Schools Across the Ocean Project

We are very excited to tell you that Trinity Church School has been selected by The British Council to be part of the **Schools Across the Ocean project 2026**. Children in Year 5 will take part in this exciting and active project during Terms 4 and 5. They will be twinned with a class in a school in Brazil - we are waiting to hear who our partner school will be and will update you as soon as we hear. The children from the two schools will meet online and work on creative projects based on climate literacy. The children will work with peers from their twinned school, scientists, meteorologists, marine biologists, artists and writers to develop a project alongside other participating schools. The final project created by the schools will feature in COP30 in Brazil - the big climate meeting which brings together world leaders and environmental campaigners to challenge world leaders to act and make a change. The Schools Across the Ocean programme connects schools around the world in a common endeavour to bring climate and ocean literacy to pupils. This work is funded by The British Council and led by an interdisciplinary team at the University of Exeter with support from The Met Office and other scientific institutions. Class News:

This term, Acorns have been busy learning across lots of areas of the EYFS curriculum and have shown great enthusiasm. The children have been learning the rhyme: *"Down at the Station"*. They have really enjoyed using actions to support their understanding and to help them remember the words. The children have been very creative making their own junk model trains. They have explored different materials and practised joining and fixing with Mrs Franklin. The children have also been building trains out of Duplo.

In Maths, the children have been learning the song: *"Three Blind Mice"*. They have been singing the song with actions and using their finger numbers to represent amounts. They have also been exploring triangles, as they have three vertices and printing with paint using triangle shapes to create pictures and patterns. The children have also had a go at 'collaging' their own mouse pictures and developing their fine motor skills.

We are very pleased that our new children, who joined us in January, have settled in really well. It has been lovely to welcome them into Nursery and to see our numbers continuing to grow. We are now organised into groups according to age rather than academic year. Our 3 and 4-year-olds learn together during group times, while our youngest 2-year-olds enjoy more play-based learning together.

Well done to all the children for a fantastic start to the term!

Conker Class



Class News:

A great start back to this new year! The children have come back remembering all of the school's Golden Rules and have been showing us they are truly growing up and being model school pupils.

We have had a busy start with our Phonics learning as we are onto Phase 3 now, learning more of the complex digraphs (two letters making one sound) and even trigraphs (3 letters that make 1 sound)! The children's blending is coming on which shows how much their reading practice at school and at home really makes the difference - please keep reading at home! Their regular letter recognition and sound blending practice really aids their confidence and development in reading.

In Maths, we have been exploring how we can compose numbers to 5 using different methods. We have enjoyed using our 'bunny ears' to show how two numbers put together can make numbers up to 5. Our next stage is to recognise this with written representations.

We have really been enjoying our topic this term, *Once Upon a Time in My World* in which we have been discovering habitats and how there are many different types for different animals all over the world. In our book: "*Iris and Isaac*", two polar bears made a snow nest to share together so we have been exploring different types of nests. We have created nests both indoors and outside using various materials, hunting for our own natural materials to mimic birds' nests. Looking at the polar habitats for these polar bears Iris and Isaac, we were lucky to start the term with lots of ice and snow! We even learned about how those polar bears keep warm in such a cold climate doing the *blubber experiment*. We put our hands into the icy water, one hand bare and one hand in the bag of 'blubber' (fat) to notice the temperature difference!

Chestnut Class



Class News:

The children have settled beautifully into the new term and it has been wonderful to see their enthusiasm, positive attitudes to learning and their curiosity.

In English, our focus text is: "*Lost and Found*". The children were very excited to have a surprise visitor – a penguin! This inspired lots of fantastic writing, as the children wrote question sentences for the penguin and practised using question marks correctly. We will continue learning our class story and will soon be ready to write our own versions of this adventure story.

Our theme in Geography is *Poles Apart*. The children will be learning about the polar regions, including the climate and the animals that live there. As geographers, we have

been exploring globes and maps, identifying the North and South Poles as well as the equator.

In Maths, the children have been learning about *place value to 20*. We have been using dienes and tens frames to make and represent numbers, helping the children understand tens and ones. Alongside this, we have been revisiting addition and subtraction to 10 using bar modelling and part-whole models, and developing problem-solving skills by working on missing number problems.

