

Parent Survey 2022-23 Update

This week we are reviewing our second main area of concern from last year's Parent Survey:

Concern 2 was about behaviour in school.

We set out to bring better all-round clarity to the school's behaviour policy for staff, children and parents - this included clearer steps as behaviours escalate (the 'strike' system) and the involvement of parents at a much earlier stage.

The main outcomes have been two-fold: Firstly that general behaviour in class and around school has improved allowing the vast majority of children to be able to learn without disruption, and secondly that it has meant we have been able to more clearly identify some children who may have additional unmet needs and therefore require further support to be able to have the best school experience for themselves. We have been more able to call in specialist support for a number of children despite the system around referring children being under extreme stress due to chronic underfunding. These changes have led to open communication that has helped a number of our children take greater ownership of their actions.

The Trust Director of Primary Education said that, during her visit recently, the behaviour was very good in classes and that children were all engaged in their learning.



Yesterday was Burns' Night, the night when many people in Scotland and around the world remember Robbie Burns. Born in 1759, he is best known for his poetry and is often referred to as the 'national poet of Scotland'. His poem and song 'Auld Lang Syne' is sung all over the world at New Year and he was also responsible for 'A Red, Red Rose', 'A Man's A Man For A' That' and 'The Battle of Sherramuir'.

Many believe he was an agnostic as he was very outspoken about the church. But what Burns had a problem with was hypocrisy. He was very critical of those who would make a show of their piety, who made sure everyone saw how "holy" they were and in fact, Burns was a man of faith and a regular worshipper.

Like Burns, Jesus was also outspoken about the religious people of the time. In the Bible, there are several incidents where the Pharisees, one of the Jewish religious groups of the time, would try and trap or trick Jesus, to prove that he was wrong. He would often expose and condemn their practices and behaviour, which is one of the reasons they disliked him so much. They were so obsessed with following the 613 commandments in the Torah, that they had little room left to show compassion for the poor and sick, people Jesus had plenty of time for.

However damning Burns may have been against the Calvinist Church, he would never have referred to its ministers in the way that Jesus spoke about the pharisees. In today's verse, he compares them to burial pits. Although tombstones can be beautifully sculpted and quite impressive in design, the grave itself is full of dirt, worms, bones and death. Jesus was saying that although the Pharisees may have been dressed well in all their finery, they weren't very nice on the inside.

Jesus is often seen as someone who was meek and mild, but it is clear that like Burns, he would challenge those in authority when necessary and he wouldn't pull any punches.

Sometimes we may need to challenge other people because of their behaviour or the things they have said. Although this may not be easy, it's good to know that we would be following in the footsteps of these two great men.

It's also interesting to know that Jesus managed to sum up the 613 commandments from the Torah into just 2 - Love God and love your neighbour.
