Thought of the Week

'And we know that God causes everything to work together for the good of those who love God and are called according to his purpose for them.'

(Romans 8:28)



Today is Friday the 13th. Cue the spooky music. Friday the 13th has long been considered an unlucky day. But why? There are a few different theories.

According to History.com, many Western cultures associate the number 12 with completeness. There are 12 months in a year, 12 zodiac signs, 12 gods of Olympus, 12 tribes of Israel, and 12 disciples of Jesus. Because 12 is so complete, it only makes sense that 13 would be considered unlucky. The ancient Code of Hammurabi even skips the 13th law (though experts say this was probably a clerical error).

There are also two famous stories of an unlucky 13th guest: in the Bible, Judas Iscariot is the 13th person at the Last Supper, and he goes on to betray Jesus. In Norse mythology, Loki is the uninvited 13th guest at a feast for the gods, and he causes plenty of chaos.

So that's why 13 is considered unlucky. But what about Friday?

In Christianity, Jesus is believed to have been crucified on a Friday. There are other, less well-known, instances of Friday being seen as unlucky in Christian tradition: Eve is said to have given Adam the apple on a Friday, and Cain is said to have killed Abel on that day, too. It's not just Christianity, either. In the Norse myth, the goddess Frigga gathered the devil and 11 witches (so 13 altogether) together every Friday, which was known as the "Witch's Sabbath." Thirteen is also the number of the Death card in Tarot.

Well for some of us, when it is Friday 13th, we may feel happier not leaving the house and tucking ourselves away in bed for the day with a good book. Some of us may prefer to do this anyway, regardless of which day it is!

But for Christians, today's verse bears special significance. If God loves us, then surely he will cause everything to work together for our good. But only in regards to his *plans* for us.

This may mean that things don't go the way we want them to. If we have plans that differ from God's plans, then surely our day, week or even month may not go the way we hoped it would. The difference is knowing that our lives are in the hands of someone who knows us better than we know ourselves and will work things out in our lives for our ultimate benefit.

So whatever your thoughts about Friday 13th, surely it is just a day like any other day. Does it really hold some inherent unluckiness or is it just a number and a day that have been put together for all the reasons already mentioned.

Instead of getting upset about a specific day in the calendar, surely there's more value in making the most of each day we are given and remembering to count our blessings.