I am very proud of the way the children are approaching their learning and look forward to an exciting term ahead. Well done Chestnut Class!

Class News:

Welcome back, Cedar Class! I hope you have all had a lovely start to the New Year. The children have come back with eagerness and a real readiness for learning.

In Literacy, we are exploring: *"The Crow's Tale"* by Naomi Howarth. We have explored characters and key events in the story and are focusing on using *conjunctions* to expand ideas.

In Maths, we have been exploring money. We have enjoyed working practically to recognise coins, make amounts and find different ways to make totals. We are developing our ability to represent our thinking.

Our Geography focus this term is the UK. We have started the topic by thinking about where our own homes are in the local area. We are

excited to explore the countries of the UK and facts about each of them.

In Computing, we have been exploring algorithms and using programmable robots like Beebots. We are enjoying programming robots and finding out what happens. This week, we explored predicting the outcome of an algorithm before testing it ourselves.

Our PSHE learning this week will explore dreams and goals. As part of Term 3, we have chosen a short term goal that we would like to achieve. We will be sharing our progress on Seesaw later this term.

A brilliant start to Term 3 that I am sure will continue!

Class News:

It has been a busy start to Term 3 but the children have all worked incredibly hard!

In Maths, we have started to look at bigger multiplication calculations. The children have worked on multiplying by 10 and how to identify a multiple of 10. We have also started to look at multiplying a 2-digit number by a 1-digit number. We will continue to focus on this next week.

In English, our new topic is poetry. The children have been looking at the poem called: *"The Magic Box"* by Kit Wright. We have been practising writing *stanzas* inspired by Kit Wright and I have been so impressed with the children's imagination. Their poems are already sounding amazing!

In Science, Willow Class has been busy being scientists. We have conducted two experiments this term: Last week, the children investigated magnetic and

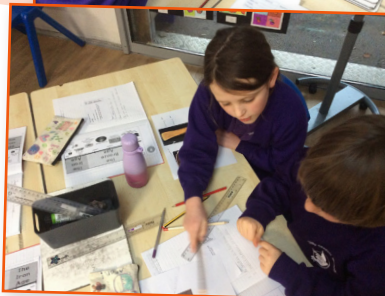
non-magnetic materials and this week, our focus was on magnetic fields. The children worked very hard conducting an experiment to test the strength of different magnets. I was very impressed with their predictions and conclusions!

In History, we have started our new topic on the *Stone Age*. We spent last week observing a range of artefacts and making assumptions on how humans lived during the Stone Age. Next week we will be investigating the question *"Was Stone Age man just a simple hunter and gatherer?"*

Finally, in French, we applied our knowledge on shapes and looked at the French artist *Henri Matisse*. The children created some wonderful artwork pieces inspired by Matisse using a variety of different shapes.

We have had a brilliant start to Term 3 - keep up the good work, Willow Class!

Class News:

Cherry Class has had a very busy and exciting few weeks. The children have especially enjoyed their swimming sessions, attending three times a week and developing their confidence and skills in the water.

In Music, we have continued our learning on body percussion. As part of this topic, the children have begun composing their own pieces of music to represent the different layers of the rainforest. They have explored the animals, sounds and textures found in each layer and are now using these ideas to create a piece of music for all four rainforest layers.

In French, the children have been learning how to describe hair and eye colour. They started by describing people verbally and matching descriptions to different characters. They are now able to write simple sentences in French and particularly enjoyed creating their own characters and writing descriptions for them.

In English, we have been exploring the structure of *haikus* and have worked together to write poems inspired by the rainforest. Next week, the children will begin writing their own haikus based on the joys of Spring.

