It has been lovely welcoming Acorns back after the holidays. We have been focusing on what special moments the children had during this time and it has been great hearing all the different celebrations which have taken place.

The new song that we are learning this term is: "Down at the Station". The children have practised singing it several times and are now confident to fill in any gaps when the grown-ups stop singing. We have also learned some new vocabulary connected to this theme, such as: engine, driver, train and station. We have played games to help us remember these words and have really impressed the adults with how well we can identify the missing word/picture from a group if they are hidden or taken away. We have worked together to create a big train track scene which we were then able to drive the trains on. So much great communication, sharing ideas, sharing space and working together has been demonstrated to create a wonderful picture including a station, tracks, stop signs and a forest which was enjoyed by everyone.

This week, we have also been learning about an artist called *James Brunt*, who specialises in creating artwork using natural materials. The children have enjoyed becoming dynamic designers, exploring and recreating artwork. Pine cones, conkers, circular shaped wooden discs, pebbles and leaves have all been used in creative art pieces. We wonder if these could be recreated at home? We would love to see!

During Maths this week, we have been studying the number 3. The children are starting to subitise using objects and are becoming super speedy at their counting. We have had a special visitor in Acorns this week - Steve the Robot attended our morning Maths sessions and very much enjoyed the children feeding him 3 pom poms. He also played a game of *Find the 3*. The children had to find the 3 pom poms in the pot after Steve the Robot had jumbled up all the different pots - such fun was had!

All the children have settled back in brilliantly. A warm welcome to our new starters also.

Conker Class







Class News:

Welcome back, Conker Class.

We have loved hearing about each other's Christmas celebrations and especially sharing the special times we spent with our families. In RE, we discussed our special places. The children were fantastic at describing what their special place looked like and why it was special to them. Some of us made models, wrote sentences, drew pictures and created paintings of them. Next week, we will be thinking about why a church is a special place to Christians.

We started our new topic on habitats. We spent time discussing what we already know about desert, polar, urban and rainforest habitats. We already know a few animals which live in each habitat and thought about things which we would like to find out. This week we read our new story about two polar bears: "Isaac and Iris". We looked at the type of habitat they live in and found out about different animals which also live there. We learned about the Northern Lights and created beautiful artwork using chalks and smudging techniques.

We have been working on the concept of *zero* this week, counting down from 5 to 0, ordering the numerals and quantities. We have looked at matching different representations of quantities form 0-5. We played a game

where we counted down from 5 and if we said 0 we had to sit down. We worked out that if we did this in pairs, whoever started was the one who remained standing. Have a go at home. We matched towers of quantities of cubes to numerals. Some of us linked this to habitats and said it looked like a city, an urban habitat.

We have been looking at ice and how we can melt it by using salt and different temperatures of water. This linked to our discussion about polar habitats.

In Phonics, we are learning new sounds. They are all *di* or *trigraphs* (ai, ee, igh and oa this week) . We are really thinking hard about how to use these in our writing.

We loved hearing Toby and Theo's show-and-tells this week and can't wait to hear some more over the course of the term.

Chestnut Class

Class News:

It has been lovely to welcome the children back to Chestnut Class. They have returned full of energy and ready to learn. They have enjoyed sharing their Christmas news and we have had some wonderful showand-tell sessions with some fantastic questions.

In English, we have started our new adventure narrative based on "Lost and Found". We have been getting to know the story by reading the book, watching parts of the animation and exploring the resources on our story table, which has helped us sequence the plot points. The children have created some amazing story openers and have used adjectives to describe the little boy and the penguin.

To conclude our addition and subtraction topic, we have been using various methods to take away. We have been using number lines,



crossing out amounts and creating our own *first, then, now* subtraction stories. The most popular themes seemed to be cookies, chocolate cake and sweets! Next week, we will be beginning our learning on *place value to 20*.

In Phonics, we are continuing to learn new Phase 5 alternative sounds as well as learning new and consolidating previously taught common exception words. It has been great to see the children using these words in their writing. We will start the reading raffle again this week so please keep reading at home! In PE, the children are working on their gymnastic skills. They approach these lessons with great enthusiasm! Well done, Chestnut Class - what a fabulous start to the new term!




Cedar Class

Happy New Year everyone! I hope you all had a wonderful Christmas break. It has been lovely to welcome Cherry Class back for Term 3. The children have hit the ground running and have made a fantastic start to the new term. In Maths, we have been looking at *length* and *perimeter*, measuring in metres and kilometres, as well as measuring perimeter of shapes. Our new history topic this term is on the Anglo-Saxons, who we will be learning more about in the coming weeks, as well as linking this to our guided reading work.

In English, we are writing persuasive adverts for *Stroodles*, which are straws made entirely from water and wheat, with the aim of tackling the issue of plastic pollution in our seas. The children were quite shocked to learn exactly how much plastic is in our oceans and are writing to bring about a positive change!

In Science, we are looking at states of matter and so far have been exploring the differences between solids, liquids and gases. In Computing, we have begun our unit on programming and in PE, we are focusing on gymnastics this term.

They are enjoying the book and would recommend it because there are lots of mysteries and adventures in the story. Their favourite part of the story (so far) was when they found out about pen pals and Martha's favourite character is Esther Jenkins. Both children said they would also recommend the "Percy Jackson" series and the "Skandar" series for Year 6 pupils.

Savannah and Shiloh report that, in Year 5, we have just finished "Cosmic" which was an adventure book. One of the most intense parts of the book was when the rocket malfunctioned in space. FASCINATING FACTS

The Royal National Lifeboat Institute (RNLI)

When the crew and passengers of boats get into difficulty at sea, they can **trust** the lifeboat crews from RNLI to try their very best to rescue them. Many of the crew and coastguards are volunteers.

- There are over 230 lifeboat stations all around the coast of Britain & Ireland
- Crews are on call 24 hours a day, every day of the year. They must be ready to drop what they are doing at a moments notice to go out on their lifeboat

The disciples were just exhausted. All day crowds and crowds of people had been following Jesus, listening as he taught them about God's love and watching as he healed people who were ill. They rowed away from the shore while Jesus went to the front of the boat and lay down. The waves lapped gently against the side of the boat, lulling Jesus into a peaceful sleep.

Suddenly the wind began to blow dark clouds across the sky. The waves weren't so gentle anymore. The little boat began to pitch and rock. The men looked anxiously across the lake. But Jesus still lay sleeping in the front of the boat.

The wind blew stronger. Great gusts rocked the boat. Spray from the waves soaked everyone inside. But still Jesus lay sleeping in the front of the boat.
