It was reported last week that requests to join the Scouts and Girlguiding groups have reached the highest levels for over 80 years. The Scout Association said nearly 90,000 young people across the UK are currently on waiting lists and Girlguiding has nearly 55,000 people waiting for a place. Simon Carter, national spokesperson for the Scout Association, said that in the last year, membership has grown by 16%. "We have not seen this level of growth since the Second World War," he added. "Lockdown was a grim period for young people. They couldn't go anywhere. There is now more zeal for the outdoors."

We used our mark making skills to create WANTED posters and sailed on Pirate Pete's ship to see if we could find him anywhere. Pirate Pete wanted us to make a hideaway for him, so in Outdoor Learning we worked as a team to create a hideaway den. We then made our own pirate flags and set sail on the Trinity Dove pirate ship to look for treasure.

On Wednesday, we absolutely loved our Pirate Day, the children mixed with Conker Class and loved exploring all the pirate activities on offer, such as making pirate patches, hats, telescopes, cutlasses, baking pirate cakes, searching for hidden treasure and so much more!

In Maths, we have been thinking about weighing. We have been weighing Pirate Pete's treasure and learning the words *heaviest*, *heavy*, *lightest* and *lighter* to describe the different weights. We have loved exploring weight and capacity using our new water wall too.

We have also been thinking about how we stay healthy. We picked some lettuce which we are growing in Nursery and used it with some other vegetables to make a delicious salad. The children were fantastic at cutting and trying different vegetables.

Conker Class



Class News:

So much fun was had on Wednesday when the EYFS children all took part in a Pirate Day. We have been reading a book called "Sun", in which a little boy goes on an adventure with his granddad and sees pirates. You can watch a video of the book being read here:

We thought of all the things we already knew about pirates and then learned some new things. Did you know that pirates drank grog and wore eye patches as they felt this would help them see better at night? We took part in lots of fun activities, making telescopes and cutlasses, walking the plank, manoeuvring a programmable toy around a map, weighing treasure, sorting fake words and real treasure words. The children did so much learning and we think they all looked amazing!

We have been working on the concept of weight over the past two weeks. We have worked so hard to use the correct vocabulary of *heaviest* and *lightest* as well as balance. We have really shown how we can problem solve, explaining our guesses and reasoning and then drawing conclusions. We have even looked at how the Numicon pieces can be used to balance if the pieces put on the scales are the same weight.

Class News:



It's been another busy two weeks in Chestnut Class. We have been making jam sandwiches to understand the concept of fractions. The children decided they would rather have half of a sandwich than a quarter as they would get more!

We have linked our Geography with our Maths sessions, understanding whole, half, quarter and three quarter turns through north, east, south and west.

We have continued with our shark fact file books, learning about the power of a shark's senses and making our own smells and perfumes. We were delighted to hear that sharks only eat 6 humans a year, so based on that ratio, it's not too much of a risk and we were relieved. We added some texture to our books, by using sandpaper. Chestnut Class have discovered that if we were ever to touch a shark, it would feel like sandpaper. Lastly, Chestnut Class were set the challenge of drawing 9,000 plankton species, because a basking shark can eat up to 9,000 litres of plankton in one hour! I am so proud of the children and their presentation within these books, they have all worked so hard!

In Science this week, we continued to look at animals. We focused on the book "If we had animal teeth". The children were giggling away at the idea of having beaver teeth or the very thought of snake teeth! We were able to discuss which animals were herbivore, carnivore or omnivore just by looking at their teeth.

Chestnut Class very much enjoyed their transition day with Miss Musgrove and are looking forward to their next adventure!

Class News:



They've been studying a short film called "Taking Flight" from The Literacy Shed in which a boy goes on an incredible imaginary trip with his grandfather. The children have focused on amazing adjectives, clever conjunctions, fantastic fronted adverbials and they've even delved into using dialogue in their narrative writing.

In Maths, the children have been using their problem solving skills to solve word problems based around the topic of *time*. I have encouraged them to tell me 'how they know' so that their learning is embedded using the correct vocabulary. I have been so impressed with their reasoning skills.

Our Science topic is *Animals Including Humans*. We have learnt all about food chains and food webs. The children found out about producers, primary and secondary consumers, predators and prey and demonstrated their understanding by mapping out their own food chains.

On Wednesday, we took advantage of the beautiful sunshine by running our *Golden Mile* on the school field. We hope to do this a bit more now with sports day coming up soon. The children are super excited about all the different events and activities ahead.


