The children have enjoyed learning about new roles, aspirations for future careers are being established. In Maths, our focus has been on reading and ordering numbers to 10 and beyond. The children are getting much better at finding and naming a digit when out of sequence and recalling a number that is one more or one less than a stated number.

In Art, we have continued our learning of colour by looking at the works of Kandinsky. The children have explored colour mixing and making marks with shapes. Rabbit Class has been having 'snow' much fun. We have been inquisitive scientists investigating which material makes the best fake snow. We had to plan our investigation and make sure it was a fair test. Ask your child about the results. We had to mark against a very specific set of criteria. We have also been bird watchers as part of the 'Big Schools Birdwatch'. We've been tracking the different types of birds we see and made bird feeders in Forest School.

Our Geography learning has been around weather, we have used Google Earth to explore the world. We found the hot and cold places of the world and have learned all about the equator. I was amazed with how much the children already knew about animals around the world!

As writers we have been learning to retell our class story 'Storm Whale'. We have used our impressive imaginations to come up with new ways to save the whale when it was beached. We've also been using ambitious vocabulary.

In Maths, we have been building numbers to twenty in multiple ways. We have challenged ourselves to find missing numbers and represent a number in as many different ways as possible!

## Lions **Class News:**



What another couple of fantastic weeks learning in Lion Class. In Computing lessons, we have been learning how to write and debug algorithms. We learned how to repeat commands using a count-controlled loop.

In Science, we enjoyed investigating air resistance. We ran across the playground with a sheet of paper and felt the air resistance pushing against the paper. We also made parachutes and investigated whether the size of the parachute affected the speed at which they fell. During our swimming lessons, we walked in the shallow end and felt the force of water resistance slowing us down. We made streamlined shapes to help us glide further through the water.

In Geography, we have learned that not all mountains are formed in the same way. We had great fun pushing paper together to make our own folded mountains.

We have used a range of different materials to create backgrounds to our portraits in Art lessons. We carefully considered where the colours would go and how the portrait will look when it is placed over the top. Some stunning results!

**Class News:** 



The Year 6 Class at St Mary's always visit 'Lifeskills' at some point during the school year. 'Lifeskills' is an interactive centre in the Create Centre in Bristol. It is built as a realistic village, designed to teach children how to deal with potentially difficult or dangerous situations in a safe environment. The programme of activities which takes place there is specifically aimed at the Year 6 age range and it aims to show pupils that they should be beginning to take personal responsibility for their own safety. As they are taken around the centre by the volunteer guides, the children learn how to assess risk and cope with difficult situations by being confronted by a range of different scenarios.

It was a valuable, enjoyable and memorable experience as the children negotiated their way through a myriad of different scenarios. They were faced with some 'dangerous' situations which included witnessing an attack in a dark alley, escaping a house which had caught fire and dealing with a casualty who had collapsed and was unconscious. They were then trained in how to phone the emergency services. Alongside these very serious situations were more general commonplace safety issues the children might be faced with during their everyday lives, such as how to increase their safety when out walking or cycling, when in the kitchen making toast or a cup of tea, and also how to identify and remove hazards in the home which could cause injury. There was even a Co-op supermarket there where the children learned to ask for a receipt and to check their change before leaving the shop.

It was a brilliant morning full of vital information which our Eagles found interesting and useful as well as good fun too. There is always a real buzz on the coach on the way back because everybody is excitedly sharing their experiences. The staff at 'Lifeskills' were glowing in their praise for our class, saying how engaged they were. Well done to all of our fantastic Eagles!

### TALK TOGETHER about Courage



### The Courage of David the Shepherd Boy

One day as David the shepherd boy was carrying lunch to his older brothers in the Israelite army he heard an angry booming voice thunder across the fields. "I am Goliath, and I dare you to pick someone to fight me."

The voice was coming from the Philistine ranks and went on taunting the Israelites and their God. As David grew closer he could see the giant Goliath strutting up and down. He could also see the terrified faces of King Saul and his soldiers. This made David very angry and more than a little ashamed. He decided he must go and see the king.

"I will fight that bully Goliath!" David announced.

It was all that King Saul could do not to laugh out loud. "You are just a boy David, a small boy. Goliath has been a mighty soldier all his life."

