


The photo on the left shows Jubilation as it travelled down The Mall.

She eats three times a week and she likes to eat Locusts.




How It Snows by Jenny Fry (Uranus)

HISTORY OF SANTA CLAUS

Santa Claus was born 15th March 280 A.D.

The birthplace of Santa Claus is the Patara Village, now called Demre, in Antalya, Turkey.

The story of Santa Claus begins with Saint Nicholas a monk who reportedly helped the poor and sick in the 3rd century AD. He became a very popular saint in Europe; Saint Nicholas in Dutch translates to Sinter Klaas, which is where the name Santa Claus comes from. The legend and traditions made it over to America and that gave us the Santa Claus that we all know now.

The earliest known use of the name Santa Claus in English was in 1773 in America.

His modern image, with flying reindeer and coming down chimneys began with Clement Clarke Moore's poem "A visit from St Nicholas" in 1823.

Santa Claus how we recognise him today was first drawn in 1863 by American cartoonist Thomas Nast, he also introduced the world to Santa's workshop, as well as his base being found at the North Pole. Nast did more than any other artist to set the standard for Santa's classic look.

The White Rock Company which sold mineral water portrayed him as a white-bearded, grey haired grandfather in a red costume in its advertisements long before Coca-Cola did in the 1930's.

He is known by lots of different names around the world. Father Christmas in the UK. In the USA he is known as Kris Kringle. France and Spain know him as Papa Noel. In Italy they call him Babbo Natale. In Germany, Santa is known as Weihnachtsmann which translates to English as "Christmas man"

In 1927, the US Government officially issued Santa with a pilot's licence.

It is known that Santa has a naughty and nice list; it is not easy to know which list you are on. You have to think to yourself have I been good? Have I tried hard at school and am I getting my work done? Am I listening to my grown-ups at home and teacher at school? Have I kept my bedroom tidy? Have I been a kind friend and helpful to others? If you answered yes, there is a good chance you are on the good list, if you answered No, you still have time to turn it around, start being extra good now and get on that good list.



History of Candy Canes

Hollie (Mercury)

The original candy cane was made 350 years ago. Over time the candy cane has become a symbol and tradition during the Christmas holiday, used as a decoration for Christmas trees. The first candy cane was not made in the shape of a cane. It was white, completely straight and only flavoured with sugar.

Legend has it that in 1670, the cane shaped candy became historical when a choirmaster at the Cologne Cathedral in Germany bent the sugar-sticks into canes to appear as shepherd's hooks. The all-white candy canes were given out to children who attended the ceremonies. This became a popular tradition, and eventually the practice during church ceremonies which spread all over Europe and America.

The first documented example of the use of candy canes to celebrate Christmas occurred in 1847, when August Imgard, a German-Swedish immigrant, from Wooster, Ohio decorated the Christmas tree with paper ornaments and candy canes.

The solid white sugar canes were on Christmas cards in the early 1900's. The first red and white striped candy canes were made at the turn of the 19th century. At the same time the first striped candy canes appeared, and candy makers added the peppermint flavour which quickly became a traditional flavour.

In the 1920's Bob McCormack, from Atlanta, was the first to use candy canes as special treats for Christmas for his friends and family. In the beginning the red and white candy canes were made by hand and producing them were labour intensive. The laborious process of making candy canes was eliminated in the 1950's when a machine designed especially for the automation of candy cane productions was invented by Gregory Keller (Bob's brother-in-law). His company, Bob's Candies was the first company to mass-produce and distribute candy canes worldwide and has been in business for over eighty years.





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<u>Christmas Recipe</u> Jasmine Newth, Hollie Smith and Will Vale

Ingredients

- 150g unsalted butter, softened
- 150g golden caster sugar
- 3 eggs
- 1 tsp vanilla bean paste
- 175g self-raising flour
- 100g gold or white fondant
- edible gold lustre dust or spray (if using white fondant)
- edible sugar balls, mini chocolate, beans, or multi-coloured sprinkles (for baubles)

For the buttercream

- 300g unsalted butter, softened
- 500g icing sugar, sifted
- 1 tsp vanilla bean paste
- green food colouring (preferably oil-based)

Method

· STEP 1

Heat the oven to 200C/180C fan/gas 6 and line a 12-hole muffin tin with paper cases. Beat the butter and sugar together in a large bowl or stand mixer until pale and creamy. Add the eggs and vanilla along with 1 tbsp of the flour (to reduce the risk of the mixture splitting) and beat again.

STEP 2

Sift the remaining flour into the batter and mix to combine until no streaks of flour are visible, being careful not to overbeat. Divide the batter between the cases, ensuring they are all at least half-full. Bake on the middle shelf of the oven for 12-15 mins until golden. Cool in the tin for 5 mins before removing to a wire rack to cool completely.

STEP 3

Roll out the fondant and stamp out 12 stars or flowers using mini biscuit cutters. Leave to dry on a sheet of baking parchment. If you've used white fondant, let the shapes dry for 5-10 mins, then spray or brush with gold lustre.

STEP 4

To make the buttercream, slowly mix the butter, sugar and vanilla together in a bowl using an electric whisk or in a stand mixer. Once combined, beat for at least 5 mins until pale and fluffy. Add the green food colouring, a little at a time, until you reach your desired shade. Spoon the buttercream into a piping bag fitted with a star nozzle. Pipe swirls of the buttercream over the cooled cupcakes, building the swirls up into a cone shape. Top the 'trees' with the fondant stars, then decorate with sugar balls, sprinkles or chocolate beans to make baubles.

Christmas idea 1

BRIGHT BAUBLES

Materials needed

- o Foil
- String
- Paint
- o Paint brush
- Tissue paper
- First, cut a long piece of thread or ribbon for hanging your decoration then cut strips of foil about the same length as each other.
- Secondly, make a loop with the thread and scrunch one of the strips of foil into a ball around the two ends of the thread (squeeze the foil tightly to make sure it stays in place).
- Thirdly, scrunch the other strips of foil around the ball, one at a time until the ball is the size you want the decoration. Roll the ball under your hand to make the surface smooth.
- Penultimately, brush part of the ball with white glue then press on strips of white tissue paper. Keep doing this until the ball is covered and leave to dry.
- Finally, once the glue is dry, decorate the ball with coloured tissue paper, stickers, gemstones, glitter or anything else to create your design (if you have glitter or small bits it's a good idea to brush glue all over it to seal it. The glue will become clear when it dries like a varnish).

FROSTY THE CHALKMAN

Materials needed


- Colouring pencils/pens

- First, for the head, draw a circle with white chalk on blue paper. This should be positioned to leave enough space for the body and ground.
