Compassion - Oliver and Ruby (Y3). For making lovely Easter Cards for the elderly in the local community - they will spread so much joy and happiness.





Class News:







Free School Meals

If your financial situation has changed during the pandemic and you want to find out if you are entitled to receive free school meals, please contact B&NES directly:

They will need you to tell them your National Insurance Number or National Asylum Seeker Support Number when you call. Please note that the Local Authority will check your eligibility to qualifying benefits on your behalf using the DFE online Free School Meal Eligibility Checking Service. Your National Insurance or National Asylum Seeker Support Number and Date of Birth must be completed clearly and accurately.

City Nature Challenge

The Festival of Nature Team at the Natural History Consortium have created some resources for taking part in the City Nature Challenge, a huge citizen science wildlife recording project using digital platforms.

Throughout April, May and June we will be encouraging people to record animals, plants and fungi from their windows, balconies, gardens or during their daily walk, using the iNaturalist app. You can also join the big international Challenge weekend on 24th-27th April when over 200 cities will be active at once. The recordings made on the app will help local and national conservationists.
