Class News:

This week, as part of our learning around shapes in Maths, we have been doing lots of activities. We have been making fruit kebabs the children described the different characteristics of the fruits in terms of their shape. We also asked the children to count up to 5 the number of pieces of fruit they used for their kebab.

The children have also been modelling play dough using different cutting and rolling tools to make lots of different shapes. We went on a shape hunt around the Nursery, describing which shapes we were able to find.

As we hit the growing season, the children have been carefully planting lots of fruit and vegetables around the outdoor area. Runner beans, peas, tomatoes, lettuce, strawberries as well as some sunflowers have all been planted. The children will be responsible for watering and tending to the plants over the coming weeks to ensure we get lots of juicy produce.

To raise funds for Early Years, we have been busy baking and decorating cakes which we have been able to sell across the school during break times. Using their Maths knowledge, they carefully measured the ingredients before all taking turns to stir the mixture. After coming out of the oven, the children then creatively decorated each cake with colourful icing and sprinkles.

Conker Class



Class News:

Throughout the year, Conker Class has been sharing their show and tells with us, which have been focused on what they would like to be when they are older. We have heard brilliant facts about their future careers.

This week, we were lucky enough to be joined by Oxana (Aron's mum) who is a photographer. We learned all about the special equipment which a photographer would need and looked at beautiful photographs which were captured by Oxana. We also found out about the different effects that could be made using glass prisms, torches and even mist spray. We were lucky enough to have a demonstration to see it in action. Conkers were absolutely fascinated by the role of a photographer and asked wonderful questions to find out more. Next term, we will be joined by Felicity's mum.

We have been thinking about the life cycle of a caterpillar in class. We have watched the class caterpillars grow and then build their cocoons for the chrysalis stage. Over the past week, we have had three separate releases of the butterflies that emerged - we learned that these were called *painted ladies*. It has been a privilege to see this amazing transformation.

In Maths, we have been looking at *symmetry* and what this means. We have folded paper in half to create symmetrical butterflies and used a variety of resources to make our own patterns. The children have really understood this concept and we have been blown away with how they can apply this.

In Science, we have been thinking about *minibeasts*. We went on a bug hunt and collected lots of slugs, ants and woodlice. It was harder to find spiders and we couldn't find any ladybirds. The children as a class were able to suggest 23 different types of minibeasts! We looked at what makes an insect an insect - it has to have 3 body parts, a head, a thorax, an abdomen and 6 legs. We sorted the minibeasts that we could name into 'insect' and 'not insect', created our own versions using loose parts and then drew them. The children's ability to grasp new vocabulary never ceases to amaze us.

We hope everyone has a lovely half term and look forward to welcoming you all back for the last term in Conker Class. Mrs Vivian









In English, we have been continuing to re-tell our own amazing versions of: *"The Queen's Hat"*. What super writers we have in Chestnut Class! This week, we have been using similes, verbs, onomatopoeia and exclamation marks to create interesting stories. It is so lovely to see the children writing with such care, creativity and enthusiasm.

In Maths, we have been doing lots of practical exploration to support our understanding of numbers to 50 and beyond. We have been thinking about the amount of tens and ones in numbers. We have been grouping objects into tens, counting in tens and singing about tens numbers!

In Science, we have continued to observe the changes in our sunflowers by measuring their growth and making observational drawings. We have been measuring and recording the temperature using thermometers and writing about the weather. The children have loved taking turns to water the sunflowers too!

In Geography, we have really enjoyed making gardens from natural resources. The gardens helped us to plan and create our own maps using symbols and keys. We have also been looking at aerial views and maps of London landmarks to help us with our writing based on: *"The Queen's Hat"*. We have also been continuing to remember compass points.

Thank you to everyone in Chestnut Class for all your hard work and fantastic learning this term. I am so proud of you all. Have a super holiday and enjoy the sunshine.

This week, we have been blessed with some wonderful warm weather so we have used this opportunity to take many of our learning activities outside.

In our Maths and SPAG lessons, we have utilised our orienteering equipment, finding location points and answering quiz questions. We have come to the end of our topic on *fractions*. The children have been focusing on ordering unit and non-unit fractions as well as understanding equivalent fractions. Next term, we will continue our topic on fractions, but focus on adding and subtracting fractions with the same denominator.

In English, we have finished our holiday brochure! We spent a lesson focusing on experimenting with sentences - the children had great fun adapting and adding detail to their writing. This week, the children have been conducting a supported free write - they have spent time planning and writing a holiday brochure for their Skara Brae hotel.

In Science, we have come to the end of our plant topic. The children conducted an exciting experiment based on *transpiration* using celery sticks and coloured water. This week, we looked at how plants adapt to their environment and survive in different weather conditions. Next term, our new Science topic will be on *rocks*.

THOUGHT OF THE WEEK



Whilst Redwood Class have been away enjoying the great outdoors and taking a break from screens, we have been thinking about the impact the internet has had on our lives. We have also thought about how we stay safe online and whether or not we should trust everything we read on the internet.

30 years ago, on 30th April 1993, Swiss science company CERN opened up the World Wide Web to the world, freeof-charge. The 'collaborative information system' was being used by the scientists at CERN (the European Organisation for Nuclear Research) to communicate, without delay, across countries and continents but deciding that there could be wider uses for the tool, they made it available for everyone.

How does this link to our British Values and Protected Characteristics?

Things to talk about at home:

- How often do you access websites online?
- Are there any particular sites that are your favourites?
- What about others in your home?

Talk to someone older, who can remember a time before people had access to the World Wide Web. Ask them how things were different.
