

Acorn Class

Class News:



What a busy start to the term! We have welcomed five new children into our class this January: Sienna, Iris-Robyn,

Kalix and Stanley have joined our younger children in the Hedgehog group, and Tygh has joined our older children in the Squirrel group! A very warm welcome to you all. I know the rest of the children in Acorns have been excited to share our routines and have enjoyed playing and exploring together - particularly outside in our lovely Forest School.

We have been learning the rhyme: "Down at the Station". The children have been exploring language through pictures and actions and independently performing parts of the rhyme. I wonder if any of the children can share the rhyme with you at home...? Our quality texts linking to our rhyme have been: "The Train Ride", "Busy Trains" and "Trains, Trains, Trains!". The children have also been practising recognising the letter shapes in their name by matching individual letters to their name cards.

In Maths, Squirrels have been developing their proficiency in recognising quantities and numerals for 3. They have also been practising fast recognition of up to 3 objects to ensure they can subitise accurately. Both Squirrels and Hedgehogs have been learning: *"Three Blind Mice"* to help them visualise what 3 looks like as a quantity. We have been using puppets and finger numbers to do this.

As part of our creative curriculum, the children have been making train tracks, mark-making with train wheels and building their own trains in roleplay too!

Next week, Early Years warmly invites all Nursery and Reception Class to our movie night. We will be screening Dreambuilders complete with complimentary hot chocolate, marshmallows and popcorn. Children are welcome to bring a small cuddly toy or blanket and pyjamas to change into at the end of the day. All proceeds will go towards an exciting new climbing frame we are fundraising for, to be located in the Early Years outdoor area.

Conker Class



Class News:

What a busy first couple of weeks back at school! With the snowfall and icy temperatures, we had such fun exploring outside and seeing what happens with the ice if we crack it, smash it or add water to it. We have been looking at: *"The Snowman"* in literacy which allowed us to actually make some of our own snowmen! We have also started our topic on *habitats* with our new book called: *"Iris and Isaac"* all about polar bears being friends, making their snow nest and exploring the Arctic.

The children have come back really keen to learn our new phonemes this term as they are all digraphs, and even trigraphs (three letter phonemes). We have started a new phase in Phonics learning - Phase 3, meaning we will be able to decode slightly more complex words. The children's reading is really coming on and it is clear they are using their Phonics packs at home, so thank you!

In Maths, we are exploring the number zero and where it fits in with our numbers to five. The children are understanding the concept well and doing really well with our subitising (where we look at a representation of a number - for example, 3 daisies and we can say 3 confidently without having to count 1,2,3).

In RE, we have been discussing our special places. The children have been thinking about why these places are special, who we have been there with and special things we might see and experience. Some of us painted our special places on rocks, made models using junk modelling, used the small world to recreate our different places and wrote about them. Next week we will be discussing one of the special places a Christian might go (a church). We have been learning about beat and tempo in Music. We discovered that a beat always stays the same and tempo means how fast or slow a piece of music is. The children were fantastic at clapping, jumping and stamping to the beat and used movement to explore the tempo. We discussed how we moved when the tempo was fast or slow.

Next week, Early Years warmly invites all Nursery and Reception class to our movie night. We will be screening *Dreambuilders* complete with complimentary hot chocolate, marshmallows and popcorn. Children are welcome to bring a small cuddly toy or blanket and pyjamas to change into at the end of the day. Chestnut Class

Class News:

We've had a great start to the new year and all the children have returned to school with such positivity and enthusiasm.

The highlight of this week was a visit from the Trunk Theatre group who retold the story of *The Great Fire of London*. The children were an integral part of the performance as they had the opportunity to dance, act and sing throughout. At the end of the show, the children became architects as they designed and 'rebuilt' London!

We had a mystery visitor in Chestnut Class this week - a penguin! This provided the children with an exciting way to practice writing question sentences. We are hoping that the penguin will respond to our questions! We will be exploring: *"Lost and Found"* by Oliver Jeffers as our key text this term. We will be acting out our class version to help us remember the structure of the story and to extend our story vocabulary. In Maths, we are exploring *place value to 20* this term. We have been using concrete apparatus and pictorial representations to support understanding of numbers 10 to 12. In Number Sense, we have been using tens frames and number lines to help us calculate *one more* and *one less than* a given number.

As Geographers, we have been using maps, atlases and globes to find the North and South Poles. We have been identifying the equator and finding out how it affects our world. The children have enjoyed being explorers by creating their own maps and pretending to be Arctic explorers in our role play area.

It's been a great start to the term, Chestnut Class. Keep aiming high!

Cedar Class

Class News:

A huge welcome back to everyone! What a great start we have made to Term 3. The children have been fantastic at welcoming me to Trinity and have demonstrated such kindness and enthusiasm to their learning so far. It has been lovely continuing to get to know them.

Over the last couple of weeks, we have been thinking about skill consolidation and remembering essentials to use when writing. We have focused on exploring adjectives to create descriptive noun phrases. This week, we have started to explore our key text called: *"The Crow's Tale"* by Naomi Howarth and made predictions for what might happen in the story. The children are very excited by this book and enjoyed discussing bird watching in Picture News.

In Maths, we have been consolidating work from last term. We have been using

our knowledge of number bonds to help us when adding to *find 10 and then...* The class has been fantastic at working practically with resources and using jottings to help calculate effectively. We have also been developing our confidence with recognising numbers in different ways and counting in a range of intervals such as in 2s, 5s and 10s.

