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Thought of the Week

'When they saw the star they rejoiced exceedingly with great joy.' (Matthew 2:10)



'The Adoration Of The Magi' - James Tissot (1886-94) During advent we have been thinking about light. We have focused on the importance of light and we have noticed that light is celebrated all over the world, in different countries and cultures.

When it comes to thinking about the wise men, or magi, the Bible tells us that they followed a great light in the sky. Modern day theologians think that this "star" may have been the conjunction of two planets, Jupiter and Venus, and one star, Regulus.

Though light was probably important to these



men, it wasn't the star itself that they were pleased about, it was *who* the star was pointing to. And if it was a conjunction of Jupiter, Venus and Regulus, this is also significant. Jupiter is often referred to as the God of Heaven or King of the Gods. Venus is often associated with love and beauty. Regulus in Latin means "little king" and it is located in the constellation Leo. So it is literally the little king in the heart of the Lion.

Although light was important, for the Magi, being enlightened was what led them to Jesus. They would have understood the significance of these 'heavenly bodies'. Scholars believe that they may have travelled for up to 1000 miles to get to Bethlehem. This could have taken them 5 months, which is a return journey of almost a year! And although these men were wise priests (the literal meaning of magi), who would have been well respected leaders and with some degree of wealth, they got down on their knees, with their faces to the ground and worshipped the infant Jesus. The original Hebrew suggests that they worshipped him as a king, giving him the same civil honour and respect as they would have done for their own kings and princes.

What led them to do this? It's one thing for some local shepherds to come wandering in to see the arrival of a new baby boy, but these men were prepared, committed and determined and they had great foreknowledge. And they weren't just happy. One translation says 'they rejoiced exceedingly with great joy'. This is serious jubilation!

Christmas is often seen as a season of joy. But if we end up putting our hope in the wrong things, that joy doesn't remain. Once the presents have all been unwrapped, the decorations are all down and our family have all gone back home, there doesn't seem to be much left to be joyful about.

Let's hope that this year, some of the joy the magi experienced at discovering Jesus might rub off onto us and we might realise that there is something eternal that is worth getting excited about.
