Headteacher's Message

As we come to the end of Term 5 I would once again like to say a big 'Thank you!' to everyone in our school community for their amazing efforts during these strange and sometimes difficult times. Children have all given 100% in their attempts to continue to produce work of their best possible standard, with some amazing and very creative results. Parents and carers have worked relentlessly to support their children at home and staff have gone over and above expectations to set work accessible to all children, whilst ensuring it is both challenging and enjoyable. Well done and thank you to everyone.

You should have received my lengthy letter which was sent out earlier this week detailing the return to school arrangements for key year groups, as identified by the government. Teachers will be uploading a video to Seesaw for each of the year groups returning to school to help to explain the arrangements. The videos will also be uploaded to the class webpage. The letter and return to school risk assessment document can be found on our school website (Here). Parents/carers of children in Reception, Years 1 and 6 and 3 & 4 year olds in Acorns Nursery have also been sent a form via Ping to respond to informing us as to whether your child will be returning on Monday 1st June. It is vital to our planning for return that you respond to this. Please **do not** turn up with your child on 1st June if we have not received a response confirming they will be attending - **we will be unable to allow them into school**. We will require at least a week's notice to admit additional children to school, which will be subject to risk assessments and capacity. This is due to the planning and risk assessments already in place to ensure social distancing is adhered to. Can I also remind you that if your child returns to school on 1st June into YR,1 or 6, the expectation is that they attend **every day**.

Please remember that next week is half term and school will be closed to all children. There will be no home learning next week either. As detailed in my letter, the arrangements for home learning will be different after half term. Please check Seesaw for updates from your child's class teacher regarding any new arrangements.

I hope that everyone is keeping well. Have a relaxing half term and enjoy the sunshine, remembering to stay safe. I look forward to welcoming some of you back to school on 1st June.
