We are so proud of Conkers and how they have embraced Phonics and Reading. We have learned 12 sounds already this term and we are now starting to use these in our reading. Everyday we are practising how to write the graphemes and we are always up for the challenge of writing a word.

In Literacy, we have started to learn the story of "The Little Red Hen". We learned the word character and can say which characters are in each version of the story that we have read. We are using actions to help us retell it. We have made playdough red hens, watched a video on how to draw a hen and created story maps. We don't think the characters are fantastic friends to the hen!

In Maths this week, we have been working on the number 3, looking at the different ways it can be made up - eg 3 + 0, 2 + 1. We have used coins adding a 2p and a 1p to equal 3p.

This month, we are shifting our focus from Queen Elizabeth to another significant individual - *Mary Seacole*. Next week, we will find out more about these individuals and we will be using fresh ingredients to recreate some of the medicines Mary learned to make with her mother.

In RE this term, we have been learning about the parable of *The Prodigal Son* - we have explored synonyms for *'forgiveness'*. On Thursday, we interviewed the father and the two sons to explore forgiveness further. We learned that God waits for humans to realise what they have done wrong and ask for forgiveness and welcomes them back when they do.

Numbots Day was such a success, it was great to see so many fantastic costumes in KS1 last week. There have been many certificates in Year 2 for all the hard work they have put in on Numbots - keep it up Cedar Class!

In Maths this week, we have reached the end of our *place value* topic. Willow Class have been finding out 1, 10 and 100 more or less of two and three digit numbers. Willow Class have also been flexible partitioning three digit numbers using base tens. Last week in Maths, we celebrated Numbots and TTRockstars Day which was a huge success in Willow Class, their outfits were fantastic!


In English we have reached the end of our book "The Flood". The children have been working extremely hard writing their own version, they have been coming up with some amazing and detailed sentences and have all produced fantastic pieces!

In Geography, we have been investigating *earthquakes*. We learned how earthquakes occur and investigated the 2011 Japan disaster. We also discovered how we can keep safe in an earthquake and applied our understanding to a fake earthquake scenario. The next two weeks will be focused on rivers and mountains.

In Science, Willow Class have been busy investigating forces and magnets. Our first investigation involved us measuring the distance a car travelled on different materials using push and pull forces. Our second investigation involved the children identifying magnetic and nonmagnetic materials. Willow Class came up with some fantastic predictions and conclusions.

Finally, in Art we have finished our final pieces of our rose sketches. The children have all produced incredible and beautiful art pieces and should all be proud of themselves, we cannot wait to show you all!

Redwood Class



In Redwood Class, we have been looking at significant and influential figures as part of Black History Month. In History, we have been continuing our work on World War II, looking at the role of women during the war as well as the rationing of clothes and supplies. Furthermore, the children have learned about Spitfire aircrafts and have been producing their own paper models.

In Science, we have been exploring light and in particular the way in which *light* is reflected and refracted. The children carried out an investigation on refraction, exploring how light travels differently through water and glass.

AFRICAN DRUMMING WORKSHOP

On 12th October as part of our celebration of Black History month, we have arranged an African Drumming Workshop for all Trinity children (YR-Y6). The drumming workshop is suitable for all ages as a great introduction to rhythm and basic percussion techniques. There will be djembes and percussion instruments provided for every child to join in and the children will play these traditional instruments and sing songs from West Africa. The workshop is aligned to targets within Key Stages One and Two of the Music National Curriculum. Using traditional African djembe drums, children create sounds and music from the African continent - the children will be able to immerse themselves in a different culture, whilst experiencing a feeling of unity as part of a drum circle.

We are asking for a contribution of £2.50 per child which is payable on ParentPay.
