TRINITY'S YOUNG AUTHORS

Over the course of the Autumn term pupils from Y5 and 6 at Trinity School Radstock and St. Marys School Timsbury have been part of *The Story Project*. The aim of the project is to collaborate to write and illustrate a children's story with published children's author and teacher Farah Downing. The children have been taking part in a series of creative workshops working toward a common goal: to publish a story that celebrates the local area and embraces the folklore and tales associated with that area. The aim of The Story Project is for children to learn that anyone can be a writer, designer, illustrator, publisher or printer. Farah previously pioneered The Story Project working with over 100 Y5 children from Cornish schools to produce & publish *"Tyrannosaurus Tate"*, a picture book about the famous art gallery. Her mission is to help develop children's creative learning experiences by working across art forms with children and young people to make something fresh and meaningful.

Class News:



We have been continuing with our story: "We're Going on a Bear Hunt". We all became storytellers and made our own version of the story using story maps. We went to many exciting and interesting places including soft play, the Outback, Unicorn Land and even under the sea to find the bear! One day we came into the nursery to find some bear footprints, so we decided to follow them and retell the story. At the end, we found a giant bear who was feeling quite lonely and sad. We invited him into Acorns and thought of ways we could make him feel better. After asking the bear questions, we realised he just wanted friends so we made him feel much better.

This week, we have been reading the story: "Lost and Found". We've been learning about the Antarctic, which is where the story is set: we created our own small world Antarctic and enjoyed playing there, using real blocks of ice for the penguins to jump on and off and slide into the icy sea. We became artists and painted some beautiful pictures of penguins. We also used our creative skills to make junk models of a rowing boat for the penguin and the boy, as unfortunately their boat had a hole in it.

In Maths, we have been learning all about numbers 1 and 2. We have made number biscuits, used our subitising skills to find 1 and 2, learned about Noah's Ark and made sure there were 2 of each animal. We also realised that when we used our Numicon we could make a number 2 shape using two 1s!

In Phonics, we have been taking part in listening skills games and continuing to build our knowledge of rhyme using *"Silly Soup"* and practising our blending and segmenting skills.

What a busy 2 weeks we have had! We hope you have a lovely weekend and we will look forward to seeing you next week when we will be celebrating Chinese New Year.

Class News:

Over the past two weeks, we have continued to focus on Kings and Queens; looking specifically at Queen Elizabeth I, Queen Victoria and Queen Elizabeth II, identifying who they are and what they introduced when they were ruling England.

Chestnut Class is currently in the process of writing a letter to the Queen, asking a variety of questions and thanking her for visiting them. We are hoping to get them in the post this week.

In Maths, we have been looking at counting-on within 20, using the language first, then and now, and solving two step calculations.

In Art, we have been looking at castles: familiarising ourselves with features of a castle, the materials they are made from and why. This linked nicely with our Science topic of *everyday materials*, which has involved the children testing many materials to find out the most suitable for Traction Man's wetsuit and outfit for the jungle. After three experiments, they concluded plastic would be best for his wetsuit because it is waterproof and it is a tough material. For his jungle outfit, we had different answers of denim and fabric because they are both flexible, thin to keep him cool, stretchy and comfortable.

In Maths, we have been learning to multiply two and three digit numbers by one digit numbers. The children have explored a variety of different methods and have discovered that some methods are far more efficient than others, depending on the question. How would you multiply 56 by 5?

Class News:

In Maths, Maple Class has had 2 weeks of long multiplication and short division which some children have found tricky. However, I have been so proud of their resilience and perseverance and the 'light bulb' moments along their journey! In English, we have started a non-chronological report about the fictional planet Pandora and its hexapods (6-limbed creatures). The quality of the vocabulary has been amazing and I look forward to showing you all the finished pieces.

As scientists, we have been exploring the solar system. We created a scaled model to understand the distance between each planet, made a 'pocket solar system', re-enacted orbiting planets and crafted our own orrerys to explain how the planets orbit the sun. We have recorded ourselves explaining the science, which links well with our Computing topic this term where we are learning how to be filmmakers. We have spent some lessons practising different filming techniques and soon we will be recording and editing our own videos. Keep a look out for them!

Maple have also been very busy at home being 'good citizens'. Lots of children are ticking off the boxes in their passports. We love seeing what you get up to, keep it up!

Class News: Redwood Class

Redwood Class has been learning Algebra for the first time in Maths over the last two weeks. At first, this was daunting for the children

but we have now realised that Algebra is nothing to worry about - Year 6 have taken it in their stride.

In our English lessons, we finished off our flashback narratives based on the *Piano* video by Aidan Gibbons. The children's writing brought a tear to mine and Mrs Hartrey's eyes. They were written with so much thought and emotion. We have started a new piece of writing: an informal letter home from an evacuee child during WWII.

We have continued to learn about WWII in History, focussing on two key questions over the past fortnight: *Why was it necessary for children to be evacuated and what was*

evacuation really like? and How did Britain stand firm against the German threat?

It's great to see so many children in Redwood Class ticking off tasks from their Citizenship and Character Award Passports. Thank you for sharing photos!



Thought of the week

Should rules be the same for everyone?

There has been lots in the news recently about the keeping of rules. We have encouraged the children to consider the above question and to debate this in their classes and collective worship.

We have explored the situation that Novak Djokovic experienced recently in Australia.

Djokovic had been given special permission, a vaccine exemption, to play in the Australian Open as he had recently tested positive and recovered from Covid-19. However, on his arrival in Australia, he was held in Melbourne airport for several hours before border officials announced he had not met entry rules and would be deported, meaning he would be forced to leave the country and his visa was to be cancelled.

Djokovic appealed against this decision and won. A judge in Melbourne ruled that he must be released immediately from immigration detention at a hotel. Judge Anthony Kelly said that the process by which his visa was cancelled was unfair and said he should be freed.

To talk about at home:

Thinking about rules in general, can you make a list of rules for different places and settings e.g. at school, at home, in a sport or at a club. What do you think would happen if these rules weren't in place? Can you think of any other examples or times where the rules may not have been the same for everyone? What happened? Do you think that it is important that rules are always the same?





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