This week we were really lucky to have a visit from Trunk Theatre on Monday. The children loved hearing about the *Great Fire of London* and it was a fantastic opportunity for us all to share. Cedar Class listened attentively and joined in brilliantly to the interactive elements of the show. They worked well as a team to help redesign London at the end of the show too.

We are all looking forward to the term ahead - keep up the fab start, Year 2!

Willow Class

Class News:

What a fantastic start to Term 3!

On Monday, we had a visit from the Trunk Theatre Company, who acted out the story of the Great Fire of London. This was a brilliant experience and the children loved getting involved in all the interactive elements of the show.

In English, we have started our unit on *poetry*. So far we have explored six different genres of poetry and had a look at the features of each one. The children particularly enjoyed a riddle about the beach and the nonsense poem: *"On the Ning Nang Nong"* by Spike Milligan.

In Maths, the children have started developing their



multiplication skills by multiplying 2-digit numbers and 1-digit numbers together. They have also been learning how to use bar models when working out more complex questions.

In Art, we have begun our topic on *Prehistoric art* and have been looking at different pieces of art and what they have in common. As a class, we noticed that a lot of the Prehistoric artwork had animals in them and therefore we had a go at drawing some line drawings of animals.

Cherry Class



Cherry Class has had a great start to Term 3!

In Maths last week, we continued our topic on *multiplication and division*. The children have been learning about column multiplication and practising how to set it out neatly in our Maths books. This week, we have looked at division and the children have been learning about the bus stop method when dividing a 2-digit number with a 1-digit number.

In English, we have started our new topic on poetry. Our poem is: *"Tyger Tyger"* by William Blake. We have spent the last two weeks unpicking what the poem is about and next week the children will be having a go at re-writing the poem but on a different animal.



In History, the children spent their first lesson looking at artefacts and making assumptions on who the Anglo-Saxons were. I was so impressed with their observational skills and the children came up with some fantastic thoughts and opinions.

In Science, we have continued our topic on *states of matter*. Last week, the children looked at the properties of solids and liquids. This week, the children conducted small experiments based on evidence for gases.

This term in Geography, we are learning about South America. So far, we have been introduced to some of the countries in the continent and have also begun learning about the Amazon Rainforest.

We have been really challenging ourselves with Maths so far this term, focusing on *multiplication and division*, including multiplying 4-digit numbers by 2-digit numbers!

In Writing, we have been producing setting descriptions based on the book: *"The Viewer"* by Shaun Tan. I have been really impressed with the descriptive detail the children have been using, including adjectives, verbs, adverbs and personification.

In Science, we have continued our work on forces and this week we were learning about how levers, gears and pulleys can help changes in movement and direction and assist lifting.

We have lots of exciting things to look forward to this term, including our trips to Young Voices and our residential to St Briavels!

Class News: Redwood Class

Year 6 have had a good start to Term 3 - the children have hit the ground running and are all working hard.

We have started looking at decimals in Maths (decimal place value, addition and subtracting decimal numbers and multiplying and dividing decimals too) before we start looking at converting fractions, decimals and percentages.

In our Writing lessons, we have been reading: *"The Viewer"*, a fantasy and mystery fiction book written by Gary Crew and vividly illustrated by Shaun Tan; we will be writing setting descriptions using personification next week, all based on the city dump setting in the story.

In Reading, we are continuing to focus on key comprehension

skills: retrieval and inference. After some time focused on reading and understanding poetry before Christmas, we are looking at fact sheets at the beginning of this term.

In PE, our new topics are *dance* and fitness. In Science, we are continuing our learning on *Evolution* and Inheritance and this week we have learned about how the Galapagos Island finches have evolved over time, based on their environmental context and how natural selection has played a role in their adaptation over time.

We are all really looking forward to going to Young Voices and have been practising the songs! Pictures and videos will be posted on SeeSaw.

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Thought of the week

Our reflective question links with our school value of Respect.

Birdwatch is an annual UK-wide citizen science project held every January, inviting people to gather data to support the work of scientists. Both the Big Garden and the Big Schools' Birdwatch offer people the chance to count birds visiting gardens, playgrounds or school outdoor spaces. This simple activity helps identify bird populations and the most common species. The data collected then helps scientists monitor bird numbers and deduce whether any species are in decline.

God teaches us to learn from His creation. We can take time to admire and appreciate the animals and birds around us. Each bird and creature is part of God's plan, and by helping to protect them, we show love and respect for His creation.

Things to do / talkabout at home:

- You might want to sign up for the Big Garden Bird Watch and take part. On 24th -26th January. https://www.rspb.org.uk/whats-happening/big-garden-birdwatch
- Look at a bird book and discuss which birds you recognise. Do you have a favourite?
- How can we encourage our bird wildlife to flourish?
- Could you make or hang up a bird feeder and see which birds come to visit?

FASCINATING FACTS The Royal National Lifeboat Institute (RNLI)

When the crew and passengers of boats get into difficulty at sea, they can **trust** the lifeboat crews from RNLI to try their very best to rescue them. Many of the crew and coastguards are volunteers.

- There are over 230 lifeboat stations all around the coast of Britain & Ireland
- Crews are on call 24 hours a day, every day of the year. They must be ready to drop what they are doing at a moments notice to go out on their lifeboat
