Sports News



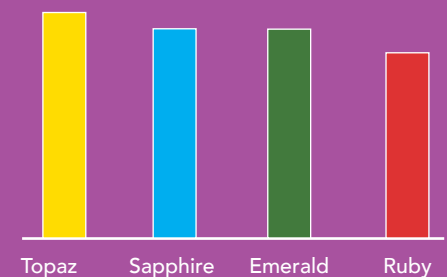

Acorn Class



Class News:

We have had another busy couple of weeks in Acorn Class. In Phonics, the children have been learning the rhyme: *"The Grand Old Duke of York"*. Our older children have been playing voice sound games, identifying syllables and noticing rhyming words too. We have enjoyed sharing our stories: *"Paddington at the Palace"* and *"The Queen's Knickers"*.

To develop the children's understanding of the world, we have been looking at pictures and videos of the characters in our rhyme. The children learned about the Royal Guards and made artwork for our class display.

In Maths, we have been thinking about numbers up to four. Our younger children have been developing counting-like behaviour through songs and stories. Our older children have been practising their subitising skills, recognising quantities in different ways as well as noticing different ways to make up numbers. The children have been making shapes using playdough and straws and making sure they have 4 sides and 4 vertices. They have been counting cubes and counting how many legs the farm animals have in our sensory tray.

Thank you to everyone who attended Movie Night to help raise money for a new climbing frame in the Early Years outdoor area. We raised £62!

Conker Class



Class News:

In RE, we have continued to think about special places. We discovered that the church was a special place where Christians go. We spoke about why it was special and what events might happen in a church. We also learned about different features that we might find in a church (a font, stained glass window, a pulpit, pews and a Bible). Some of us made beautiful stained glass window artwork and church models.

We have loved celebrating Chinese New Year this week and we particularly enjoyed reading the story. Ask us what animal this year is named after? We learned about how this is celebrated, one of our favourite celebrations was the Chinese dragon dance. We made our own dragons and created our own dances. The children enjoyed making lanterns, red money envelopes, hats and having a go at writing in Chinese.

We have been thinking about *tempo* and *pitch* in Music. We were fantastic at recognising when the tempo in a piece of music got faster or slower, and enjoyed exploring pitch using our voices and also represented it in our movements.

In Maths, we have been composing numbers up to five, meaning we can recognise how there are different ways to make up the numbers 3, 4 and 5. For example, 5 could be made up of 3 and 2. 3 is a part, 2 is a part, 5 is the whole. We have also been exploring *mass* and *capacity*. It is exciting using the weighing scales and measuring what may be heavier and what containers have more or less capacity.

In Literacy, we have been looking at the story: "*Iris and Isaac*", a story of two polar bears who are good friends but had a falling out, realised how much they missed each other and then found

their way back to each other. This story tied nicely into our focus on relationships and friendship that we have been discussing in our PSHE Jigsaw sessions. It also links nicely to our topic this term which is *surrounding habitats*.

We have been exploring what habitats are and how they differ for each type of animal. Also how these vary for the climate these animals live in. From our story of *Iris and Isaac* based on two Polar Bears, we looked at the polar habitat and what polar bears are like. We are now looking at other main habitats to compare with the polar habitat we have started on: rainforest, desert and urban.

Chestnut Class



Class News:

The children have continued to make me proud with their enthusiasm for learning over the last few weeks.

The theme in class this week has been 'teamwork' and the children have been supporting each other in their play and collaborating with their learning partners.

In Maths, the children have enjoyed working practically to investigate teen numbers to twenty by representing using numicon, tens frames and multi-link cubes. The children have worked with partners and this week enjoyed the challenge of finding enough 'treasure' to fill two tens frames to make twenty. The children have also wowed me by recalling ways to represent teen numbers *pictorially* using part whole models and bar models.

As part of our Dreams and Goals theme in PSHE, we have been working to achieve a shared goal and again, we have been working with partners to achieve this. For example 'mirroring' actions and movements with a friend and giving instructions to design and decorate a pair of wellies. This

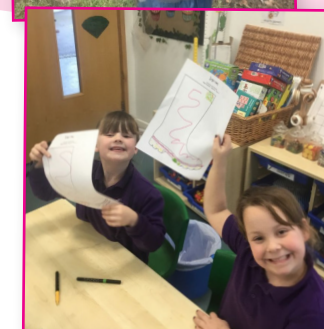
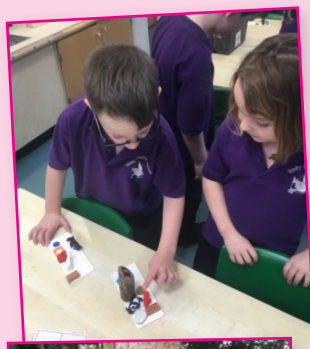
has been very appropriate given the weather we've had this week! The children discovered that both activities were made easier when children listened to their partner's ideas, took turns and were kind.

