


Y3 and Y4 Smaller Schools Football Tournament




Acorn Class

Class News:

In Acorn Class, we have started learning the rhyme: "Miss Molly Had A Dolly", and practising the actions to link to parts of the rhyme. This is helping them to remember new vocabulary. We have been practising the rhyme in different voices - whisper voices, fast voices and slow voices. In Literacy, the 3 and 4-year-old children have been learning to spell their names by identifying the letter shapes in their name and putting them in the correct order to match their name cards. As part of their learning about Understanding the World, children have enjoyed continuing their learning around doctors and nurses and looking after each other as patients. They have been exploring what happens if they need a support aid or sling and noticing how this might affect their mobility.

In Maths, our 2-year-olds have been counting and singing number songs. Our 3 and 4-year-olds have been noticing changes in weight by comparing objects using a balance scale. The children listened to the story: "Dear Zoo" and compared the weight of the small world animals from the story. The children practised sentence stems such as 'The tiger is heavier than the frog' as well as having a go at explaining their





reasoning by using 'because' to share how they know this.

As part of our curriculum for Expressive Arts and Design, the children have been enjoying their Dance lessons with Libby. They have had the opportunity of getting to know Phoebe who will be their new dance teacher when Libby goes on maternity leave. We are very lucky to also welcome Becky's mum, Abby, into our class on a Tuesday afternoon. Abby will be teaching a range of skills to the children using a selection of materials. This term the children will be learning clay skills - they have made the most amazing Easter eggs which we can't wait to share with you!

We are still looking for volunteers to help refresh our Early Years outdoor area. If this is something you would be able to help with over the Easter holiday, please let Miss Wood know.

Conker Class





Class News:

We are midway through this term and the children are really working hard! Our Phonics is really improving - both as a whole class and individually, and this is reflected in the children's writing and reading. Many of the children are now writing sentences and some are no longer needing reminders for capital letters, finger spaces between words or full stops. For the children reading at home, the impact is evident on their reading development and we hope to get to this level for the whole class.

In Maths, we have been expanding to larger numbers up to 10 and exploring how they are made up. We have been learning about the various ways the number 10 can be composed of two smaller numbers - otherwise known as number bonds to 10.

Continuing our topic on *People Who Help Us*, we have had a few visitors to help bring our learning to life. We have been fortunate to have some of our parents come in to share their job roles with us. One was sharing her role as a Foster Carer, one a Veterinary Physiotherapist and another a Police Officer. We saw some items they use in their jobs. We were even lucky enough to get a peek inside a Police van!

The children all looked fantastic in their costumes for World Book Day - Conker Class' focus for the day was fairytale stories. We read: "The Gingerbread Man" and spoke about the characters and setting of the story. We carefully followed the instructions to make our own gingerbread people.

Unfortunately, whilst our backs were turned, the gingerbread people had escaped! We had a visit from Policeman Pete showing us photo evidence of them escaping. We discussed where they might have gone and who they may have seen and discovered that they had sent us some postcards from different locations. They had quite a journey! They met the King and Queen, went on a pirate ship, met an astronaut in space, and walked to a castle to meet princesses. We decided to create a class book which told the story of their journey, we each wrote a page and made WANTED posters. Our writing was so amazing that Policeman Pete found the gingerbread people and returned them to us.

In RE, we have been thinking about this term's Christian Value - Compassion. We read the Bible stories: "The Lost Sheep" and "Jonah and the Whale" and discussed parts of the story where we felt that compassion either was or was not used. We related it to our own experiences of showing compassion towards someone. Some of us even stood up in assembly to share moments where they have shown compassion this week.



Another highlight was our big adventure to Bath to visit The Egg Theatre. Yet again, the children were super role models for our school and they showed exemplary behaviour on the bus and in the theatre. We enjoyed watching the show: *Sandscapes*. It was a great opportunity for the class to experience African music and dance as well as lots of fun with sand!

Our visit to the theatre has provided the children with the inspiration to write their own recounts of the trip. It has helped with retrieval of *past tense verbs*. We also had a visit from our Year 3 friends to Chestnut Class. The children shared their favourite fiction and nonfiction books. It was great to witness such lovely book talk from both year groups.



In Maths, we have completed our learning on *place* value to 50. However, we will continue to play games and revisit numbers to 50 throughout the term. This week, we have been exploring *length and height*. This is always a fun theme as we explore measuring using non-standard units of measure such as paper clips or bricks. Our next step will be learning to use a ruler to measure length and height.

In Science, we have continued to learn about *Plants*. We have been observing daffodils closely by learning how to use a magnifying glass correctly. We have been thinking about the parts of a plant and creating observational drawings of tulips. Next week, we will be doing some planting in our outdoor learning area so we can observe plants growing!

Wow - what a busy few weeks we have had in Cedar Class!

In English, we have continued to explore the story of: "Goldilocks and the Three Bears". We have enjoyed exploring this story in lots of different ways. We have retold the story, written diary entries in the role of Goldilocks and we are now planning and writing our own innovative versions of the stories.

