I hope you are all continuing to stay well and keep safe. Please be aware that all our learning groups are now full (with the exception of Reception where we still have a few spaces) and we are unable to take further requests for places. This week, the highest number of children in school was 70, which is about a third of the school. We would like to take more, although are limited due to the government guidelines we need to follow.

Important! - School meals from September



We are pleased to confirm that the price of school lunches will not increase for the start of the new school year and we now have a new menu ready to set up on Parentpay for September. However, because all food orders are now managed centrally in the Trust, they rely on having accurate lunch numbers from each school in good time to place orders. The new rule, which must be adhered to, is that parents are to make menu choices by 3pm on a

Thursday for the following week. This applies to all children wanting a school lunch - even if you do not pay for them.

If this system is not followed, it will lead to a shortage of meals at school so it is extremely important that everyone remembers to place their orders. Once the menus are on Parentpay you can make choices for the whole term up to Christmas so you don't have to remember every week.

The sun has been shining in Willow Class this week and we've been having lots and lots of fun! Taking inspiration from *The 13th Storey Treehouse*, the children have designed their own treehouses and written setting descriptions to go with them. They were then challenged to become estate agents and use all their skills of persuasion to sell me their treehouses. Their persuasive writing skills and the different ways in which they choose to present their arguments were so brilliant that it was impossible to choose!

This week in Maths, we've been exploring lines and angles and the class began the week by creating collage skylines and then identifying all the different types of lines that they had used to create the shapes. There were perpendicular, parallel, horizontal, vertical and diagonal lines. It was wonderful to explore how much Maths there is in art and the world around us!

In Science, we've been conducting colourful experiments to investigate how flowers transport water. In Art, there have been yet more fantastic Pop Art inspired artworks. This week, we looked at Roy Lichtenstein and his sunset artwork. The results were dazzling. In Geography, the children have been researching the local River Avon and investigating it's journey across the country from source to its final destination.

The performance shows how the power of music can bring us together, even when we're apart. Also in Music this week, Cherry Class has been writing their very own song lyrics and from what I've seen, we definitely have some budding singer/songwriters in our midst!

At home....and then there were three! Daisy and Amy-Jade explored the importance of maintaining a positive attitude and approach to life as part of a PSHE online lesson.



Last week the world said goodbye to an incredible lady who inspired many, encouraged individuals and won the heart of the country during World War 2. Dame Vera-Lynn died at the age of 103. She is remembered for her unforgettable, beautiful voice and songs such as 'There'll be Bluebirds over the white cliffs of Dover' and 'We'll meet again'.
