PE and School Sport at Farrington Gurney

Over the course of the last ten years we have continually tried to raise the profile of Physical Education and School Sport at our school. As we are writing this week's newsletter we have our whole school out on the field taking part in 8 different activities for the morning. These are competitive and inclusive, fun and challenging, but most importantly the children are all working together, supporting each other and enjoying the whole experience. As we all know, encouraging children to be active from an early age is really important for physical and mental health, and underpins much of what we do at school.





We were really pleased to be awarded the School Games Gold mark again this year. This is a reflection of many aspects of physical education that our children take part in during the school year - PE lessons, lunchtime activities, after school clubs, festivals and tournaments. In the last few weeks alone, we have had pupils take part in multiskills at Bath University, as well as tennis, football and athletics events against other schools. The opportunity is there for all children to take part in competitive events as they move through the school, but we also recognise that some children will not want to do this and make sure that we have sufficient activities in school that provide inclusivity along with a little competition (such as challenges in lessons and small sided games).

Next year will be the first year since before Covid that the whole school will have swimming lessons, including our Reception cohort. We will continue our links with ex-professional footballer Martin Phillips, with delivery of football to all classes. We will also continue to work with Michelle Rochester, who provides expertise in dance and movement, as well as organising the annual Dance Umbrella. On top of this, we will work with the BANES School Sport Partnership to provide different opportunities and events over the course of the year for as many children as possible.





As for Sports Day itself, we had a fantastic day full of activity. The houses worked together during the morning rotating around a carousel of eight activities, including the long jump, javelin throw, speed steps, shuttle runs, goal kick and target throw. They also had a yoga session with Mrs Harvey and some parachute games with Mr Wellington. This gave each house some points ahead of the afternoon races, where all the children took part in a sprint race and a novelty race before finishing the afternoon with the house tunnel ball relay. Many thanks to our PTA for providing some well-needed ice lollies part way through the afternoon.





Our winners were Azelin; congratulations to all of them and in particular to the five Year 6 children (Evelyn, Fleur, Jacob, Rhys and Rosie) who led their team with enthusiasm all day. They beat Mogg by a few points, with Ferentone and Gournay not far behind. Thank you to all the staff who helped with the morning activities as well as during the afternoon, as well as Mrs Haskins who returned with her husband to manage the finish line, with some close calls! We hope that all of you who came along enjoyed the afternoon.



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Thought for the Week

"" (Genesis 5:1-2 NIV)

Last week we looked at self-worth and the problem of wanting to please others to give us worth. As is so often the case, this doesn't work. We can get taken for granted or what we do isn't recognised. We end up feeling unworthy and unloved and we look for other ways to get noticed.

Last week's verse, <u>Genesis 1:27</u>, was about God creating us in his image. We looked at the fact that God wanted to make us - that we were made for a reason. It is this that gives us purpose and meaning. But what does it mean to be 'made in the image of God'?

There are a few interpretations of this phrase, but it doesn't mean we physically look like God. Most people agree that God does not have a physical presence. Christians would agree that Jesus was God in physical form, but on the whole this phrase is not referring to us 'looking like God'.

Often people interpret it as being 'like God' in other ways. Unlike other animals, we have the capacity for creativity and free will. When birds make nests and spiders make webs, they appear to be doing it from some inherent and natural capacity. Humans on the other hand, choose what to do and what to make. We have the ability to shape the world around us in ways that reflect divine creativity and autonomy.

Many would say humans have been given stewardship over the natural world, that we have a unique responsibility for creation. This does not mean that we can treat the world and its resources as we wish, something we are often guilty of. It means that we have been put in a position to look after it and tend for it.

Humans have the capacity for moral decision-making, rational thought and spiritual awareness. Many people would say that this is how we best represent God, reflecting his holiness and moral nature. We have the ability to choose right from wrong and are aware of our spiritual connection with ourselves, others, the world and God.

Christians believe that God is a Trinity, Father, Son and Holy Spirit, and that he exists in

relationship with one another.

Out of all these interpretations, the one I want to emphasise is that because we are 'made in the image of God', it means that we all have inherent value and dignity. This understanding underpins arguments for human rights, equality and justice, asserting that all people deserve respect and care.

If society doesn't recognise and understand this concept, are we in danger of disrespecting and dehumanising each other? Could we be guilty of doing this already?
