

Parent Forum

We welcomed parents and carers to our latest Forum before Celebration Assembly last week. Some of the topics covered were plans for a whole school end of year trip to Longleat on July 13th, the return of Sports Day (date?), plans for the new 'lodge' to replace the library (this will be built and ready for use ready for September) and more details on the school's involvement in the village Jubilee Day on June 4th. We will be displaying over 100 portraits of Queen Elizabeth created by the children in the Memorial Hall, which will be well worth going along to view. Parents asked about our numbers for September. We were able to confirm that we will be

welcoming 15 children, including both siblings and new families, from within our village and from other nearby locations. We assured parents that although we took a larger cohort last year, what makes us special is our size and the individual care we can therefore afford to all children - and therefore we are not looking to expand the school from what has made it successful.

Relationship and Sex Education

Last year we launched a revamped RSE offer to the children. The legislation behind teaching 'sex-ed' had changed and we used the Changing Me units from our PSHE scheme (Jigsaw) to deliver this to ensure we covered all the statutory content. We had positive feedback last year and are therefore planning to deliver this year's Changing Me units in the same way. Although the offer stays the same, please remember your child is a year older, so please consult the overview document and our approach which can be found here: <u>Relationship and Sex Education</u> so you are fully aware of what they will be taught for their year group. These lessons will be delivered during Term 6.

The Queen's Platinum Jubilee

"Which of these three do you think was a neighbour to the man who fell into the hands of robbers?" The expert in the law replied, "The one who had mercy on him."

Jesus told him, "Go and do likewise."' (Luke 10: 36-37)



Some of the children in Class 3 this week were telling me that they hadn't celebrated the Jubilee last year and it was at this point that I realised that they didn't really understand what a jubilee was. I explained that these sorts of celebrations only happen every ten years because we are celebrating the number of years that our queen has been reigning and therefore we mark each decade as these are special amounts of time. The last time we celebrated our queen's reign on the throne was in 2012, the same year as the London Olympics - which of course was before any of the children in Year 3 or 4 were born. It just reminds me just how special and rare these events are and why it is important to mark them.

This week in one of our collective worships, we have been looking at how we greet people and make them feel welcome. As a school we see how important it is to make people feel welcome and how this is a way of showing them that they matter as fellow human beings. Our Queen has welcomed and greeted a lot of people during her 70 year reign. She has visited many countries around the world and is always shaking people by the hand and speaking with them, showing them that they are worthy of her time.

The Queen has explained how her faith as a Christian helps her with this. In her Christmas message in 2004, she explained how Jesus' parable about the Good Samaritan had influenced her.

In the story of the Good Samaritan, Jesus tells us about someone who helped someone else and treated them with care and respect, even though they were from a different country and religion.

The Queen said, 'For me as a Christian, one of the most important...teaching is contained in the parable of the Good Samaritan, when Jesus answers the question, "Who is my neighbour?" ...Everyone is our neighbour, no matter what race, creed or colour. The need to look after a fellow human being is far more important than any cultural or religious differences.'

The Queen's message is clear – treating other people with kindness and being welcoming is important. We can make others feel welcome through our words and actions, just as the Queen makes people feel welcome by saying hello and shaking hands.

Now, you may not be a royalist or even particularly fond of our queen, but she has certainly worked hard over her long reign and has always been a good example of someone who has made time for others regardless of their culture, religion, race and place in society.

This coming week, when most of us can enjoy a few extra days off, let's take a moment to consider the importance of welcoming others and
