Class News:

Another fun and busy week in Conker Class.

We have been looking at *doubles* and *odds* and *evens* in Maths, solving lots of problems that involve addition and counting in two's. We can now work out how many characters we can have in a boat if we are only allowed 8 legs from the selection of cat, dog, sheep, hen, man and boy. How many ways can you find?

We had great fun finding out about our *senses*. We now know there are five, and can name them. We thought about how blind people read and practised making our name with *braille*. We played Chinese Whispers with some very strange outcomes to understand how important the sense of hearing is. Using our sense of taste, we had to eat different foods such as ketchup, mayonnaise and pickle and see if we knew what it was. Lots of children liked the custard but couldn't name it.

This week, we have started a new book called: *"Sun"*. We have learned some new words, *provisions* and *navigator*, as we followed the adventure of a boy and his grandad. We have used the colours red and yellow to create shades of orange and then used these to make sunset scenes.

Thank you for coming to Sports Day. We have all loved practising this week, and recognising that effort and teamwork are more important than winning. We hope you enjoyed having the opportunity to share books with your children afterwards.

Class News:

We have had another busy two weeks in Chestnut Class!

Last week, we celebrated *World Music Day* by learning about France, the country where it originated. We enjoyed a typical French breakfast, learned some French phrases and a beautiful song about colours. We also listened to a song which celebrated different languages, and had a little dance. In Music, we have been using *percussion instruments* to represent the movement and sounds of various animals, linking to our Science theme.

We had a visit from a bee-keeper who explained how to look after bees. We explored the specialist equipment you need and the children even got to wear the protective clothing! We also used our prediction skills by thinking about whether all honey tastes the same. We used our senses to help us. We have also been thinking about *mammals* and *amphibians* as well as how we can sort or group animals.

In PE, the children have been developing their tennis skills with the help of a specialist tennis coach, and have also been preparing for Sports Day. I have been really impressed with how the children have been supporting their peers and working together in their house teams.

In Maths, we have been exploring counting in fives. We have been using songs, books and resources to help us. Next week, we will be working on recognising equal groups as part of our *multiplication and division* theme.

We have also been enjoying the wonderful weather in our outdoor classroom during our exploring time.

Cedar Class



Class News:

It has been another exciting couple of weeks in Cedar Class as we have been celebrating *World Music Day* and *Languages Day*. Last week, we took a trip to my favourite country ...Iceland! The children learned some key phrases, facts and folk tales but they particularly enjoyed hearing a variety of music.This ranged from listening to the National Anthem to learning funky dance moves to popular bands.

The children were fascinated with the explosive *geysirs* and the dancing Northern Lights that can be found in Iceland. They produced some wonderful artwork by creating a landscape which included mountains, stars and the *aurora borealis*. They experimented with chalks, paint and even scrunching up paper to create texture.

This week, the children have continued to get creative by making paintings of the deep blue sea. They chose if and how to include textures and shapes. Some children blew bubbles with paint to create a sea surface whilst others used white pastels and paint to give a shiny jellyfish texture. I was very impressed with how the children were able to mix shades of the sea to create depth to their artwork.

Next week, we are going to showcase our learning from a range of topics during our Class Assembly. We do hope you will be able to come along to see it!

Over the last two weeks, Willow Class has been recapping *unit* and *non-unit* fractions of objects. We have spent a few lessons using practical resources, such as base ten frames and counters to secure their learning. Next week, we will continue our work on identifying non-unit fractions of objects.

In English, we have finished our story: "The Giant's Legend of Causeway". The children spent time adapting and changing parts of the story to create their own myth. After the children spent time completing an independent write based on their plans, they all produced wonderful pieces of work!

In Science, the children adapted their knowledge on the three types of rocks by conducting three experiments. Groups of children were given three rocks (one igneous, one metamorphic and one sedimentary). They all had to identify which rock is which and the children were able to come up with some interesting predictions!

This week, Willow Class has spent the majority of their time on their Class Assembly - they have all worked incredibly hard and it would be great to see you all there!

THOUGHT OF THE WEEK

This week our thought links with our Christian Value of **Courage**.

In our classes we have explored our Picture News news story:

Four children have been found alive after surviving a plane crash and spending forty days alone in Colombia's Amazon jungle. Colombia's president, Gustavo Petro heralded the rescue as a joy for the whole country. The four siblings were the only survivors of the plane that crash landed in the jungle on 1st May. They then became the focus of a massive rescue operation, involving soldiers and local people. Speaking of the incredible feat of survival, Gustavo Petro said, 'They were alone, they themselves achieved an example of total survival which will remain in history'.

We reflected that: Bravery comes in many different forms.

Having the support of others can make a big difference to the choices we make and the courage we show, when facing difficult and scary experiences.

Some questions to talk about:

- What are some of your fears?
- Can you think of a time when you faced a fear or difficulty? How did you feel?
- Have you ever faced an unexpected or unknown situation that required bravery and courage? What was it? Who else was there? Were you able to overcome it?

News from The MAT Christian Distinctiveness Committee

A New SIAMS Framework 2023

As you may already know, as a church school, we are inspected by the National Society on behalf of the Church of England every few years in line with Section 48 of the Education Act 2005. This SIAMS inspection makes judgements on Religious Education, Collective Worship, and pupils' spiritual, moral, social and cultural education. This coming September, the SIAMS Framework is changing and the inspections will look a little different.

These key changes are:

- judgements will replace grades,
- schools will need a theologically rooted Christian vision,
- inspection questions will focus on impact instead of lists of criteria,
- the school's context will play a greater role,
- there will be a greater emphasis on the MATs accountability.
