## **Acorn Class**

#### **Class News:**

We had a spooky start to the new term with lots of Halloween themed activities on Monday! The children have been exploring the different textures of pumpkins - scooping out the soft, mushy flesh and carefully picking out the hard, slimy seeds from the inside whilst using some careful hand-eye co-ordination to hammer screws into the smooth, hard surface. We also had fun experimenting with Halloween potions, mixing all kinds of weird and wonderful ingredients to make some slimy, gooey and colourful creations!

We have been reading the story of "The Blue Balloon" which tells us about a young boy and his dog Kipper who find a mysterious blue balloon. Despite their best efforts, the balloon will just not burst. We have been discovering the different textures balloons have - blowing up our blue balloons in class and squashing them, squishing them, stretching them and hitting them. Ask your children what words they have learned to describe the balloons they have been reading about from our story book. The children have also demonstrated some confident brush handling skills to paint some wonderful blue balloon pictures.

As we head towards the excitement of Firework Night the children enjoyed making some edible firework sparklers. We used breadsticks to dip into some thick, sticky icing before dipping and rolling them into multi-coloured sprinkles. Ask the children what noises their sparklers made!

#### BE BRIGHT- BE SEEN! SHINE BRIGHT LIKE A DIAMOND!

With the clocks going back and the nights growing longer we have been reflecting on "light in the darkness" in our Collective Worship this week. I'm sure many families will be attending a firework display this weekend and watching the dark skies brighten up with Fireworks - another way to celebrate light.

We have been promoting the Be Bright Be Seen road safety campaign to encourage all children to wear something bright and take extra care when out and about near roads, especially as nights draw in and visibility is reduced.

Last week, Hindus celebrated their festival of light - Diwali - across the world. We have explored the role of light in the story of Rama and Sita and the lights that were lit to guide them home. The story tells how good can triumph over evil and light over dark. It speaks of the importance of friendship and loyalty, giving and sharing, goodness and happiness, hope and new beginnings. It shows how friendship can provide support during dark and difficult times and can help us to find our true destiny (just like Rama).

#### Talking points:

What can I do to bring light into someone else's life in the dark winter months?

Welcome back to Term 2, Conkers!

This term, we are reading a book called: "Where the Wild Things Are". We have thought about what Max, the main character, did which made his mum angry and got him sent to his room. In his room a forest grew so we went to the forest to see if we could find Max. We have used lots of new words to describe different ways of moving, such as: wander, stroll and stomp. We discovered that a forest is growing in our pod too!

We have not learned any new sounds in Phonics this week, we have instead been consolidating our knowledge and practising reading and writing CVC words. We have spotted them, played bingo, pegged them, hidden them and written them. Next week we will learn 4 new sounds.

Monday was Halloween and the children were very excited to share with us what they were going to dress up as and if they had carved a pumpkin to put outside. We made our own pumpkins in class.






## **Chestnut Class**



#### **Class News:**



On Tuesday I began my very exciting new chapter with your amazing children. I was so impressed that the children remembered me from last year when I taught Year 4 at Trinity. It has been lovely getting to know the class and finding out about each and every child. I have been especially touched by the warm welcome your children have given me and the resilience they have demonstrated in managing the change.

During this week, Mrs Vivian came back to visit the children which they loved! We learned some more sounds in our Phonics lesson and we also tackled reading some longer words by chunking up the sounds. We wrote sentences which we rehearsed orally first.

Mr Pollock visited us during our Maths lesson on Wednesday, when we were learning about number lines. Learning was extended into discussions about the number zero, odd and even numbers, repeating patterns and whether numbers are greater than, equal to or less than other numbers.

In History, we discovered when, where and why *The Great Fire of London* occurred. The children were completely fascinated by this period in time. Try asking your child what they can remember.

Finally, we visited our beautiful new Sculpture Garden and the children told me what they liked about the sculpture - in particular, the way all the cogs and wheels are different but fit together so well. I explained that this is just like at our school; we are all different but we all play our part and are equally important.

**Class News:** 

Wow what a welcome back it has been this week!

We started the week by sketching pumpkins and remembering all we had learned from the Exhibition of Excellence. We focused on shape, tone and detail to create an accurate representation of the pumpkins and gourds. In Collective Worship, we carved a pumpkin and thought about the following prayer:

Dear God, Open my mind so that I can learn about You; (cut the top off the pumpkin) Take all my sin and forgive the wrong that I do; (clean out the inside) Open my eyes so Your love I will see; (cut eyes shaped like hearts) I'm sorry for the times I've turned up my nose at what You've given to me; (cut a nose in the shape of a cross) Open my ears so Your word I will hear; (cut ears shaped like a Bible) Open my mouth to tell others You're near (cut the mouth in the shape of a fish) Let Your light shine in all I say and do! (place a candle inside and light it)

In our English and History lessons this week, we have started a project on *The Gunpowder Plot*. We were fascinated by all the historical sources we discovered and we enjoyed sorting them. We had a go at making *inferences* and we discovered dates and resources from long ago that told us when these items would have been used. To celebrate firework night, we have created our own firework poems which we can't wait to finish with a big bang next week!

#### **Class News:**

Willow Class have worked extremely hard during their first week back!

In Maths this week, we have continued our topic on *addition* and *subtraction*. We have specifically focused on adding 1s across 10s and adding 10s across 100. Next week we will be working on column addition and subtraction.

In English, we have started a new book: "The Secret of Black Rock". The children have begun to write short sentences based on this narrative story, they have come up with some fantastic ideas! In Science, we have started a new topic on light. Our first lesson was based on what we think light is. The lesson involved the children conducting an investigation in which they observed objects in a dark box to see which object is easier to see. They all came up with great predictions!

Finally, in Geography, we have continued our topic on *rivers and mountains*. We spent the first lesson recapping our knowledge on the water cycle and began identifying features of a river.

It has been a fantastic week back for Year 3. They have settled in well and have worked extremely hard, well done Willow Class!

In Maths this week, Cherry Class has been working on addition and subtraction. We have explored calculations both with and without exchanges. The children were great at explaining regrouping and exchanging as they acted it out in pairs using place value counters and base ten.

In English, Philip Pullman's "Aladdin and the Enchanted Lamp" is inspiring us. The children have created some incredible sentences as we have explored fronted adverbials, alliteration, prepositions and more.

Sound is our exciting new Science topic. The children were brilliant during an elicitation activity on Tuesday and it was great to discover the knowledge, ideas and questions they already have and are bringing to this topic.

To link with our topic of sound, the children have also started to look at the work of *Wassily Kandinsky*. Their title pages in their sketchbooks look lovely!

## **Redwood Class**




It's been great to welcome everyone back after the half term break and the children have picked up right where they left off!
