First of all, I would just like to say a huge *well done* to all of the children who have settled in amazingly this term.

This week we have been busy!

In celebration of #HelloYellow for World Mental Health Day and in support of the YoungMinds charity, the children wore yellow. They used different yellow paints, pens and pencils and enjoyed creating and modelling their own Colour Monster hats!

This term we have been thinking about who we are and what makes us special. We have been reading "*Elmer the Elephant*" – He's very colourful and likes to joke around and have fun with the other elephants. At a time when he was feeling sad, he dyes himself grey to be like everyone else. He soon becomes bored and returns to being the joker of the herd who makes everyone laugh. A rain cloud comes along and washes off Elmer's grey dye. The old elephant of the herd declares an annual Elmer day, when all the elephants except Elmer will be colourful. We experimented by painting our animals grey, then washing them to reveal their real colours.

To improve our fine motor and handling skills, we have been using buttons to decorate our Autumn leaf pictures. It has been a great term for Willow Class!

In Maths, we have finished our topic on *place value*. This week we have been learning about *addition* and *subtraction*. We have focused on adding and subtracting *ones*, *tens* and *hundreds* and have begun adding numbers which involve exchanging *ones*. After half term we will still be working on addition and subtraction.

In English, we have finished and self-corrected our final pieces of '*The Flood*', the children have worked incredibly hard! This week we have been focusing on Black History Month and have been learning all about Katherine Johnson. Willow Class has been creating newspaper articles based on this particular topic.

In Geography, we are coming to the end of our *Rivers and Mountains* topic. Over the past two weeks, we have been investigating the different formation of mountains and the formation of rivers. We briefly discovered the process of the water cycle and this will be continued after half term.

In Science, we have finished our topic on *forces and magnets* - we spent our last lesson investigating friction in a whole class experiment. The children shared some fantastic predictions! After half term, our Science topic will be on *Light*.

Finally in Art, Willow Class were able to display their amazing rose sketches in the hall this week. They all look incredible and they should all be extremely proud of themselves.

It has been a great first term with Willow Class. They have all worked incredibly hard and have settled into KS2. I am excited for the year ahead! Well done Willow Class.

Thought of the week

Thank you for your kindness and generosity in donating to the Somer Valley Foodbank.

Through our Harvest celebration today, we have been reflecting on how a story from the Old Testament in the bible still has relevance today.

We found out more about the characters of Naomi and Ruth, a mother and Daughter-in-law and both widows - how during a famine they had to flee their home and become refugees in Bethlehem. We thought about people around the world fleeing their homes whether this is for war or hunger and their needs arriving in a new land. Ruth showed **great**

kindness,courage and compassion refusing to leave Naomi and travelling with her.

We looked at how Boaz showed kindness to Ruth and provided food for them when they were hungry. In the Old testament there was a wonderful process known as gleaning. This was where farmers did not collect all the crops from the field but allowed those with need to follow and collect the crops left behind. We related this to shopping for ourselves and donating to foodbanks as a modern equivalent and sharing the things we have with others.

" 'When you reap the harvest of your land, do not reap to the very edges of your field or gather the gleanings of your harvest. Leave them for the poor and for the foreigner residing among you. I am the LORD your God.' " Leviticus 23: 22

There was much to explore and find out about in this story and it was great that it had a happy ending with the marriage of Ruth and Boaz, who later became the Great Grandparents of King David. The family line that Jesus was born into (in the same town that Ruth and Naomi fled home to!).



Last Wednesday, Trinity took three teams across to St. Mary's to play football: a girls team, a Year 5 & 6 team and a Year 3 & 4 team. It was a brilliant spectacle of football. All of the children played brilliantly, represented their schools fantastically and had a great time! It was a lovely event that was another way to strengthen the link between our two schools.
