## Class News:



I have been extremely impressed with the children's work on fractions in Maths. Many of the concepts were challenging at first; however, the children have persevered and are now solving problems with increasing confidence and accuracy. Their resilience and determination have been wonderful to see.

In English, Badgers have been writing descriptive paragraphs, carefully using expanded noun phrases and similes to add detail to their writing. They have also been practising the correct use of contractions and apostrophes for possession, applying these skills thoughtfully in their independent work.

In Geography, we have been learning about the oceans and the continents of the world, using maps and atlases to support our understanding. In History, the children have been investigating different sources of evidence and discussing what they can teach us about the Great Fire of London. They have begun to understand how we learn about the past through a range of materials.

In PSHE, Badgers have been developing their teamwork skills through collaborative activities, as well as designing their own imaginative 'dream birds', demonstrating creativity and cooperation.

It's been a very enjoyable final few weeks of term in Foxes. In English, we have written our own diaries based on the book 'Stone Age Boy'. The class have really enjoyed this book and have really impressed us with their creativity and attention to detail.

In Science, we have been learning about how fossils are made and have conducted experiments about the durability of different types of rock.

We thoroughly enjoyed being part of **Number Day** and were pleased to welcome in parents and family members for a morning of Maths games and activities as well as dressing up as a number and creating our own number based board games. Additionally, in Maths we have been learning about factor pairs and factors of different numbers.

Finally, in Art, we have been making our own cave paintings using a range of natural materials such as moss, mud and stones to make marks and recreate an animal drawing in a similar style to the way that cave people would have done in the neolithic period. This term has flown by - can't wait for more fun in Term 4!

First of all, we had a lesson where we learnt all about Ancient Greek gods and goddesses and how they were represented on Greek vases. We looked at lots of different vases and learnt what the different colours and decorations meant.

Our second session involved us practising how to write the 24 letters of the Greek alphabet. We learned how to write our own names in Greek.

After lunch, we were given a tour of Downside Abbey. It was really impressive. We enjoyed working out all of the dates that we found written in Roman numerals. Then, we went to their huge sports hall to play some fun games.

We returned to the classroom for the main activity of the day,

which was designing our own Greek vases. We added pictures of Greek gods and goddesses and wrote our names in Greek on them.

It was a brilliant day which everyone enjoyed.

Molly said that she enjoyed learning lots of new things about Greek gods.

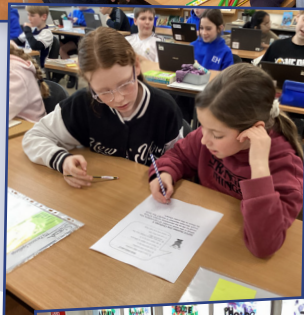
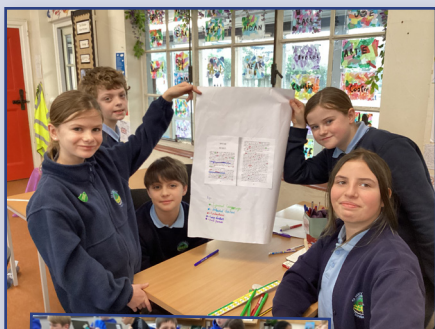

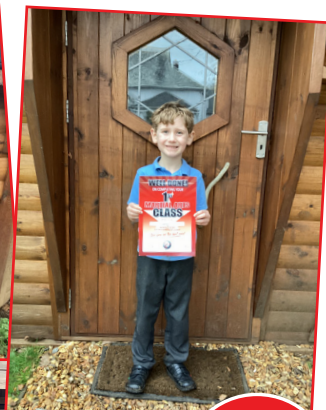

# Thought of the Week

**'Love is patient, love is kind...It always protects, always trusts, always hopes, always perseveres.' (1 Corinthians 13:4-7)**

Recently a friend of mine was speaking to her hairdresser about faith. The hairdresser wanted to understand what made her choose to become a Christian. My friend was quite clear on this and felt that there were three things that they wanted to share that helped them to make this decision.

The acronym was HAL, which for any sci-fi fans out there will know is the name of the artificial intelligent character and main antagonist in the Space Odyssey films. Apart from the same letters being used, there is no other connection here, but it might help you remember the acronym after reading this page.

