Thought of the Week

'Gabriel appeared to her and said, "Rejoice, beloved young woman, for the Lord is with you and you are anointed with great favour."

Last week, we looked at the significance of light and how important it still is in today's world.
Nowadays, we can function for much longer without sunlight because we have the ability to illuminate our homes by a simple flick of a switch (or of course we might prefer to ask Alexa!). It wasn't always like this and in today's chapter in the Christmas story, we might get a glimpse of just how dark times could be.

Little is known about the real Mary. It is believed that as she was pledged to marry Joseph, she is likely to have been about 13 years old, maybe even younger. People didn't live as long 2000 years ago and there was a high infant-mortality rate, so girls would be expected to marry and start families much earlier.

In these times you would be shamed if you were pregnant outside of marriage, something that was still a thing in this country up until the 1950s. So although the appearance of the angel would have bought lots of light, the message he shared would have led to some very dark times for Mary.

She would be pregnant without being married and according to Jewish law, she could have been stoned for this. It would have meant Joseph annulling the marriage at the very least. His family and possibly Mary's would have rejected her because of the unborn baby and she would have been scorned by the community, This would have meant that unless Joseph went through with the marriage, she would have been left to bring up the child by herself, with little money or resources - a woman couldn't easily earn money in those days.

But even with the fear of shame, poverty and possibly death, Mary responded with these words.

"Yes! I will be a mother for the Lord! As his servant, I accept whatever he has for me. May everything you have told me come to pass." (Luke 1:38)

A vision of light that could have led to a life of darkness. But still Mary was obedient. What a story of hope and love. Surely what this season is all about!
