Thought of the Week

'All Scripture is God-breathed and is useful for teaching, rebuking, correcting and training in righteousness, so that the servant of God may be thoroughly equipped for every good work.'

(2 Timothy 3:16-17)



I was challenged this week by a comment made by a comedian on a popular celebrity panel show. When discussing the use of language within the Bible, they misunderstood the facts being presented and came out with the sarcastic comment 'Are you saying to me that there's something in the Bible that might not be exactly real?'

The person in question knew that this comment would be popular and was rewarded with resounding applause from the audience. Although, had the panel show been discussing language within the Qur'an or some other Holy Text, I'm not so sure that they would be so keen to mock.

The Bible is viewed by many as something that can be mocked and joked about. "It's all a load of nonsense, isn't it really. I mean the texts are so old now so how do we know they are accurate and weren't just made up."

The same could be said about most other documents from history. The quote 'History is written by the victors' is often attributed to Winston Churchill, although its origins are unclear (even the quote about whether historical documents are inaccurate is inaccurate!).

When it comes to knowing how much truth we should accrue to 'historical documents', there is a lot of discrepancy. But certainly in the case of the Bible, there is some evidence that stands up to historical scrutiny.

Firstly, there are literally thousands of Biblical manuscripts. There are no original writings of

Biblical books, because these would have been written on animal skin and other materials that have deteriorated, but there are an incredibly high number of copies of original Biblical writings. It is the best attested document of all ancient writings, with its closest contender being Homer's *The Iliad* with only 600 existing copies.

Secondly, archaeology has repeatedly confirmed the accuracy of Biblical places, events and people. Thousands of archaeological finds have corroborated the accounts of the Bible, and such evidence quickly puts an end to allegations that the history recorded in the Bible is suspect.

Thirdly, the original writings were faithfully preserved. The Dead Sea Scrolls discovered in the 1940s allowed scholars to compare Old Testament manuscripts that were separated by hundreds of years. This included a newly discovered copy of Isaiah which predated the earliest known copy of the book by 1,000 years. When the documents were compared, they were nearly identical, except for some minor spelling or stylistic differences, showing just how faithful the scribes were when copying the Scriptures.

Finally, the New Testament itself was written shortly after the events it recorded. All four gospels were written 40-60 years after Jesus' resurrection and Paul's letters to the Galatians and Ephesians were likely to have been written 15-20 years after the time of Christ. These dates are remarkably early for ancient documents and because of the close proximity to the actual events, the writers would have been in a position to know if they were true or not. There would have also been living eyewitnesses who could have discredited these texts if they weren't accurate.

So maybe not everything in the Bible is true, but as a 66 book document it does seem to stand up to some historical scrutiny.
