Thought of the Week

'And this hope will not lead to disappointment. For we know how dearly God loves us, because he has given us the Holy Spirit to fill our hearts with his love.'

Hope is one of those intangible things that many of us struggle with. As children, we're not keen about the idea of hope. 'I hope it doesn't rain on my birthday', 'I hope I get that new toy', 'I hope my brother/sister gets told off for something'. Coupled with the rather annoying "we'll see" when we ask our parents or carers for something, hope isn't secure like knowing something will happen.

Even as adults, hope can still be difficult, but now the things we hope for are quite different. 'I hope I can pay that bill', 'I hope our child will find friends at their new school', 'I hope mum/dad recovers and doesn't get any worse'. Our hopes as adults are often more serious, but the feeling is still the same. We want to know rather than hope.

I've noticed over the last 40 years that Christmas is definitely getting earlier and earlier. It isn't just fancy. In the 70s and 80s, decorations only started appearing in houses around the middle of December. These days, you'd be surprised to get as far as Remembrance day without seeing some houses with lights up. This year particularly, I have noticed several houses displaying what I have termed "winter lights" - lights that aren't necessarily Christmas lights, but certainly weren't up during Spring or Summer.

The reason I believe people want to start Christmas earlier is because it is the season of hope. Life is difficult for many of us a lot of the time and we crave hope. We need joyful times, peaceful times and a time of celebration. Lights, decorations and music can give us those feelings.

We desire to recreate those happy memories that many of us enjoyed as children and young adults and by lighting up the house, buying some festive food and inviting friends and family around for a drink we can manufacture an atmosphere that resembles what we once had and are often desperate to have again.

Today's verse is all about hope. When the Bible refers to hope, it is referring to something a lot more tangible. This is because it is paired up with faith. In the book of Hebrews it says:

'Faith means being sure of the things we hope for and knowing that something is real even if we do not see it.' (Hebrews 11:1 NCV)

This is about believing in a God who dearly and deeply loves us and trusting him regardless of what's happening in front of us. This 'faith' in an almighty God enables us to believe for the things we hope for, which may well change as a result of knowing him. That doesn't mean that everything will work out exactly as we want, but there is a reason for hope and a person to hope in. Because God became man and lived among us, hope is no longer intangible, hope is no longer disappointing. Hope is a sure thing.



And hope does not disappoint us, because God has poured out his love into our hearts by the Holy Spirit, whom he has given us.
