Class News:

In Acorns Class, we have been continuing our learning around our rhyme: "Miss Molly Had a Dolly". In Phonics, the children have enjoyed practising our rhyme in different ways with actions to help them remember and understand. We have been adding to our Word Wall and the children have been having a go at giving their own definitions for the new vocabulary they have learned.

In Maths, we have been exploring length, height, capacity and mass and the children have enjoyed linking this to their learning in other areas of the curriculum. For example, they have been creating beanstalks using their fine motor skills, growing and planting, pouring and measuring 'medicines' and weighing out the correct ingredients for Easter nest cakes.

As part of our Expressive Arts and Design, the children have enjoyed choosing potion bottles to colour during their exploring time, deciding whether to colour in their potion bottle full or half full, linking back to our learning in Maths. The children have also enjoyed creating signs of Spring, including playdough chicks and paper flower chains.

Thank you to all parents and carers who were able to join us for our Poetry Parent Workshop last Thursday on World Poetry Day. We loved performing our poem to you and sharing all our cat-themed crafts and stories linking to the poem. I wonder if the children can remember any of the poem to share with you at home?

Class News:

Conker Class were very excited to visit Bristol Aquarium. This term, our topic has been 'under the sea'. We have been learning about different sea creatures and their habitats and were so excited to have a chance to see these creatures moving around and interacting with each other. We loved finding out facts about them. Ask us what lobsters use their antennae for? How many hearts does an octopus have? How big is a giant squid's eye? What does a starfish and an axolotl have in common? The children's behaviour was impeccable, being great role models for our school. They loved sharing their learning in our class assembly this week. Another highlight has been our African dance workshop, where we learned a dance which is taught in Ghana. The children listened beautifully, followed instructions

carefully and were very proud of their final dance.



It has been a busy few weeks in Chestnut Class and yet again, all of the children have made me so proud!

In Science, we have been botanists! The children closely observed plants using magnifying glasses and then labelled the parts. We will continue our theme of plants next term and will be planting in the school grounds. Fingers crossed that we have some more sunshine next term!

We are coming to the end of our learning in Science about the digestive system and have also finished writing our explanation texts in English on this subject. Class News:

Last week, the whole school enjoyed a visit from the Afidance dancers and drummers. The children in Maple Class had the best afternoon learning how to dance and play the drums! If you haven't done so already, have a look at the videos posted on SeeSaw to see the children's fantastic dance moves.

In English, the children have finished our topic on persuasive letter writing and have enjoyed having time to complete a 'free write'. This week, we have also focused on writing a short-burst character description based on a character from our book: "The Explorer" (which we have almost finished).

In Science, the children have been learning about properties and changes of materials. After spending some time discussing the properties of different materials, they learned the difference between a *thermal conductor* and a *thermal insulator*. All of the learning built up to a fantastic investigation with ice and thermal insulators.

In PSHE, we looked at what to do in an emergency situation, including how to put somebody in the recovery position. Over the last couple of weeks in French, we have been focused on using French words to describe pets.

Everybody deserves fair pay for the work that they do. Today, there are still differences between the salaries of men and women, who do the same job.












We are free to make our own choices and pursue our own goals. At times, it is important to consider those less fortunate than ourselves when making decisions in order to make the world a better place for everyone.

IS MY CHILD TOO ILL FOR SCHOOL?

Coughs and colds: It's fine to send your child to school with a minor cough or common cold. But if they have a fever, keep them off school until the fever goes.

High temperature (38 degrees C or above): Keep them off school until it goes away.

Chickenpox: Keep them off school until all the spots have crusted over. This is usually about 5 days after the spots first appeared.

Cold sores: There's no need to keep your child off school if they have a cold sore. Encourage them not to touch the blister or kiss anyone while they have the cold sore, or to share things like cups and towels.

Conjunctivitis: You don't need to keep your child away from school. Do get advice from your pharmacist. Encourage your child not to rub their eyes and to wash their hands regularly.

COVID-19: If your child has mild symptoms, such as a runny nose, sore throat, or slight cough, and feels well enough, they can go to school. Your child should try to stay at home and avoid contact with other people if they symptoms of Covid **AND ALSO:**

- have a high temperature
- do not feel well enough to go to school or do their normal activities

What to do if your child has tested positive

Your child is no longer required to do a COVID-19 rapid lateral flow test if they have symptoms. But if your child has tested positive for COVID-19, they should try to stay at home and avoid contact with other people for 3 days after the day they took the test.

Ear infection: If your child has an ear infection and a high temperature or severe earache, keep them off school until they're feeling better or their high temperature goes away.

Head lice and nits: There's no need to keep your child off school or see a GP if they have head lice. You must treat the lice though.

Impetigo: Your child will need need treatment from a pharmacist or GP, often with antibiotics. Keep them off school until all the sores have crusted over and healed, or for 48 hours after they start antibiotic treatment.

Measles: If your child has measles, they'll need to see a GP. Call the GP surgery before you go in, as measles can spread to others easily. Keep your child off school for at least 4 days from when the rash first appears. They should also avoid close contact with babies and anyone who is pregnant or has a weakened immune system.

Scarlet fever: If your child has scarlet fever, they'll need treatment with antibiotics from a GP. Otherwise they'll be infectious for 2 to 3 weeks. Your child can go back to school 24 hours after starting antibiotics.

Sore throat: You can still send your child to school, but if they also have a high temperature, they should stay at home until it goes away.

Threadworms: You don't need to keep your child off school. Speak to your pharmacist, who can recommend a treatment.

Vomiting and diarrhoea: Children with diarrhoea or vomiting should stay away from school until they have not been sick or had diarrhoea for at least 2 days (48 hours).
