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Thought of the Week

"You are the light of the world. A town built on a hill cannot be hidden. Neither do people light a lamp and put it under a bowl. Instead they put it on its stand, and it gives light to everyone in the house. In the same way, let your light shine before others, that they may see your good deeds and glorify your Father in heaven."

(Matthew 5:14-16)



The Bible records a lot of what Jesus said, stuff that people still remember and quote 2000 years later.

How do we know that what's written down was actually said by him? Well, we don't know for sure, but all that is attributed to Jesus was said by Jesus or the authors of the Gospels came up with them instead. Either the authors were geniuses or they were quoting the same genius. I'll let you decide which.

Straight after Jesus talked about his followers being 'the salt of the earth', he then went on to say that they were 'the light of the world'. But what was he referring to?

Well, the first picture gives you an idea of what a first-century lamp may have looked like. These were used in Jewish households to provide light in their homes and they would have been small and unassuming. At nightime, they would put a small amount of oil in one of these lamps with a wick, in a

room where there was no other light and they would light the wick. In our modern homes, with electricity, batteries, torches, smartphones and even standby lights, it might be hard for us to experience what it may have been like to just have this small lamp as the only source of light. But, this lamp, though small, would enable them to see throughout the entire room and could also be taken with them to show the way to the other rooms in the house - the few they would have had.

Jesus' point in his parable is that it would be completely inappropriate in a dark place to hide a lamp under a bowl. The intention of light is to provide a way for people to see where they are going. And Jesus is reminding his disciples and future believers that they should be "light" - showing people the way to be saved - in the midst of a dark world.

We can all be "light" to others. We direct our children throughout their lives, giving them advice and guiding them in the way they should go - whether they want us to or not!

Often, we can help and support friends and colleagues through dark and difficult times and we can be a "light" to them in the middle of their troubles.

This week, look to see who needs guidance. Where can you offer help and support? Who can you be a "light" for? Remember, don't hide yourself "under a bowl", shine and make a difference!
