Ofsted Inspection

Two inspectors spent the day with us, looking in all the classes, watching lessons, talking to children and staff, meeting with Governors and the Trust and reading the responses from parents. While we were all pleased with how well the day went, which is credit to all of our staff, the most praise must go to our amazing children who really shone all day long. We also know that there are some parents/carers who prefer a morning assembly and others who prefer an afternoon, and we do want to be able to accommodate as many parents as possible. However the move to a morning assembly has worked so much better for the majority of children and then they return to school settled and ready to work.

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Thought for the Week



Then Jesus looked up and said, "Father, I thank you that you have heard me. I knew that you always hear me, but I said this for the benefit of the people standing here, that they may believe that you sent me."'

(John 11:41-42 NIV)

Last week we looked at the time when Jesus spoke to Mary just after her brother Lazarus had died. This week, we are looking at what happened just before Jesus spoke to Lazarus asking him to come out of the tomb.

This is one of the difficult stories from the Bible. We can comfortably talk about much of what Jesus said. We can share stories of when he spoke to women or welcomed children who wanted a blessing. We can even get round the feeding of the five thousand or Jesus walking on water. But this story is often a challenge. Did it really happen? Is it true? If we believe it isn't true, can we just discount it? If it is true, what does this actually mean?

It says in the Bible (<u>John 11: 38-45</u>) that Jesus asked for the stone to be moved away. Martha, Lazarus's other sister, was probably shocked by this request. She felt it was appropriate to remind Jesus that Lazarus had been in the tomb for four days and that there would probably be a nasty smell.

We don't know at what point in the story Jesus actually reversed or stopped the dying process. Had he actually been dead for four days? Had he started decaying? Was there a smell? We're not told. We are told that he came out of his own accord and that he was still wrapped in grave clothes. I'm assuming it was difficult for him to know where he was going, which is why Jesus may have called out in a loud voice, so Lazarus could walk towards the sound.

One of the interesting things is what Jesus says just before he tells Lazarus to come out. He prays to God, thanking him for always hearing him. I imagine that he is referring to what he had said in verse 40 about seeing 'the glory of God'. But what is even more interesting is he then goes on to say that he is only thanking God for hearing him for the benefit of those who were there - that it was the power of

God that raised this man from the dead, not anyone or anything else.

Although this story is difficult to believe, for Christians this is a pivotal moment in Jesus' ministry, because he uses it as proof of his divinity - 'I said this for the benefit of the people standing here, that they may believe that you sent me.'

For many people it is easier to discount these events from Jesus' life; that although he was here and said some great things, we can choose to explain away the miracles. Otherwise we may need to take Jesus' claim seriously...that he was actually sent by God...that he actually is God.



Jesus lifted up his eyes and said: Father, I thank you for hearing my prayer.

I myself knew that you
hear me always,
but I speak for the sake of all these
who are standing around me,
so that they may believe
it was you who sent me.

When he had said this, he cried in a loud voice, 'Lazarus, come out!'

(John 11:41-43)
