#### **Class News:**


We have loved welcoming all of the children back after the half term break, hearing of their Halloween news and adventures of trick-or-treating. We have been busy making lots of colourful potions in various jars and pots in the water tray, incorporating lots of mathematical language, including colour names, quantities of ingredients and words such as *big, small, full* and *empty*. We have continued the Halloween theme in our PE sessions where we all became witches and wizards, working together making and mixing potions which magically made us *jump, run* or *slither* like a snake!

We have been focusing our learning on the well known Nursery Rhyme: "Hey Diddle Diddle the Cat and the Fiddle". We have been practising this every day so the children are now very familiar with it and know it well. The older year group have been using this rhyme to work on some of their phonics skills, such as rhyming and syllables. We have also been listening carefully to how we say our names, clapping out how many syllables are in each of them (Mrs McGroarty is a very tricky name to do this with!). The younger year group have been enjoying some listening and attention games, as well as singing with Miss Hancock.

To help with our fine motor skills, we have been using small beads/nuggets to create lovely firework shapes on big pieces of paper on the floor. This has required lots of sharing of equipment as well as space, not to mention patience and perseverance to line the little beads up all along the firework patterns. Great team work has been demonstrated, and lots of fun has been had by the children.

## **Conker Class**



#### **Class News:**

What a very busy fortnight we have had since half term! We have started a new text in Drawing Club and Literacy: "Where the Wild Things Are". We are learning some great new words such as majestic, amidst and horizon. We acted out how Max and his mum were feeling and were amazed to think about a forest growing in our bedrooms. On Friday, we went on a roaming adventure to the forest to see the majestic trees and explore amidst the trees. Sorry for the muddy coats!

We have looked at different materials and what happens when we put these in water as we created our own boats to sail our wild things.

In Maths, we have been thinking about circles and triangles, looking at how many straight lines and curved edges they have. Drawing a triangle is quite tricky!

In Phonics, we are looking at learning some *digraphs*. The children are really good at explaining what a digraph is - 2 letters that make one sound.

We have watched and thought about fireworks and poppies. We heard how some people plotted to burn down the Houses of Parliament whilst King James was there. We didn't think that was a good choice at all. We looked at an artist called *Georgia O'Keeffe* and the poppies that she had painted, then created our own,

focusing on using triangles in the centre rather than circles like *Yvonne Coomber*.

In PE, we now have Baskervilles coaches taking our gymnastics sessions. We got lots of climbing resources out and learned how to use them safely. So much fun!

## **Chestnut Class**

#### **Class News:**

It has been lovely to welcome the children back to Chestnut Class after the half term break. Everyone has returned full of energy and enthusiasm for learning.

In Maths, as part of our addition and subtraction topic, we have been focusing on using part whole models. We have been practising using stem sentences to discuss the parts, and representing the whole with hands-on resources and pictorial representations. This week, we have used our part whole models to help us with our addition number sentences.

The children have now completed their independent writing based on their own versions of: "Little Red Riding Hood". It has been wonderful to see the children using lots of our 'wow' words in their writing. We are now exploring an Irish Myth called "Song of the Sea". The children have really enjoyed being writers, sharing their own stories based on their own characters during their exploring



time too!

We have observed our special tree again to see how it has changed since we first visited in September and have been busy planting bulbs ready for Spring. We will continue to explore the tree as the seasons change. In the coming weeks we will be focusing on the theme of *senses*.

As part of our learning about Remembrance, we have been creating clay poppies and discussing the concept of peace in our school community and the wider world.

Next week, we will begin learning seasonal songs and preparing for our school performance: "Christmas with the Aliens". The songs are really catchy so I'm sure the children will share them with you at home!

## **Cedar Class**



#### **Class News:**

We have had a busy start to the term already and the children have jumped straight back into their learning. We have started our topic on Remembrance and WW1, posing questions and exploring new vocabulary like *armistice* and *ceasefire*. The children have really thought about our Christian value of *Respect* and how we show respect when thinking about remembrance. A highlight this term has been making tea light jars which had candles in them for our school service - the children are keen to display them at home.

In Maths, we have been counting in 2s, 5s and 10s and linking this learning to repeated addition and times tables. In our Number Sense Sessions, we are looking at *odds* and *evens* and making links to our 2s. Next week we will start our *addition* and *subtraction* unit.

In English, we have been using writing skills such as metaphors, verbs and suffixes to write captivating firework poems. Next week, we will write our own poems before starting our narrative writing.

In PSHE, we have been celebrating *differences*. *Jigsaw Jo* gave us some statements and we had to agree /disagree and explain our choice. For example: *girls prefer cooking over football*. This opened up some great debates as we discussed a new word - *stereotypes*. The children were kind and respectful as they listened to each other's points of view.

It has been a busy start to Term 2, but has been wonderful to welcome the children back!

In Maths, we have continued our topic on addition and subtraction. The children have spent the last two weeks adding and subtracting 1s across 10s and 10s across 100s. We looked at the Number Sense method 'making ten and then' and applied this to our learning. Next week, the children will be moving onto column addition and subtraction.

In English, we have started a new narrative novel called: "The Flood". We have spent this week reading through the picture-based book and discussing what is happening on each page. The children have begun writing opening sentences based on our book using time adverbials and adjectives.


In Science, the children have spent time researching *Mary Anning*. They worked in small groups and created fantastic mindmaps! We are now applying our research to our writing and will be creating interesting fact files about Mary Anning's life.

Finally, this month is all about Remembrance. The children spent time this week creating poppies, writing acrostic poems and having classroom discussions about the importance of Remembrance Day.

The children have all worked incredibly hard this week, a great start to Term 2. Well done, Willow Class.

Keep up the super work, Cherry Class!




## Class News:

#### Nahla interviewed Finley from Cedar Class:


We were learning about *Florence Nightingale* and *Mary Secole*. I enjoyed learning about them. My favourite person was Mary Secole.

This week, we have been reflecting on Remembrance and respect. We have thought about how we can be respectful and remember. We have looked at the significance of the poppy.

Poppies are used to remember those who have given their lives in battle as they are the flowers that grew on and near many First World War battlefields in Europe.

Poppies are described in the famous World War One poem "In Flanders Fields", by Canadian doctor, Lieutenant Colonel John McCrae. Since then, they have become a symbol of Remembrance, not just for those who gave their lives in World War One, but all those who have died on behalf of their country.

In our news story, we discovered that the Royal British Legion's Poppy Appeal is launching a new poppy for 2023; it is the first new design of the symbol in just under 30 years!

The Royal British Legion said it has been developing a plastic-free poppy for the past three years to become more sustainable by reducing single-use plastic. Design company Matter worked with paper company James Cropper to develop the design. The new poppies are made only from paper, which can be recycled in household waste collections. 50% of the paper also comes from the offcuts created during the production of paper coffee cups. The poppies feature a black centre embossed with the words "Poppy Appeal", and no longer have a plastic stem or centre

People will be able to buy the brand-new, plasticfree version from volunteers across the UK or from supermarkets. The annual campaign calls for the



public to wear a poppy as a show of solidarity towards the armed forces community in the lead up to Remembrance Sunday, which is on 12th November this year. Poppy sales also raise vital funds to support veterans, serving personnel and their families all year round.


## READ TOGETHER ...
