The purpose of the week is to make the children more aware of issues around change, through practical investigations. They will be building solar ovens and wind turbines to appreciate using clean energy. They will then be working in small groups to create ideas on thev could have how a positive environmental impact. This is the 3rd time we have taken part in the Atkins Net Zero Superhero competition, and we thank Mr Rippon for supporting us with his knowledge and skills.

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

## **Thought of the Week**

'Going a little farther, he fell with his face to the ground and prayed, "My Father, if it is possible, may this cup be taken from me. Yet not as I will, but as you will."

(Matthew 26:39)

A lot happens after Jesus' entry into Jerusalem, including the overturning of the tables in the temple and the Last Supper. But after he ate with his disciples, the Bible says Jesus visited a favourite place of his, known as the Garden of Gethsemane.

Recently, I heard this episode in Holy Week being described as 'Jesus having a hissy fit!' Not quite appropriate you might think. But hang on a minute? Are we too ready to tone down the experience that Jesus went through, to try and soften the moment.

In Luke's Gospel, it describes Jesus' sweat as being 'like drops of blood' (<u>Luke 22:44</u>). This condition, known as hematohidrosis, occurs because of extreme distress or fear, such as facing death, torture, or severe ongoing abuse. This was exactly what was going on for Jesus at this moment.

In the Bible it makes it clear that Jesus knew he was going to be betrayed, arrested and crucified. He understood what he was going to go through. So often we forget

that although for many people, Jesus was the Son of God, he was also fully man. He knew about the pain he was going to experience. And not just the physical pain, but the spiritual pain of being separated from His Father.

After this episode was described to me in the way that it was, the speaker went on to explain what they meant. This was the whole point. If Jesus hadn't been a man as well as God, justice couldn't be served. For Jesus to take the punishment for mankind, he would have to be a man himself. Otherwise the punishment wouldn't be fair. Of course, it was never fair that Jesus was going to pay the punishment for everyone, but that's for another week.

This is why Jesus is in anguish at this moment. It would have been a terrible night for him. And the few close friends he bought with him were no help at all. They just kept falling asleep.

Although he was aware of what was to come, this was Jesus' moment to try and reason things with God. A modern translation of what Jesus said could be "My Father, if there is any way, get me out of this. But please, not what I want, but what you want?".

He was hoping he wouldn't have to go through with it, but being fully God and fully man, he understood that it was the only way to reconcile man and God.