Redwood Class



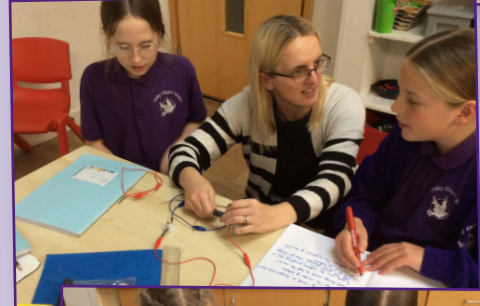
Since Christmas, we have been busy in Year 6 beginning our revision as we head towards the SATs tests. In English, we have focused on understanding and using grammatical word classes while in Maths, our topic is *fractions, decimals* and *percentages*. The children are working so hard and we know their hard work will pay off.

In Science, we have started our new topic: *electricity*. So far, we have put together basic circuits, drawn scientific diagrams with the scientific symbols and investigated whether the number of batteries impacts the brightness of the bulb in a circuit. Next week, we are going to use our learning to write a set of instructions in English about how to make a basic electrical circuit - I look forward to reading them.

Our *World War Two* topic has now come to an end, with the children producing excellent concept maps to conclude our learning. Now, our topic is the *Ancient Greeks*. We have discussed how the Ancient Greek era can be split into five separate time periods and analysed how and why we know about the Ancient Greeks - archeologists have examined pottery and paintings from the time. Next, we'll be learning about Alexander the Great.

This week, we enjoyed a drama workshop hosted by Bath Spa University drama students - it was great!

Thought of the week

Our Big Question this week continues with our theme of making our world a better place.

Recently, a new award, called the *Jane Goodall Earth Medal*, has been created to celebrate people who work to help others and care for the world. It is named after Dr Jane Goodall, who spent her life protecting animals and encouraging people to look after nature. The award recognises kind and caring actions that make a positive difference, even when people are not looking for praise.

Who was Jane Goodall?

Dr Jane Goodall was a scientist who became famous for studying chimpanzees in the wild – even described as a chimpanzee expert. She wanted to learn how animals live, think and behave.

Who can receive the medal?

The medal can be given to people from around the world who help animals, the environment, or who help grow human connections with nature. They might be scientists, community leaders, teachers, or others working to improve the world.

Why was it created?

The award was created to celebrate kindness, care and responsibility, and to show that helping others and looking after the world really matters.

What is the main message of the medal?

The Jane Goodall Earth Medal reminds us that small actions can have a big impact, and that anyone can help make the world a better place.

Things to talk about at home:

Talk to someone at home about the summit and the campaign.

Do you think lots of people will choose to take part? Why?

Share who influences you. Talk about how some of the people we admire or look up to are well-known or famous, and others may be family or friends. Ask someone at home about who influenced them when they were younger. What impact did they have?

Let's celebrate: It was exciting to hear that Beatrix in Year 4 completed a litter pick with her family showing care and responsibility for their local area last week, collecting 5 bin bags of litter. Well done, Beatrix.

FASCINATING FACTS

The Royal National Lifeboat Institute (RNLI)

- There are over 230 lifeboat stations all around the coast of Britain & Ireland

KEEPER OF THE EARTH Light in the Shadows



A thrilling, fast paced, sci-fi adventure novel for ages 8+.

Saving Earth wasn't on Lexie's birthday to-do list. But when she stumbles upon a mysterious Orb in her local toyshop, the world as she knows it is thrown into chaos. Lexie's greatest challenge is not just preventing an impending disaster, but uncovering the truth about a past she can't quite remember. With time running out, Lexie must trust in her own instincts and find the courage to face the unknown or risk losing everything she holds dear.

What will children enjoy about his book?

Apart from the thrill of the chase and excitement of a battle between good and evil, readers will laugh and maybe shed a tear or two (nothing too scary). They will meet new characters along the way and join Lexie as she begins to understand who she really is. Themes of love, loss, friendship and clever tenacity resonate throughout the story from beginning to end.

What will happen in the assembly?

Being an author and an illustrator will make my visit extra special. I will show the children a short video highlighting my illustrations, read from my book and then answer questions.

I have worked as an animator & vfx artist on children's shows such as Dr Who & Sarah Jane Adventures for the BBC, Shane the Chef as well as The Pirates feature film at Aardman. More recently, I've returned to my passion for writing and drawing and now create my own stories for children from 8 and above. I also hold a current Enhanced DBS certificate.