In Maths, we have been continuing to explore *multiplication and division*. We have been using *arrays* to help us represent equal groups when multiplying and also the idea of grouping and sharing to help us divide. We are developing our problem solving skills to tackle problems in different ways.

We are really enjoying our computing unit this term, focusing on digital music. Each week we have been exploring an aspect of Chrome Music Lab and this has helped us to think about pulse, rhythm and also pitch. We are looking forward to continuing to explore this to make

In PE, we have been developing our ball skills, helping us move a ball with increased control. We have been playing lots of games that help us to dribble the ball in a variety of ways whilst trying to stay in control.

In Design and Technology, we were really excited to work with Mrs Robinson to create our pinch pots out of clay. The children designed their pots on paper and then created them using a variety of techniques to help add decoration and bring their visions to life.

Alongside all of this, Cedar Class has completed some quizzes as part of assessment week. The children have been absolutely amazing and I am so proud of their effort, hard work, determination and perseverance. Well done Cedar Class - keep up the fantastic effort!

Class News:

Last Thursday, we worked with Mrs Jones to make up just under 200 bags for the homeless. The children loved setting up the different stations of coffee, sugar, tea bags, stirrers and milk. Once they had done this, the children went around the room with bags and collected all the supplies they needed. The bags that the Year 3's helped to make up will be distributed within Bath to the homeless community.

In Design and Technology, we have been learning about seasonal fruits and vegetables. As part of this topic, we had the opportunity to practise our cutting and chopping skills and even had a chance to sample some of the different fruits at the end.

In History, we have been looking deeper into how we know so much about the Stone Age today and have been studying some of the artefacts the Stone Age people left behind. We have also begun looking at the Bronze Age and how this compares to, and transitions from, the Stone Age. So far we have learned about the developments in technology - eg. the tools, lifestyles and houses. As a treat for completing our assessments, we were able to watch: "Early Man" - a film all about a Stone Age tribe who have to defend their land from bronze-equipped invaders.

Class News:

It has been busy as always in Cherry Class!

In Maths this week, the children have been looking at *fractions*. We spent last week focusing on mixed numbers and improper fractions. This week, the children have been converting fractions and identifying equivalent fractions. This will be continued into next week.

In English, we have continued our story: "The Lion, The Witch and The Wardrobe". We spent this week analysing one of the main characters and writing a detailed paragraph about their personality. Next week, we will be describing the setting of Narnia using prepositions and expanded noun phrases.

This week, the children have been celebrating British Science Week. We spent one afternoon identifying

different habitats. The children went outside to see what insects they could find in each habitat. We also spent an afternoon looking at *adaptations* and the children picked an animal and researched how they adapted to their environment.

In History, we have been identifying and labelling the different kingdoms in the Anglo-Saxon era. This week, the children spent a lesson recapping their knowledge on Anglo-Saxons and creating a concept map.

Another busy few weeks in Cherry Class but the children have all worked incredibly hard - keep it up! Miss Jones





Maple Class



Class News:

It has been another couple of busy weeks in Maple Class, and the children have been working extremely hard!

In Maths, we have been learning about *percentages* and converting from percentages to fractions and decimals. The children have worked really hard on this and have shown great resilience with their learning.

To celebrate British Science Week, we have taken part in various investigations across the week, including looking at the impact of global warming on glaciers and also conducting an experiment on dissolving. For our regular Science lessons, we have been comparing and investigating properties of materials.

We have linked our English work to Science this week too, where we have been learning about zoologist and primatologist *Jane Goodall*. We have been conducting research on Jane and her work and have been creating some fact files about her.

In Music, we have been learning to play 12-bar blues using glockenspiels, whilst in Computing we have been creating vector pictures using drawing tools.

Class News:

Redwood Class

In Redwood Class over the last couple of weeks, we have been working really hard in Maths, Reading and Grammar. In Reading, we are continuing to make *inferences* and find evidence to match the judgements we have made. In Grammar, we have been looking at a range of grammatical concepts including *model verbs*, *pronouns* and *determiners*. In Maths, we have been

focused on problem solving questions.

In Science, our topic is Living Things and Their Habitats. We have been looking at different types of animals and their characteristics: for example, how mammals have fur/hair, give birth to live young, feed milk to their young and breathe using lungs; whereas birds lay eggs, have feathers and are warm-blooded.

In Music, Redwood Class have been exploring different Baroque composers and learning about different features they are known



for, including recitative, canon, ground bass and fugue. Last week, the children learned about Henry Purcell, an English composer born in 1659, who wrote music for the theatre, church and royal court. Purcell advocated the ground bass a structural device where a melodic ostinato is played in the bass part (usually on a cello or its precursor, the viola da gamba) to underpin the music. The children then composed their own ground basses using the lowest notes on a glockenspiel. They wrote several bars using quavers which they repeated to form their ostinato.

In PE, we have been learning invasion games and netball. In PSHE, the children have been talking about their dreams and goals for Year 6, secondary school and their future adult lives. In History, we are still learning about Ancient Greece.

Thought of the week


