Wow, the time has really flown by and we have already finished our first term in Acorns Class. We have been really busy settling in, getting to know our new friends and learning new routines. All the adults have been so impressed by how the children have coped and adapted to this new school year.

We have been reading: "The Enormous Turnip" story which has led us on to lots of fun vegetable related activities, including vegetable printing, sorting vegetables by type and size and even making our own vegetable soup. We have particularly enjoyed scooping the seeds out of pumpkins and then using the shells in our water play - then hammering play nails into them, which took lots of strength and coordination.

Our Maths focus has been 'sorting.' We have carried out some group activities with the grown-ups to understand what the term 'sort' really means, and then practised our sorting skills independently throughout the sessions. We are particularly good at sorting items into colour groups now.

The cafe/kitchen role-play area has been very popular since it has been moved to a new area of Acorns. Many cups of tea and tasty meals have been prepared for each other. During these times, the children have demonstrated great team work, turn-taking and negotiation skills, all while having lovely conversations and engaging in imaginary play based on real life experiences.

Conker Class



Class News:

Wow, we have reached the end of our first term of our first year in school - and what a busy term it has been!

We have now learned 20 single sounds, of which one was a *digraph*. I'm hoping the children can tell you what a digraph is as we repeat this every day (in case they can't, it's 2 letters that make 1 sound!). We have learned 3 common exception words and are beginning to read and write simple phrases using them.

In Maths, we are working on numbers up to 3. We have looked at how they can be broken into different parts and how we can put two quantities together to equal 3. We are trying to use the word *'equal'* rather than *'make'*. We have looked at clocks and how to read the o'clocks for 1 to 3.

Subitising - recognising the quantity without counting - is a skill that we are developing up to 3, as well as the cardinality of an amount we count e.g. "1, 2, 3 - there are 3 conkers".

We have been thinking about what being an artist means. All the children thought that an artist had to be someone who painted or drew, so we have looked at how they could be photographers, musicians and even potters. We looked at the artist *Yvonne Coomber* who enjoys painting flowers outside and worked collaboratively to create works in her style. This involved mixing shades, painting circles within circles, using long movements for the leaves and stalks, as well as splatter painting for the smaller flowers. Some of the children ended up with pretty coloured freckles!

We hope you all have a restful half term and that the children come back reinvigorated.

Class News:

We've had a fantastic start to the new academic year in Chestnut Class. The children have all settled in very well and are working hard in all subjects!

In English, we have been exploring the story of: *"Little Red Riding Hood"*. We have been using capital letters, finger spaces and full stops in our sentences. The children have been using really exciting vocabulary in their writing. We are now ready for our first independent big write! Next term, we will start writing about a new narrative tale based on an animation.

In Maths, we have been exploring *place value*. This has included writing numbers as words, comparing groups, counting 1 more and 1 less. Next term we'll be focusing on *addition* and *subtraction*.



We have such amazing historians in Chestnut Class! As part of our learning about *The Great Fire of London*, we have created our own timelines, investigated why *Samuel Pepys* is significant, and why the fire lasted so long. The children have enjoyed learning songs about the fire too!

In Science, we have been exploring everyday materials with lots of hands-on exploration and investigation. We have been sorting objects by their materials and properties. Next term, we'll investigate the most suitable material for an umbrella for a teddy! Well done, Chestnut Class - what a great start! I can't wait to see your

Well what a wonderful first term in Cedar Class! The children have all worked incredibly hard across the curriculum and I am very proud of their achievements so far.

In Maths, we have come to the end of our place value topic. Over the last two weeks the children have been estimating amounts, making amounts and placing numbers on a numberline. *Place value* underpins all of our Maths learning and we will continue to refer to this when we move onto our *addition* and *subtraction* unit after half term. Cedar Class have improved significantly on Numbots this term and have received many virtual certificates for their achievements.

In English, our trip recount completed our learning on past tense and recounts. Over the last week, we have been focusing on our punctuation and grammar. I have been impressed with how the children have used adjectives to make expanded noun phrases and I cannot wait to see how they apply these to our story topic next term.

As scientists, we have been exploring animals and their habitats with lots of classification and sorting. The children completed their first 'fair test investigation' exploring ideas like "Do the oldest children in year 3, 4, 5 and 6 have the biggest hands?". Next term, we'll be completing some hands-on explorations around materials and their properties.

I hope everyone has a well deserved rest and enjoys their half term break. I look forward to seeing everyone back next term where we will be learning about Remembrance.

Class News: Redwood Class

We have had a great first term back in Redwood Class!

Thought of the week

We have continued to explore *Black History Month* through our class collective worship this term and using our Picture News packs exploring our big question:

October is Black History Month in the UK. This year's theme is 'Saluting our Sisters' - highlighting the role Black women have played in shaping history, inspiring change, and building communities in the UK. Commemorations will feature Black women, who have made outstanding contributions to many areas including music, literature, fashion, sport, business, politics, and health care. We celebrated key women such as Nicola Adams (Olympic Gold Medal winning boxer) and Diane Abbott (first Black woman to be elected to UK Parliament). These women could be described as trailblazers - the first to do or achieve something and introducing new ideas, methods or a new way of doing things.

We found out about Olive Morris (in our picture) who was a Black community leader and activist, born in St Catherine, Jamaica, in 1952. When she was 9 years old, she moved to London to join her parents, who had already migrated there as part of the Windrush generation. When she was just 17 she intervened in the arrest of a Nigerian diplomat. This was her motivation to begin her fight against racism in Britain. She achieved a great deal throughout her life, becoming a powerful activist in the fight against discrimination in the 1970s.

Olive Morris understood the unfairness of how some Black people were being treated in the 1960s and 70s in the UK, and felt that someone had to act. We can learn from Olive's actions, remembering that if we see or experience injustice, we have a choice to do something about it.

What have you been learning about?


Jack – We have been learning about some flowers from the artist Yvonne Coomber.
