Acorn Class



Class News:

Our topic this term has been once upon a change. The children have been observing changes in the world around them such as the sunny weather and planting and growing sunflowers. Thank you for all your donations to support the children's learning about plants too! Over the last couple of weeks in Acorn Class, we have been learning the rhyme: "Mary, Mary Quite Contrary". The children have practised actions to support their language development and our younger children have joined in copying sounds, rhythms, tunes and tempo. Our older children have been developing their phonological awareness by spotting and suggesting rhyming words, counting and clapping syllables

in words and recognising words with the same initial sound. The children have made flower crowns linking to our topic and our rhyme!

In Maths, we have been learning about 2D and 3D shapes. The children have been exploring properties of shapes through their play, recognising shape names through group activities and learning shape songs. The children have had a go at making 2D shape models, made pictures with paper shapes and built models with 3D blocks, such as bridges.

I hope you all have a wonderful half term break and look forward to welcoming the children back in Term 6!

This week, we had a trip to Court Farm in Banwell. We were so lucky to have had such a wonderful day. We met Farmer Ed who walked us around his farm and introduced us to his sheep with their lambs, the goats and their kids, the donkeys, the Shetland ponies, the cows with their calves, pigs and even emus! Alongside our learning about the animals and life cycles, there has been lots of focus on caterpillars and how they grow into butterflies - this has sparked an interest in insects. We got the clay out and discovered that we have some talented artists in the class making their own insects out of clay!

Class News:

Wow! Where has the term gone? I can't believe how much we have achieved in Cedar Class in such a short term.

In English, we have continued to be inspired by the story: "Meerkat Mail" by Emily Gravett. We have explored the features of postcards and written our own in the role of Sunny the meerkat. We have had some amazing writing with the children working hard to stretch out their ideas.

In Maths, we have been tackling the concept of time. We have revisited o'clock, half past, quarter past and quarter to times. We have also been looking at times to 5 minute intervals and have enjoyed working practically with the handheld clocks.

This week, we finished our programming work in Computing. Cedar Class worked hard in pairs to create an interactive quiz using all of their coding skills this term. We particularly enjoyed working together

to 'debug' errors in our codes.

We have been really lucky to have coaches for our PE this term and in our tennis workshops we have been developing our coordination skills. We have also worked hard to use different strokes including forehand and backhand strokes. It has been lots of fun to develop our skills in the beautiful sunshine too!

Our PSHE work this term has been all about relationships. We have thought carefully about the different relationships we have in our lives and how sometimes we can experience 'conflict'. The children have shown sensitivity when discussing causes of conflicts in relationships and even suggested fantastic strategies to help in these tricky moments.

I am really proud of Cedar Class this term. I hope you all have a fantastic and well-earned break.

Willow Class



Class News:

In Computing, we have been classifying and grouping different objects. This has helped us to identify different ways of sorting them and gathering data. We have also learned about the different question types we can use for gathering data - ie. *open* and *closed*.

In Science, we have enjoyed carrying out lots of different experiments. For the first experiment, we planted four sunflower seeds and put them in different conditions to see which would germinate and grow into the healthiest plant. This experiment is ongoing and we are currently monitoring progress weekly. Another experiment we have carried out was to help us understand how water transports up through the roots and stem to all parts of the plant. To do this, we put celery in coloured water and left it overnight. When we came into school the next day, the leaves on the celery had changed colour!

In Music, our focus has been the Vikings. We have seen how the Vikings were disciplined and worked as a team, implementing that in our singing. We have learned a new song called "Dragon Ships" and composed our own battle songs by reading and performing rhythmic notation.

We have had another great term in Willow Class and I hope you all have a lovely half term break.

Our RE focus has been *Humanism* and how it might differ from religion. We have also been looking at the *Big Bang* - ask us what we know about it.


As Mathematicians, we have been working on turning fractions into decimals and the children have really worked hard on this.

Yesterday, we were so excited to go on our trip to the Ancient Technology Centre, which linked in with our learning on the Vikings. We had the best time and it was wonderful to see the children engaging in activities they have never done before, such as felt making and blacksmithing!

A vehicle once used by Pope Francis to wave and greet people - called a popemobile - is being turned into a mobile health clinic for children in Gaza. Pope Francis, who recently passed away, was the head of the Catholic Church and often spoke about helping others. One of his final wishes was to help children affected by the conflict in Gaza. This vehicle will be refitted with medical equipment, as found in ambulances, so it can be used to aid children in areas where hospitals may be hard to reach. The project aims to deliver essential medical care to those who need it.
