## Headteacher's Message

Yesterday was Remembrance Day. It marked the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month when the guns fell silent on the Western Front after World War I. We had a special assembly where we remembered all those whose lives have been affected by conflict since World War 1, and particularly those who had lost their lives. Our Year 6 pupils visited the war memorial in Radstock to lay a poppy wreath on behalf of the school and to pay their respects at 11 o'clock. All children showed great maturity and respect.

We are looking forward to welcoming Simon Probyn (sculptor) and Dawn Reader (painter) to Trinity next Tuesday to officially 'open' our new sculpture – 'Acceptance'. The sculpture was designed using ideas from the children and depicts our school vision, strapline and values:

### "Encourage one another and build each other up."

At Trinity we promise to respect, show kindness and encourage each other as we learn to grow together. We recognise that we are all unique and precious to God: together we create our school family, a place where we are celebrated for who we are and all we achieve.

On Tuesday the children will have the opportunity to learn about the design process of such an impressive piece and ask the artists questions as well as share their own thoughts and responses to the piece. We have been working really hard on our phonics over the past two weeks in Conker Class. We have been practising 'pointing and sweeping' as we read our words and looking at the letter shapes and graphemes to make them out of objects. In Literacy, we have been reading the story: "Leaf Man". We went for a walk to collect some leaves and then used them to create our own leaf men and leaf animals.

Our topic work has been on *celebrations*. Last week, we found out some information about Diwali and Bonfire Night. We loved making our chocolate apples so much that we started looking at recipe books and created 'cakes' in the mud kitchen.

## **Chestnut Class**



#### **Class News:**

We started our week with a treasure hunt, finding clues to our new story. On the top field, Chestnut Class had to find a red clock, a wooden basket, a pair of glasses, a wolf and a tree. The children had to piece all the clues together and figure out which story the clues were for. Can you guess?

Following on from this, we began to tell the story of "Little Red Riding Hood". The children realised that Grandma was poorly and in order to cheer her up we needed to make some cakes.

To end our week and our discussion about the beginning of our story, the children had a walk through our woods, listening to sounds, seeing what they could see and began to think of ways to describe Little Red Riding Hood's journey to Grandma's house.

In Maths this week, we have continued with addition using our 'part, part, whole' method and tens frames, extending this by writing the calculations 5=2+3.

During Science and Geography, we have been looking closely at weather and seasons, comparing the UK to the Arctic and Antarctic. Chestnut Class began their weather reports in Geography and made a windsock to identify the direction of the wind in science.

This week, we have focused on the Christian Values *Trust* and *Respect*. We have looked at the idea of *remembering* and why it is important to remember key events like Guy Fawkes Night, Christmas and Remembrance. In class we have explored poppies in detail and have enjoyed making our own candle holders, paintings and poppy badges. Some of us made purple poppies to recognise animals that have been victims of war and black poppies to remember black, African, Caribbean and Pacific Islanders who lost their lives at war.

In RE, we have discussed respecting other people's religions and beliefs. We have focused on Judaism and some of the similarities to Chrsitanity. The children were shocked that if a mistake is made whilst writing the Torah, it would have to be written again and buried in holy ground. Our highlight this week has been making the Star of David and adding some special gems to it for decoration.

# Cherry Class Class News:

Cherry Class really enjoyed going outside to look at our amazing new sculpture last week! They were then inspired to create a sculpture of their very own using a variety of metal objects.

The children have become immersed in their new History topic: the Ancient Greeks. They have enjoyed discovering all kinds of curious beasts through our work on Greek myths. Last week, the children wrote a terrifying character description of a Minotaur. This week, the children have been planning a myth of their very own which they are intending to write next week. I am looking forward to reading about the terrifying mythical creatures.

In Science, the children have been finding out about 'states of matter'. They found out about the particles in solids, liquids and gases (such as helium in balloons and CO2 in fizzy drinks) and took part in role play to demonstrate how the particles are arranged in different states. Following this, they were able to classify different materials according to whether they were solids, liquids or gases. Some materials such as whipped cream gave rise to a very lively debate. On December 12th 2015, 196 countries signed the Paris Agreement to set global goals to stop temperatures from rising. This was a great moment.