The children were really inspired by the Picture News article about the RSPB's Big Garden Bird Watch. So, in Outdoor Learning we created bird feeders using pinecones, lard, seeds, cheese and raisins to encourage birds to visit our woodland area. The children also used binoculars to identify birds in our school grounds. Some of our 'adventurers' made nests from natural resources for birds or themselves!

This week we welcomed Mrs Butt into Chestnut Class. Mrs Butt is an experienced HLTA and she will be supporting the children in class in the mornings. The children have all made her feel really welcome and it has been lovely to see her begin to get to know the class this week.

Well done Chestnut Class, keep aiming high and working hard!

Class News:

Wow... a busy few weeks where Cedar Class has continued to really impress me.

Over the past few weeks, we have absolutely loved exploring: "*The Crow's Tale*" by Naomi Howarth. We have developed our literacy skills in lots of different ways using this story. We have thought about imaginative openers, developed use of noun phrases to describe and have also been exploring ways to expand our sentences using different joining words.

In Maths, we have worked hard to consolidate our knowledge of *addition* and *subtraction*. We have enjoyed working practically and using a range of methods to help us use jottings inspired by dienes we use in the classroom. We have also begun exploring money, where we have practised recognising coins and their values and using these to make different totals.

We are particularly enjoying our PE this term. We have been working hard with Mr Pollock in Dance and, through our Yoga, we have been exploring strength

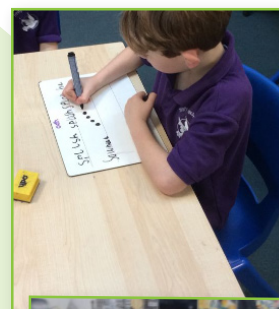
and flexibility. Our Yoga has allowed us to journey across the globe and explore different environments like the Arctic and the ocean and be inspired by the wildlife found there. We have been really mindful in our sessions to think about control of our body and how we can link movements together.

Cedar Class has continued to explore the UK in Geography. We have named and labelled countries of the UK, explored capital cities and started to make comparisons between different UK locations.

Finally, this week we held a performance showcase in PSHE. It was lovely to see how excited the children were to select their goal, work hard to achieve it or at least work towards it, and the best part was enjoying the success of everyone's hard work. We have some fantastic Macarena dancers for sure!

In Maths, we continued our topic on *multiplication and division*. The children spent last week looking at long methods for division and practiced a variety of examples. This week, we have been looking at *area and perimeter*. We spent a few lessons finding the area of different shapes and next week, we will find the perimeter.

In English, we have continued writing stanzas for our tiger poem. I have been so impressed with their writing, the children have come up with some wonderful examples of similes - well done, Cherry Class!

In Art, we were incredibly lucky to be visited by a local lantern artist team and they spent the morning helping us create incredible lanterns! The children had great fun creating their own lanterns and we were all incredibly impressed with each child's unique design.

Cherry Class has continued to explore *states of matter*. This week, we have set up an experiment to see if water evaporates quicker in a warmer environment or a cooler environment. Next week, we will look at our experiment and come up with a conclusion.

Finally, we had a visitor come in last week to run a drama workshop for History and Geography. The children recapped mountains and rivers and the Iron Age. I was so impressed with all the children, they were able to retrieve their knowledge from last year!

Year 5 and 6 had the best time at the Young Voices concert in Birmingham! It was such an amazing experience for the children - they all sang their hearts out and were all exceptional role models for the school.

In PE, we have continued working on fitness and dance. We are lucky enough to have had a visitor teach our most recent fitness lesson (look out for pictures on SeeSaw). New data has shown that 2024 was the Earth's hottest year on record, warming by 1.5°C. Around 200 countries had agreed to help keep the temperature rise below this figure because scientists say that increases could cause more extreme weather. This includes events such as heatwaves, storms, and wildfires.
