Wow and just like that another term is over!

The children in Acorns have had such a busy fun last two weeks. They have been learning the rhyme "Humpty Dumpty", practising cutting poor old Humpty up and sticking him back together with plasters. We have thought about other places that he may sit, such as on a car or a tree or the funniest being on Mrs Vivian's head! We made egg sandwiches, looking at how eggs change when boiled, practising peeling them, mashing them and spreading - developing so many skills. We have enjoyed making springy concertina legs and arms for Humpty, which involved following instructions carefully.

This week, we have been learning about the Lunar New Year. We have had a go at using chopsticks with noodles, which is not that easy! We have also learned what the lucky colours are. I wonder if your children can tell you these? Mrs Athay extended our concertina skills by supporting us to make dragons, which we then used to dance with.

In Maths, we have been reinforcing our awareness of 4 by going on 4 hunts, using bingo dabbers to put only 4 spots on a ladybird and practising subitising - seeing an amount as a group of 3 and 1 more. We are beginning to look at 5 and have talked about why we say "high five" as we clap each other's hands.

Our home corner play has been extended by the arrival of a giant cardboard box that Ms Bradley turned into a washing machine. We have 'washed' the dolls' clothes and practised putting them on hangers on the airer. The children were also very keen to do some washing up so we have had lots of warm soapy water to explore with.

We were delighted to welcome so many of you to our Parent Workshop on Tuesday, where we experimented with eggs with Miss Wood. Thank you for attending and completing the parent questionnaire that was sent out.

The children have really enjoyed having some of the older children come into class to read their books to them. This has been so rewarding for both year groups.

We hope you have a fantastic restorative half term and look forward to welcoming you and Miss Wood back.

Conker Class



Class News:

For the last two weeks, we have been learning about rainforest habitats. We discovered animals which live in the rainforest and learned the word *micro-habitat*. Ask us what it means! We discovered that the rainforest is actually very dark due to the tall trees. We were fantastic at comparing the habitats and made a *Venn diagram* to show what similarities and differences the habitats had. We loved creating an animal from polar, rainforest, desert and urban habitats from junk modelling. Some of us followed the step-by-step instructions to make our animal. We could even remember facts about our animals.

In RE, we have been learning about a different religion called *Judaism*. We discovered the special place where Jews worship is called a synagogue. We loved looking at the different artefacts and comparing them to what we may find in a church. We found out about the importance of a Torah scroll and loved making our own. We even made a *Yad* to go with it - which is a special pointer to read the Torah with, as you are not allowed to touch it. We also made beautiful Star of David artwork and drew everything you might discover in a synagogue.

In Drawing Club this week, we have been exploring London through the book: "All Aboard the London Bus". We have been learning about the Palace Guards and

some of us made our own bearskin hats. This picture shows our class bear wearing his bearskin hat whilst he sat protecting Buckingham Palace drawn on the flipchart.

In Maths, we have been discovering *length and height* using all sorts of objects, even our bodies! We measured the playground in a special Maths lesson led by Mr Pollock and learned that the playground is the same length as 31 metre sticks!

We say a sad farewell to Miss Willis as she moves onto her next teaching placement and we know we will all miss her.

In English, we have completed our adventure story writing based on "Lost and Found". This week, as writers, the children have created their own 'lost' narratives using their own characters. In Maths, we have completed our topic on *Place Value to 20*. It has been fantastic to see the children using stem sentences in their Maths discussions and making connections in their learning.

In PSHE, we have been celebrating our individual success and listening to our friends explain what they are proud of. We have explored 'steps to success' and worked on a shared goal of making a marmalade sandwich!

As part of our *seasonal change* learning in Science, we have been exploring the seasons and thinking about the months of the year. We have also been recording the weather each day and learning how to use a thermometer to read the temperature. Next term, there will be lots of hands-on exploration based on plants and growing.


Well done, Chestnut Class for another fantastic term. I am so proud of the progress you are all making.

Liz Davies came up with the idea in lockdown and started off making all the meals herself. Back then, she was providing for around eight or 12 people a week, but recently the number of people using Lizzie's Soup Run has soared.

Knife Crime Awareness Event for Parents and Carers

The B&NES Violence Reduction Partnership (VRP) are running a series of knife crime awareness events throughout February and March.

These events will take place in schools across the area. The first event will be held at Writhlington School on February 22nd (17.30 to 19.30), followed by Hayesfield Girls School on February 29th (18.00 to 20.00) and Cameley CEVC Primary School on March 18th (18.00 to 20.00).

The events are aimed at parents and carers who would like to know more about the dangers of knife crime or are concerned that their children are at risk. They aim to increase awareness of key issues surrounding knife crime, empowering you and your children to make informed and positive decisions to stay safe.

You will have the opportunity to hear from guest speakers with lived experience who have been personally affected by knife crime. There will also be a presentation by Street Doctors followed by a panel discussion with the opportunity to ask questions.