So the H stands for Hope. Everyone needs hope. We need to believe that things are going to either stay good or get better. As Friedrich Nietzsche said, *"He who has a why to live can bear almost any how."* If there is no purpose, no meaning in life, we ultimately struggle. My friend was clear that for her, having a belief and relationship with God gives her life meaning and purpose and ultimately hope.

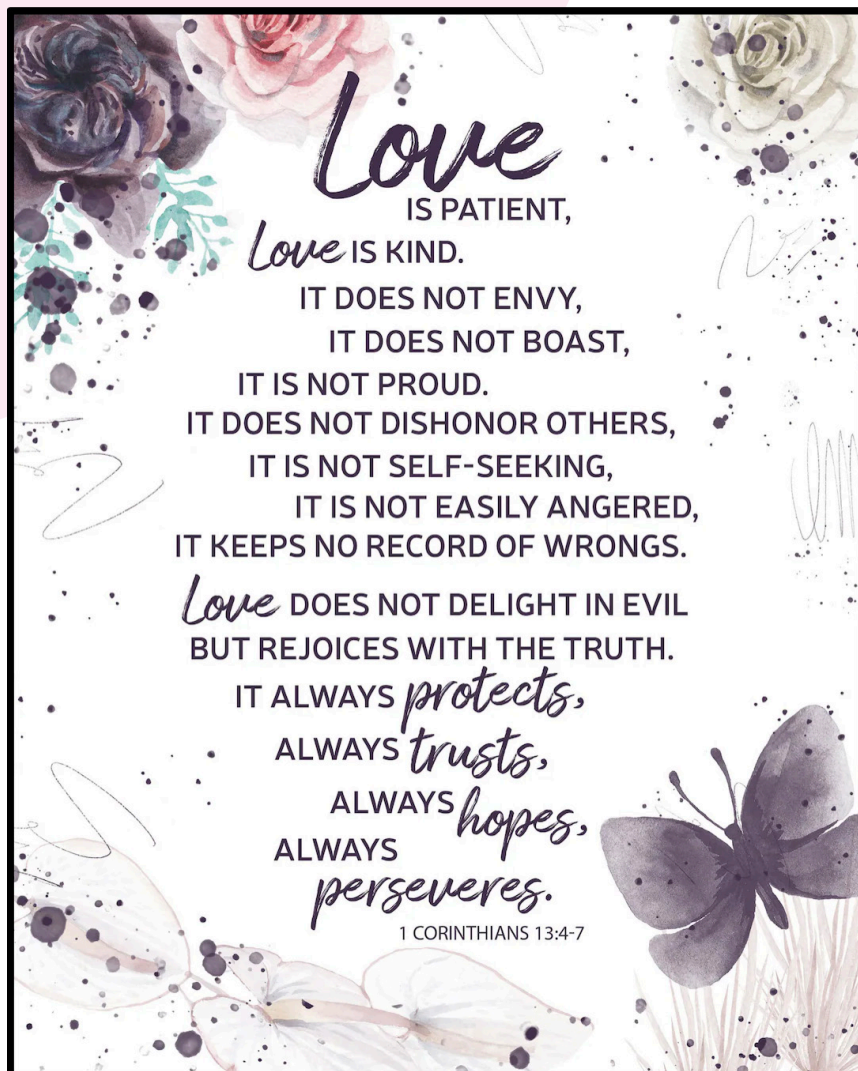
The A stands for Acceptance. Brené Brown said, *"True belonging doesn't require us to change who we are; it requires us to be who we are."* Knowing we are accepted for who we are makes all the difference. It means we don't have to conform to other people's expectations of us. It also means we don't have to try and be someone else. We can enjoy being ourselves. If God made us then surely he made us well. Psalm 139:14 says that we are *'fearfully and wonderfully made'* and that God's *'works are wonderful'*. Again, hope, purpose and the knowledge that you are accepted.



Finally the L stands for Love. There are so many different understandings of the word love, but the one that is usually associated with God's love is agape - selfless, unconditional love. This is the kind of love that doesn't depend on your actions, looks, or status. It's caring for someone simply because they're a person, not because of what they do. That's the sort of love that my friend was referring to.

She ended the conversation by saying surely everyone wants these three things in their lives and the hairdresser had to agree.
