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Farrington's Thought for the Week by Mr Marvin

With everything that is going on in the world at the moment, it can be hard to hope for better things. Many would say that all the suffering in the world at the moment is real proof that God doesn't exist and that he's not involved in our lives at all.

For Christians, their belief and trust in God is often the one thing that sees them through dark and difficult times, including the threat of war and the recent pandemic. Although it can seem that God isn't there or is distant and doesn't care, for many people this is far from the truth.

When you look at the story of the Bible, which is something we are doing in Classes 3 and 4 at the moment, it says that everything in the beginning was planned perfectly by God, including all the plants, animals and people. The fact that our world is just the right distance from the sun for us to exist and live is often seen as proof of this. Also, according to David Attenborough our planet is able to produce enough sustainable solar, wind and geothermal energy for us all, but as we are always being told, it is purely our fault that our world isn't working properly.

The Bible tells us the same thing. Although we have been given this perfect world to live in, we have decided to make our own choices instead of following God. We have been given free will and rather than working together with God and with each other, we often make our own selfish decisions. Christians would say this is the reason why there are so many problems today. In Paul's letter to the Galatians, he told the readers to assess their right to choose how they live their lives...

'You were called to freedom, brothers and sisters; only don't let that freedom be an opportunity to indulge your selfish impulses, but serve each other with love.'

(Galatians 5:13)

So many people over the years have made the wrong choices and these have often had devastating effects, including the recent decisions made by the Russian president. In that case, many would argue, why did God give us free will? Well, Christians would say that God made us very unique and by giving us free will, it allows us to make our own choices which includes the ability to love. Without free will, there cannot be love – there would only be duty. Who wants to live in a world where we share, serve and "show intimacy" towards one another out of obligation? But free will does come at a cost and if we make wrong choices, there are often consequences for our actions. Later in Galatians, Paul says this...

'Don't be misled: No one makes a fool of God. What a person plants, he will harvest. The person who plants selfishness, ignoring the needs of others—ignoring God!—harvests a crop of weeds. All he'll have to show for his life is weeds! But the one who plants in response to God, letting God's Spirit do the growth work in him, harvests a crop of real life, eternal life.'

(Galatians 6:7-8)

There are repercussions for the choices we make – good and bad – and the Bible states that this is the reason why our world is in such a mess right now.

So for many people around the world, the best thing we can do at the moment is to ask God to intervene and to pray about the situation in Ukraine. I have included a prayer from Ed Gregory, the Director of Education at the Diocese of Bath and Wells along with a prayer by St Francis of Assisi. 'Let your gentleness be evident to all. The Lord is near. Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to

God. And the peace of God, which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus.'

(Philippians 4: 5-7)

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Dear God,

All peoples are your children. And your children find themselves on both sides of the current confrontation. Now that this situation has descended into war, it will be both Ukrainian and Russian families that will suffer the loss of family members, homes, neighbourhoods, and ways of life. You are a God of peace and love, not war and bloodshed. Though the things that make for peace may be hidden from the eyes of those driving the march to war, of those seeking resolutions through diplomacy, of those now caught up in conflict, we pray that those eyes may be opened, and that peace may yet triumph.

Lord, make me an instrument of your peace: where there is hatred, let me sow love; where there is injury, pardon; where there is doubt, faith; where there is despair, hope; where there is darkness, light; where there is sadness, joy. O divine Master, grant that I may not so much seek to be consoled as to console. to be understood as to understand, to be loved as to love. For it is in giving that we receive, it is in pardoning that we are pardoned, and it is in dying that we are born to eternal life.
