

## **Thought for the Week**

'Jesus answered, "I am the way and the truth and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me."' (John 14:6 - NIV)

It's a bold claim. So what do we do with it?

Many people choose to **reject** it. At the time Jesus was around, many of the Jewish leaders did this. When Pilate asked "What shall I do, then, with Jesus who is called the Messiah?", they all answered, "Crucify him!" (Matthew 27:22). It's likely that they were challenged by what he said and did. His grace and power exposed their lack of both and the truth he spoke exposed their error. And when you don't like the message, you reject the messenger.

Another thing to do is to **avoid** it. That's what Pilate's wife did. 'While Pilate was sitting on the judge's seat, his wife sent him this message: "Don't have anything to do with that innocent man, for I have suffered a great deal today in a dream because of him." (Matthew 27: 19).

For many people, it can be easier to avoid something that forces you to make a change, particularly a heart change. The chief priests said, "He stirs up the people all over Judea by his teaching." (Luke 23:5) And they were right. Often what Jesus said and did did disturb the people, but they still chose to listen. 'Jesus said to the twelve, "Do you want to go away as well?" Simon Peter answered him, "Lord, to whom shall we go? You have the words of eternal life..." (John 6: 67-68)

Finally, the last option is to **accept** it. In today's society, where many people believe there are no absolute truths and where relativism is widely accepted, someone making a claim to be the truth isn't popular. Pilate tried to wash his hands of the whole thing and avoid making a decision about Jesus, but according to Jesus this can't be done. Jesus said "Whoever is not with me is against me..." (Matthew 12:30).

Many people refer to Jesus as a good man or as a wise teacher, but he claimed to be much more than this. 'The high priest asked him, "Are you the Christ, the Son of the Blessed?" And Jesus said, "I am, and you will see the Son of Man seated at the right hand of Power, and coming with the clouds of heaven."' (Mark 14:61-62). This claim led the Jewish leaders to condemn Jesus to death on a charge of blasphemy, claiming that he was the Son of God.

So if Jesus claimed to be the Son of God and not just a good man or a wise teacher, that leaves us with three options. He was either lying (making claims that weren't true), mad (wrongly believing himself to be the Messiah) or he was who he said he was.

So Jesus - lunatic, liar or Lord? What do you think?
