

Badgers






The weeks are just whizzing by this term! In Maths, Badger Class are continuing to work hard on their 2,5 and 10 Times Tables and are becoming fluent. The children are also making great progress in their Number Bots and TT Rockstars activities and are working their way through the various levels which is great to see.


In Science, we have taken part in a series of lessons for **British Science Week** where we have learned about where our food comes from, the changes it goes through before it ends up on our plate and the impacts of farming and food production on the environment. As part of this, we baked bread, looking at how combining a set of different ingredients could create something entirely different. The Badgers confirmed that the result was pretty delicious.

Finally, we are very much enjoying our Art lessons this term, which are about *sculpture and clay*. We spent time making marks in the clay and learning how to shape and mould it. We then discovered that we could fix different parts of a clay model together using a *slip*, which is a mixture of clay and water that acts as the glue to join clay together. Using the *pinch technique* and *slip*, the Badgers made some excellent clay models.

In Maths, we have continued to learn how to *divide a 2-digit number by a 1-digit number* but this time with remainders. This is a tricky concept with lots of steps but Foxes have mastered this well.

We started our new History topic this week based on 'Ancient Britain'. We looked at Stone Age artifacts and guessed what they could be. This is related to our Art topic where we have been using charcoal to recreate ancient cave paintings.

Our PSHE lessons, for this term are all about 'Healthy Me'. We have been looking at how exercise keeps us healthy and how we must balance the amount of energy we expend with the amount we put in.

Another busy fortnight in Lion class.

In English, we have started our new learning - looking at a description of a 'New Planet'. We enjoyed creating and describing new creatures for this mysterious planet.

In Maths, our topic is *Understanding and Ordering Decimals*. We now have a good understanding of Tenths, Hundredths and Thousandths.

In Science, we had great fun designing, making and then testing Aqueducts. We used cardboard tubes and lined them with clingfilm. We also used different combinations of salt, sugar and water to create a de-icer. We tested our ideas on ice cubes and recorded which one was the most effective.

We have been considering Salvation in R.E. We have considered why Christians use bread and wine during communion, as well as other ways that Christians remember Jesus during Lent.

The children completed Assessments Week. I was impressed at how focussed they were and demonstrated excellent resilience. Well done.



We have also been preparing for the school's exhibition to celebrate British Science Week. Our learning has been about renewable energies and we have enjoyed increasing our knowledge of solar power, wind turbines, hydropower and tidal energy. Our main task is to design either a luxury house or a super yacht that runs on sustainable power. We hope you will be able to come and have a look at our designs next week.

Our current unit in PE has been brilliant. We have been working in groups to create dances on the theme of 'Stamp, Clap'. We had to base our routines on four phrases and then creatively add to them to develop entertaining, visually-impressive and tightly synchronised pieces of choreography. The results were superb and we even managed to perform them in front of a live audience of Y1 Rabbits and Y2 Badgers who were very impressed. We are now moving on to our next Dance unit which is on the theme of Bhangra so that should be great fun too.

Finally, our recent work in Languages has focussed on mythical monsters and where the names of some real and fictional creatures come from. We played a game of Name That Beast and then learned the meanings of their Ancient Greek names. Did you know? 'Hippopotamus' means 'horse river',' 'dinosaur' means 'terrible lizard', 'amphibian' means 'both living' and 'pterodactyl' means 'wing fingers'. We then created our mythical monsters by combining two Ancient Greek root words to make brand-new fictional creatures.


We will be displaying all of our hard work from Science week before school and after school in the hall on **Thursday 23rd March**. Please come and join us either before or after school.
