We also learnt about horticulture and planted some seeds. We saw a demonstration informing us of how

different breads are made. We had a close-up look at lots of large farming vehicles and machinery. There was also the chance for us to make our own Lego tractors which moved when we input instructions into a computer program.

There were two activities which were particular hits with the children. Firstly, we loved watching the gun dog display where Fig, a black labrador retriever, was instructed to find objects to bring back to her handler. It was incredible to see Fig understand and respond correctly to commands and whistles telling her to go left or right. Secondly, people from Purbeck Ice Cream showed us how they make it from high-quality local produce. And yes, we all got to taste it and try it for ourselves!

It was a brilliant trip and we all loved the opportunity to experience being farmers for the day.

# Eagles

## Class News:



It has been a quiet yet productive few weeks for our brilliant Eagles. They have started Term 5 with a calm, motivated attitude, showing they are ready to tackle the final stretch of learning before SATs.

In Maths, we have been exploring the properties of shapes, specifically calculating and classifying angles. The children have particularly thrived during the reasoning side of this topic; they have enjoyed the challenge of deconstructing complex "missing angle" problems, with several pupils likening the process to finding the final piece of a jigsaw puzzle.

Tennis is our focus for PE this term. Eagles have been mastering ball control in tight spaces and learning the precision required for both forehand and backhand strokes. I have been immensely impressed by their

patience; they are diligently honing these fundamental skills before we transition into full matches.

In Science, we have switched our focus to electricity. The class has thoroughly enjoyed building simple circuits and investigating how components like bulbs and buzzers function. We have been learning how to represent these physical setups using formal scientific diagrams and exploring the impact that changing voltage or adding extra components has on a circuit's effectiveness.

As we approach SATs week, I want to commend the Eagles on their incredible hard work and determination throughout the year. The time has finally come for all that effort to come to fruition. I have no doubt they will be absolute superstars!

## Thought of the Week

**'When I came to you, I did not come with eloquence or human wisdom as I proclaimed to you the testimony about God. For I resolved to know nothing while I was with you except Jesus Christ and him crucified.'** (1 Corinthians 2:1-2)

Lots of people are inspired by the legend of King Arthur and his knights. Glastonbury is visited by thousands of people every year in search of evidence of this legendary king.

One of the reasons I believe the story is loved so much is because of the image of the round table. Kings and leaders have often put themselves above their subjects and seen themselves as better than them. But in the story of King Arthur, he sits with his knights at a table where no one is the head. The king sees himself as an equal with the rest of his people and the table means that no one is seen as being better than anyone else. The table becomes a leveller.

In today's verse, Paul is writing to the church in Corinth. This was a difficult church at the time and there was confusion over truth and conflict between its members. There was jealousy in the church and those who were in leadership or seemed to know more were behaving arrogantly towards others. Not a good advert for the church - then or now!

Paul focuses instead on the Good News of Jesus. Unlike the world that often focuses on wealth, popularity, education or appearance, Jesus lived and died for all, regardless of their status in society.

Like King Arthur's table, Jesus is the great leveller. It doesn't matter how the world views you, the Bible says that all have missed the mark and everyone needs God's forgiveness. No amount of money, likes, followers, botox or post-nominal letters will get you any nearer to being accepted by God. The wonderful news is that everyone can be accepted and valued equally in God's eyes because of Jesus' sacrificial love and death on the cross.

When I look at the image of the round table, I like to imagine that it is Jesus sitting there, surrounded by his followers. None of their wisdom, wealth or popularity matters, all that counts is that they are loved and accepted by him. All of us are equal at the foot of the cross.

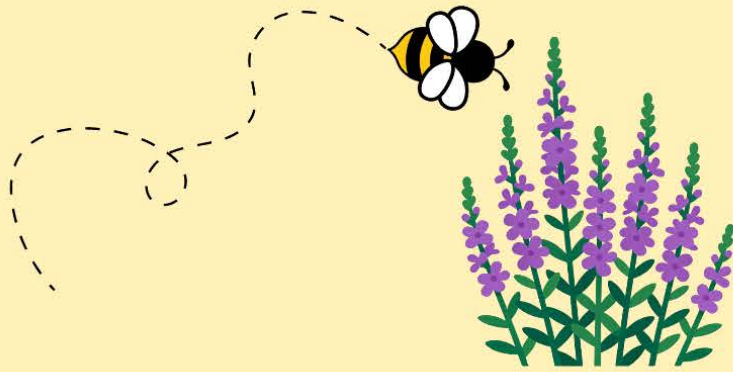

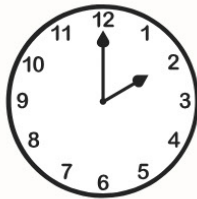

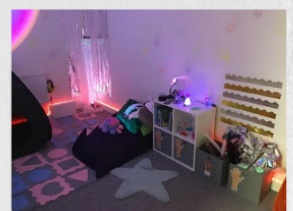
