The children thoroughly enjoyed choosing a present for the fantastic females in their lives on Tuesday. The selling of these items raised £80, thank you to everyone who joined in.


We are looking forward to the school disco next Friday. To ensure we leave the hall as we find it, we have the following ground rules;


- Parents/carers must supervise children at all times.

Thought of the Week

(Luke 19: 36-38)



Christ's Entry Into Jerusalem - Norman Adams (1991)

It's a very familiar scene from the Bible and many of us know that we remember this event on Palm Sunday, the Sunday before Easter -April 2nd 2023.

But did you realise the significance of Jesus arriving on a donkey. This was the steed of choice for Israel's Old Testament kings (see 1 Kings 1:32-35). As Jesus mounts the donkey and rides into the capital, he's not claiming to be gentle and meek so much as to be royal and ruling.

At this point, things were looking good. Jesus' disciples were probably feeling like he was at the top of his game, that he was entering Jerusalem to reign and rule as the promised Messiah.

Some people believe that Judas Iscariot may have belonged to the Sicarii which is where he could have got his name from. The Sicarii were a very radical Jewish group. It is likely that

Judas was expecting Jesus to rule as a warrior king, like King David before him, and that he was going to lead his followers into battle against the Romans. The Bible doesn't give us any details, but it would explain why after a week of healing, preaching and no fighting, he chose to betray him.

At this point in the Easter story, it may surprise us how easily the people change their minds. Here they are praising Jesus and referring to him as the king who comes in the Lord's name and less than a week later they are baying for his blood!

But isn't this true of all of us? One moment we can feel on top of the world and then later on. after we've had some bad news or a dreadful day at work, we can feel like our world is crashing down around us.

We often live our lives by our emotions, but unfortunately, we can't trust them. As we've seen, they change so often and so rapidly that they aren't a reliable way of gauging things.

As we approach this time of Easter and the weather begins to get more springlike (hopefully!), let's try and focus on what we can rely on. For Christians, whether they're having a happy or sad day, they can still experience God's joy in their lives. You may not be beaming from ear to ear, but you still know deep inside that God loves you and has a purpose for your life. Let's ask God to help us to be less fickle and instead to draw on his strength to manage life's ups and downs.