"But when the wild animals attack my father's sheep," protested David, "I fight them off with my sling and staff. I have killed many lions and bears and I will do the same to this wicked Philistine. Do not fear for God is on our side."

King Saul was taken aback. "Well, I suppose you should be given a chance. At least let me lend you some armour and a sword." But the armour was heavy and David was not used to it. He returned the armour to Saul and instead picked up five smooth stones from the stream and marched out **courageously** to face Goliath.

The giant laughed scornfully at the small boy and shouted curses at him. David did not flinch. "This very day you will be defeated and everyone here will see that the Lord does not need swords or spears to save his people."



#### Free School Meal Vouchers during February Half Term 2023

As you may be aware, over the last 2 years Bath and North East Somerset Council has provided funding during school holiday periods to support households with children who receive benefit related free school meals, by issuing vouchers to parents. The Local Authority is looking to provide similar support during this February half term.

Each voucher will have a value of £15 per child. The Household Support Fund that B&NES receives from the Government, is the funding source for these vouchers, and has restrictions on how the money must be spent. The February Half Term voucher system will be the same as previously used for the Christmas holiday period.

#### Please note:

Since Christmas we have worked with both the Free School Meals Team and Early Years Team, to ensure children/young adults that are no longer in receipt of Benefit Related Free School Meals are removed from the automated drop.

Parents/guardians affected by this data matching exercise will receive an email regarding this.

#### Eligible parents/guardians who received a voucher during the Christmas holiday period

Parents/guardians who received a voucher during the Christmas holiday period will automatically be sent an e-mail that will ask if you wish to receive a voucher for your eligible children for the February Half Term by clicking a hyperlink. This will generate a further e-mail which contains the select codes with links to the council's supplier, Hawk Incentives. This will then take you to a landing page where you will be presented with a selection of supermarkets to choose from, and a reward total which may be split by different supermarkets. Select codes may be added for each qualifying child to increase the reward total, and these will be issued to the value of £15 per child for the February half-term

Parents/Guardians will not need to reapply unless they have received an email following our datamatch exercise noted above.

Parents and Guardians should receive an e-mail during the afternoon of Wednesday 8<sup>th</sup> February 2023. If you have not received the automated e-mail by the end of that day, <u>please check in your</u> <u>Spam and/or Trash folder</u> before contacting the Benefits team on 01225 477277 (option 1).

## For parents/guardians who are eligible for Benefit Related Free School Meals but have not claimed a voucher previously

For parents/guardians who are eligible for free school meals but have not claimed a voucher previously, you can make a claim through the council's web portal which will open in the afternoon of 8<sup>th</sup> February 2023.

The web link below will request you to submit an e-mail address and some details about yourself and your child/children including your National Insurance Number. From this information we will cross check with the benefit related free school meals register and issue a code back to your e-mail address where applicable. This may take a few days to complete.

Once you have applied for vouchers, eligible households will receive Select codes with links to the council's supplier, Hawk Incentives. This will take you to a landing page where you will be presented with a selection of supermarkets to choose from, and a reward total which may be split by different supermarkets. Select codes may be added for each qualifying child to increase the reward total, and these will be issued to the value of £15 per child for the February half-term.

Once you have selected your chosen supermarket you may checkout via your shopping basket, and after having entered your name and email address, vouchers will be dispatched to your email address within 24-72 hours.

#### For all parents and guardians

Please ensure you are happy with your choice of supermarket **before** you checkout, as this **cannot be changed** once it has been picked. It is also very important that upon receiving your voucher for your chosen supermarket that you download and save it to your smartphone or computer, as replacements will not be issued. Full terms and conditions are displayed on the voucher.

## The select codes will only be valid for 2 months once issued, however once a chosen supermarket is selected the normal terms and conditions of that store apply, which range from 12 months to two years.

If you do not have electronic means of contacting us, then please phone the Benefits team on 01225 477277 (option 1) where you will be asked to provide the same data and a voucher will be made available to you via alternative means depending on your circumstances.

#### Easter Holiday period

The council can also confirm that it has secured the funding to be able to provide vouchers for the Easter holiday period. We will provide further details on this in the next term.
