World Autism Awareness Day

World Autism Awareness Day 2024 was on the 2nd April but, since that was in the Easter holidays, here at St Mary's we think it is an important thing to know about so we celebrated it on the 26th of April instead. The whole school came in blue clothes to celebrate autism. You can read on to find out more about autism.

What Is Autism?

Autism is a developmental disability caused by differences in the brain. One in one hundred people have autism. Autistic people sometimes see the world differently to non-autistic people. Autism can affect their senses such as hearing and sight; they may have sensory/fidget toys to help them calm down when they feel angry or sad. Some autistic people flap their hands; this is called stimming. They may be quiet or repeat things. Some are non-verbal which means they can't speak.

But Why Do We Celebrate World Autism Day?

We celebrate World Autism Day to raise awareness for those with autism and to make sure they live a full and meaningful life just like those who do not have autism. We need to help children and families so they

can attain the help and support they need in order to look after their children or themselves. The reason why we celebrate with blue is because the colour is associated with calmness and acceptance!

Interviews

Here you can read about first-hand experience quotes of some of the autistic people in our school.

One pupil said: "It can sometimes be annoying because sometimes I do things and I can't stop doing them. I have some challenges because I try really hard not to get angry. I go to my room and sit with my teddies and when I'm not angry I go downstairs. I like being autistic because I kind of like being different because it means I am unique."

Another pupil of our school said: "Sometimes it can be hard because my vision and my hearing can sometimes make things too loud. I just like being me. Really, just being different is the best bit of autism."

Those were some lovely quotes!

We think it is always important to celebrate differences and remember that people who have autism or are different to us should be treated the same way as everyone else, no matter what!

Class News:

Finally in History, we have been learning about Mary Anning and her discovery of fossils. So far we have had a go at being palaeontologists by digging for fossils in sand. We have also explored who Mary Anning was by creating a fact file.

In History, we have been learning about the different types of jobs for people working in the Victorian mines. At first, Badgers liked the idea of not going to school during the Victorian era but quickly changed their minds when they worked out what the alternative was!!

Class News:

What a lovely couple of weeks.

In Fox Class, we have started our new text, *"The Iron Man by Ted Hughes"*. The children have been learning to express time and place using conjunctions and used them effectively in their writing.

In Maths, we have continued our learning about fractions. The children enjoyed looking at equivalent fractions using the Maths resources. They have also learned how to add and subtract fractions which have the same denominator - well done. The children have continued to make progress learning multiplication and division facts.

In PE, we have been learning how to send and receive the ball, making sure that we stay in control. We practised with our hands, remembering how to be ready to catch the ball, and with our feet where we thought carefully about which part of our foot to kick the ball with.

In Art, we created artwork inspired by the artist *Maud Purdy*. First, we made rubbings using wax crayons and different textured items from the classroom. Next, we tore the rubbings carefully into different shapes and finally, we arranged the shapes to create beautiful flower inspired artwork. The children were really proud of their artwork.
