
TT ROCKSTARS



Class News:

We have had a busy two weeks in Conker Class. In Maths, we have been using a bar model to show how 3 can be created in different ways such as 3 + 0, 1 + 2. We are reading number sentences that include the + and = symbols and verbalising what this means. I was so impressed to see two boys go off and do this in their free exploring time.

In Phonics, we are learning lots of digraphs, such as 'ss', 'll' and 'ff'. The children are totally taking this in their stride and we are super proud of how they are applying them. We have also been learning some of the trickier sounds such as 'w', 'v' and 'y'. We have been using the scales to investigate 'weighing' and mixing different shades of 'vellow'.

In Outdoor Learning, we have been thinking about the Sculpture Garden and enjoying some peaceful cloud-watching time. We have made an artist's palette from nature and had a wild rumpus as part of our story: "Where the Wild Things Are".

In Maths, we continued our topic on subtraction. We have been focusing on exchanging the ones and tens and using base tens to help support our understanding. Next week, we will be moving onto *column subtraction*.

Lastly, in Geography, we have continued our *rivers* and *mountains* topic. The children have been working hard identifying features of a river. This week we investigated the River Thames, the children investigated a map of the River Thames, we spent time labelling different river features and what human features surround the River Thames.

We had a fantastic time exploring the bathhouses and speaking to 'Romans' about life in Roman Britain.


We were shocked to find out that they are roasted doormice and used Portuguese urine to brush their teeth!

The models and audio guides helped to transport us back in time and we enjoyed learning about how the Romans also worshipped Sulis Minerva at this incredible site.

During our workshops, we had brilliant fun being archeologists and Roman engineers as we uncovered artefacts, used technology to reconstruct ruins and tested ourselves as Roman engineers using cranes and building arches. We also loved learning about Roman attire, building mosaics and being taught about some of the ACTUAL artefacts found at the site.
