Now that all the children have settled so beautifully into Conker Class, we've had a fantastic start to our learning! In Phonics, we've begun exploring our Phase 2 letters and sounds, and the children are doing so well. In Maths, we've been busy with matching and sorting activities, and it's been wonderful to see their confidence growing. Our story focus has been: "The Little Red Hen" - we've loved learning actions to help us remember the language, sequencing the story, and

creating our very own story maps. The children also had great fun making their own Little Red Hen crafts! We've been especially proud of the hard work everyone has put into their artwork for our Excellence Exhibition - what a creative start to the year!

In RE, we have been discussing the things and people who are special to us. We loved showing each other a special object from home and spoke about why it means so much to us. We have also been learning about this term's Christian Value - Friendship. We listened to the Bible story: "The Good Samaritan" and thought about what it means to be a good friend.

Wow, what an amazing few weeks we've had in Chestnut Class!

The highlight of the term so far has been our exciting adventure to The Egg Theatre in Bath. The children showed their resilience and positivity when our morning started off a little differently to what we had expected. The children loved watching: "The Three Little Pigs" as there was lots of audience participation required!

Inspired by the show, we have been describing the 'big bad wolf' and the pigs in our English lessons. We have focused on using finger spaces in our writing.

In Maths, we have been comparing numbers using words and symbols such as 'greater than' 'less than' and 'equal to'. We have been playing lots of games with our maths partners to help us remember the symbols. We have been using number tracks to help us find 'one more' and 'one less' than a given number.

We have really enjoyed finding out about Picasso and exploring his abstract art. We used mirrors to study our faces and cut up photographs of ourselves to develop our understanding of selfportraiture. We've had lots of fun experimenting with line and colour to create our artwork ready for the Excellence Exhibition.

Class News:

What a busy but fantastic few weeks we have had since the start of the year.

In Maths, we have been continuing to explore *place* value and how we can partition numbers in different ways. We have been using this knowledge to help us to recognise and order numbers on a number line, then estimate where a number might be on an incomplete number line.

In PE, we have continued to develop our different hand strokes during tennis. Alongside this, we have been really developing our coordination and making sure that we are moving with control.

In History, we have been enjoying learning about World War 1. We have been quite shocked by how different life was during the war.



We particularly enjoyed looking at some artefacts and replica memorabilia from that period.

This week in Science, we continued our learning about animals. We enjoyed answering the question 'How do humans change as they get older?' We used tape measures and completed a little investigation to use our 'pattern seeking' skills to answer questions.

We have absolutely loved working towards the Excellence Exhibition and exploring the work of *Pablo Picasso*. The children all demonstrated real enthusiasm and determination to work towards their final pieces!

In Maths, we are coming to the end of our *place value* topic. The children spent last week estimating numbers on a number line and this week we have been comparing and ordering three-digit numbers. In our next topic, we will be looking at *addition and subtraction*.

In English, we have continued our story on the: "Three Billy Goats Gruff". We spent last week writing expanded noun phrases to describe the characters and the setting. Throughout the last few weeks,



Class News:


In Maths, we have been focusing on addition and subtraction. The children have done brilliantly with adding two 4-digit numbers, even when it involves two or more exchanges. They have shown great confidence with this concept and will soon be applying their skills to subtraction as we move into the next part of our unit.

In English, we've been preparing to write a setting description based on the barn in the story: "Charlotte's Web". The children have impressed us with their use of expanded noun phrases, personification and prepositions to build vivid and imaginative sentences. Next week, we will bring all of this together as they write their final descriptive pieces.

Our Art lessons have been buzzing with creativity as we prepared for the Excellence Exhibition. The children have been tracing selfportraits and experimenting with bold colours to create vibrant backgrounds inspired by Andy Warhol's pop art style.

We've had a fantastic start to our trips this year! The children thoroughly enjoyed their visit to The Newt, where they expanded their knowledge of Roman life. We're looking forward to continuing this learning with our upcoming visit to the Roman Baths on Monday. Please remember children need to be in school by 8.15am for this trip!

Thought of the week

This month we take time to reflect on our diverse world and join in with Black History Month. This week Mr Pollock has led several assemblies to start our month of learning and reflection. Our big question followed this theme:

The theme of Black History Month 2025 is 'Standing Firm in Power and Pride.' Every October is a chance to celebrate the strength, resilience and achievements of the Black community.

One example is the West Indian Sports and Social Club based in Moss Side, Manchester, which was started in 1953 by people who came from the Caribbean, known as the Windrush generation. It gave families a safe place to meet, play cricket and football, dance, share food, and celebrate their culture and feel proud of their history. Now, new housing plans nearby could make it harder for the club to carry on, and the community is speaking up to protect it.

Over the years, it has welcomed famous visitors, like Nelson Mandela, and has been a proud part of the local community.

About 200 new homes are planned to be built near

the club. Some people worry this could make things harder for the club e.g., noise or less space. The community wants to protect the club, because it is an important part of their history and who they are.

The club is a place where the Black community in Manchester can feel proud and included. It helps young people learn about their history and feel connected to it.

The local area is now considering how to build new homes while still looking after special community places.

Discussion Point

What place, story, or tradition in your community makes you feel proud? Talk about how pride can come from remembering and celebrating the people and places that tell a story, and from working together to make sure they're not forgotten.

Reflection: A community is more than just buildings. It is the people, stories, and pride shared in their history. We can all help protect and celebrate what makes our communities special.




